THE BANK BANDITS.

THE THREE NORTHFIELD ROBBERS CON FESS THEIR IDENTITY-AND OWN THAT THEY ARE THE YOUNGER BOYS-FULL DETAILS OF THE FIGHT EN WILICH THEY ARE

CAPTURED.

Winona, Minn., Sept. 22,—The three wounded robbers now in Madelia jall have confessed that they are the Youngar brothers—Côle, James and Robert, but refuse to divulge the name of the dead man or the name of those killed at North-Roll or the transfer the robbert. Northfield, or tell who are those that got away, saying they are bound by an oath to keep those things secret. Cole Younger has a rifle ball in his head and two in his body; James has half his upper jaw shot away, a bullet in his shoulder, another in his breast, and eight buckshot in various parts off his body. James was also wounded in the right shoulder at Northfield. The. robbers have been kindly treated since captured, and their wounds dressed. They talked of their mother and sister. They express regrets for their crimes, and play the pious dodge by asking the prayers of Christains. Some parties tried to lynch them when they were first tried to lynch them.

The first account of their capture is incorrect. They were not shot down at long range, but were skirmished by Sheriff Glisper and Capt. The robbers opened fire on the skirmishers at twenty feet distance, and fought till all were killed or disabled. But one or two of the citizens were hit, but not dangerously. Capt. NEW YORK'S POOR

We have previously referred to the great want among the poor of New York City, for the comforts and necessaries of life. Almost every mail brings intelligence of additions to the great army of beggars the metropolitan city is burdened with The depression of trade, and particularly manufactures, has driven thousands and thousands to the wall, helpless and perfeetly dependent. This fall witnesse thirty thousand laborers idle, in excess of any previous one, in New York City alone, and it is estimated, even by the New York papers, that there are two hundred thousand men and women wanting bread in New York and Brooklyn alone. What Does not deceive invalids into false hope terrible sufferings this great want will entail the dawning winter, let the reader imagine. Referring touchingly to these facts, a correspondent of the Austin Statesman says:

"I received a card this evening from one


