WHY A DISTANT LAMP LOOKS BLURRED.

Looking at a distant lamp with both Looking at a distant lamp with both eyes I see a radient corona round the lamp. I find that this corona is composed of two corona superposed, one due due to the right eye, the other due to the left. Each corona has distinctly features of its own, which are recognized in every observation and have remained the same for years. The radiant beams (which are the conspicuous feature) are not exactly radial, but are forked once or twice. The corona is bounded by a peripheral fringe of blue succeeding to red. The diameter of the corona varies with the diameter of the pupil. The distal portion of the radiant beams are concealed or revealed by the contraction or dilation of the pupil. There is nothing in the cornea, aqueous humor, or pupilary margin of the iris, that can cause such refraction. It appears most likely that this excessive refraction of the cutside rays of the entering pencil is caused by something in the crystalline lens—probably, in the first place, by undue convexity of the more marginal parts of the lens, which are uncovered by dilation of the pupil. The radiant appearance of the corona is probably due to the radiant structure of the crystalline lens. The recent subject of Moslem insrule, isolated Servia seemed to have passed from public notice until oppression rearoused her passions and brought her again to the front. What is Servia's istory but a history as noble and heroic in behalf of freedom as is written in the annals of any country? The struggle for independence, during a hundred years past, forms one of the brightest records of modern times, for it has been made by a brave people against the despotism of the Turkish government. Servia's cause is the cause of humanity and freedom, and the impression which is gaining ground with America's greatest journalists that she is a tool in the hands of Russia, for the furtherance of atter's designs upon the Ottoman Empire, is not justified by any evidence of history, nor is it at best more than an

A JAPANESE EXECUTION.

HOW POUR CONVICTS WERE DISPOS-ED OF AT A TIME-A PROU-

A correspondent of the Edinburgh Courant, writing from Tokio, Japan, thus describes an execution of which

LIAR AND HORRIBLE SCENE. he was a witness: The prisoners were seated in baskets made of bamboo, each borne on the shoulders of two strong men. The place of execution was raised bigh above the road, and seemed to be a flat cut-out from the hill, the high bank on the other side of the road affording the spectators a good view of the proceedings. The prison-ers were blindfolded on the road in front of the hill, and were then brought up to the raised ground and the kages placed down. Re-freshments in the shape of fish, omelets, eake and wine were then handed by the attendants to the prisoners, who all seemed to partake quite freely. The prisoners commenced to converse freely among themselves, calling each other by name, and exhorting one another to behave firmly at the last moment. At the center of the ground was a hole about one toot deep and about one foot in diameter. The first criminal was led to the mat and grade to kneel. The executioner prepared his award by popular water down. his sword by pouring water down the edge. The prisoner's body was bared down to his waist, and his arms were held behind his back by a strong young fellow, who gained more command over the prison r's body by kneeling also, and pressing his right foot against the feet of the prisoner. Another man settled the bandage afresh over the eyes and ears, while another drew his neck out to the almost, holding the head over the hole until all was ready, when he withdrew. A slap on the back, just below the neck, intended to give rigidity to the muscles, was also the signal for the executioner to perform his task. He made his bow to the officials, and gave the coup de grace with an ease and cer-tainty that would have exited the envy of any swordsman. The instant the sword had passed through, the man behind, the body pressed the trunk forward into the hole. The executioner retired with a bow. and in an instant after the trunk and head, streaming with blood, were conveyed to a side place to await their removal by friends. The second prisoner, when approached, stated he was ready, and the other two prisoaer's shouted to him "Sni: kari ine!" (be firm), to which be replied undauntedly, "Shikari ari!" (I am firm). His mode of treatment

was similar to the first, but he shouted to the last, telling the others that he was just going, and that he was firm, while they repeated the same exhortation. A new exeentioner officiated and advanced to his borrid task. The third prisoner was a boy, who showed not the least led forward to the mat, but his courage never forsook bim an instant, and he marched as ato-dily as though he was being led for an
