THE IMPORTATION OF AMERICAN WHEAT INTO ENGLAND.

It was, we believe, an American, Mr. Delmar, who three or four years ago put together elaborate statistics to show that the world was producing more bread than it could eat, and warned his countrymen that the fault of over-production was chiefly attributable to the United States, and endeavored to convince them that greater attention should be turned to other industries than corn growing. Whatever effect his arguments may have had on the farmers of America—and, to judge from the enormous annual surplus for disposal, they could have made little or no impression—the stern argument of annual losses has convinced our own corngrowing farmers that they cannot compete with foreigners. If in years of good crope and moderate prices they can but just live and pay their way, it is evident that with small crops to be sold at low prices, ruin is certain.

Take, for instance, last year. Farmere

aske, for instance, last year. Farmers received for a miscrably small crop a price at the rate of about eight shillings per quarter below the average price of the past ten years. Their losses must have been severe, aggravated as they were by a dear labor market and a protracted harvest time. It need be no matter for surprise that core forms are at discount and time. It need be no matter for surprise that corn farms are at a discount, and that it is difficult to get tenauts for them even at a substantial reduction in rent. We must expect to see a steady decline in the acreage under wheat, and that our farmers will apply themselves to the production of meat, butter, cheese, and the grain for which our soil and climate appear to be especially adapted—namely, malting barley. If the production of wheat in this country decreases year by year, and if the population steadily increases, larger importations will be required. There is not the slightest reason to anticipate any difficulty in obtaining to anticipate any difficulty in obtaining what we want at moderate prices, unless there should be, which is most improbable, a simultaneous failure of the crop all





HURRAH FOR NEW BRAUNFELS!

THE BUSY BURGH LOOKS UP AND TELLS COLONEL PEIRCE SHE WANTS HIS ROAD.

We were pleased to meet last evening with Mr. Hermann Seele, of New Braunfels, from whom we obtain the following highly important railroad news.

On the evening of the 3rd, at a meeting of the New Braupfels Railroad Construction Committee, it was resolved to exenute the following proposition in substance voted upon and accepted by th people several months back, and left to the judgment of the Construction Committee to be acted upon : The G. H. & S. A. Railroad Company

to construct a branch of their road from a stated point near Seguin, on the east side at the Guadalupe river, up to New Brannfels; build a Rathroad and public tollbridge across the Guadalupe; establish and maintain a depot there, and a regular connection with every first-class train going east and west. In consideration of which work, the Construction Committee are to donate to Col. Peirce \$75,000 in bonds, if the depot is established, bridge finished, and trains run regularly, Also, and additional to the above denation, the Committee assumes the donation of \$15,-000 clear cash, in two installments, for a bridge-the first installment to be paid when the plers and foundations of said bridge are completed, the second, when the bridge is entirely fluished, turned
