If he had uttered this threat with a "Saturdance of South Carolina and South C with an accurate comprehension of South Carolina politics, Mr. Chamberlain, who has called on him for troops, would be a very badly soared man. What Chambervery badly seared man. What Chamber-lain wants is not that the negroes shall vote according to their convictions, but that they shall cast a solid vote for Cham-berlain, conviction or no conviction. The unfitness of the federal authority to interfere by arms or in any other way in elections is clearly shown by the attitude elections is clearly shown by the attitude of the President in this case. At two o'clock P. M. Judge Wesley, Ogden ook the speaker's stand in the amphithea tce, and delivered an able and appropriate address of which we give the substance te-wit :

"Through the politeness of the Trustee of the Agricultural, Stockraising and In-Instrial Association of Western Texas. appear this evening to deliver an address o this assemblage. Let me first congratulate the Association and the country at large, as demonstrated here to-day, upon the healthy continuance and growth of our worthy institutions, our morals, our arts and sciences-agencies which com bine to promote the health and happines of a people.

"One century ago our agricultural and echanical institutions were only in their primitive state-agriculture, particularly, as a science, was almost wholly naknown But the fact that the scientific tillage of 6783 PEOPLE AT HOWES' LONDON the soil was necessary, in the march of progress, to individual and national prosparity and comtact, lad men to study and marove the avecation of agriculture.

"Sir John Sinelair, a Scotchman, after years of labor, succeeded in establishing an sgricultural bureau, and from that time, ulture and the high arts and science have apread, until the machinery used, and the manner of tiling the soil, are of a carefully gotten up shotographic it-among the most marked improvements of instration. The first instance was a grand the age—the great distinction between processional autono cancicaling the soul civilized and savage life. Association to accomplish defluite ends is the most effec tual means of success, and it has been wisely asserted that man's moral and in tellectual happiness depends, to a great achievements of the profession. The second was to "The growth and prosperity of the Medical Association of our great State." Responded to by Dr. Carothers. Third—The Medical Profession in Western Texas, responded to by Dr. Dashiell.
