## 1979 Cotton Yields High In County

### Local Economy Gets Big Boost

Bailey County's economic picture is getting a good boost with cotton harvesting reports in this area. Despite severe hailstorms both early in the season, where a lot of cotton had to be replanted, and an equally severe hailstorm early in September, cotton harvesting prospects appear to be excellent at this time.

According to Bailey County Agent Spencer Tanksley, approximately 120,000 acres of cotton will be harvested this year, with the cotton producing some 400 pounds of lint per acre. The lint estimate is up from the same amount produced last year. Tanksley said cotton will be around 50 cents per pound on an average, and he said he expected the 1979 cotton crop to pump approximately \$22,000,000 gross agricultural dollars into Bailey County.

The county agent said this year some \$69,000,000 gross agricultural dollars will come into the county in return for agricultural products. He said this will be the highest amount returned to the county during the seven years he

has been county agent in Bailey County.

He estimated some 35,000-40,000 acres of cotton were hailed out during the Labor Day hailstorm, but said 175,000 acres of cotton had been planted. Even some of the cotton that received hail damage is showing a good yield, according to Tanksley. He said some farmers are disappointed in the percentage of lint turnout, but even dryland cotton farmers are reporting from three-fourths to just over a bale per acre.

County Agent Tanksley said some extremely high amounts have been harvested, with some reports received of as much as one and three-fourths bales being harvested on some irrigated acreages. The average yields on non-hail damaged irrigated acreages is reported generally to be one and one-fourth to three-fourths bales per acre.

Cotton lint is reported as being 600 pounds on some dryland to as high as 900 pounds on irrigated lands. Even some cotton in the hailstorm's path in September has been harvested. A farmer in the West Camp community said he harvested over 100 pounds of lint per acre in some of the worst damaged area.

In other fields in the path of the hailstorm, the cotton was shredded and plowed under.

"We have made tremendous gains," Tanksley said. **Con't Page 6, Col 1**

### For New Post

### Office In Enochs

ENOCHS, TX.--The U.S. Postal Service is seeking a suitable site upon which to build and lease a new post office building in Enochs according to Postmaster J.L. Beasley.

The "preferred area" for site consideration is in the general area of the intersection of FM 54 and State Highway 214.

Minimum site size needed is 12,500 sq. ft. or a lot with dimensions of 100 x 125 ft.

Property owners are asked to submit their site offerings not later than December 6, 1979, to Kenneth W. Wood, realty management and acquisition analyst, Field Real Estate and Buildings Office, U.S. Postal Service, P.O. Box 239, Dallas, TX 75221.

After a suitable site has been located, the Postal Service will call for construction bids for a building that will be built with private funds and leased to the Postal Service over a long-term period.

The proposed main post office will have 898 sq. ft. of interior floor space.

## City-County Agree On Fire Services

Tuesday morning, members of the Muleshoe City Council adopted and approved a fire service agreement drawn up between the City of Muleshoe and Bailey County.

According to the agreement, the City of Muleshoe will provide fire fighting and emergency rescue equipment and personnel as may be available to the rural citizens of Bailey County.

In return, the county will be furnishing space at the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum for storage of fire equipment.

Also, Bailey County commissioners agreed to provide and maintain a water tank truck of a type and capacity to be approved by the Fire Chief of the City of Muleshoe. The truck is also to be equipped with radio communications of the same type currently in use by the Muleshoe Fire Department.

The truck is to be provided on or before December 31, 1979 and is to be equipped to be used on rural fires where large amounts of water are necessary.

According to the new management, at any time the Muleshoe Fire Department leaves the city limits of Muleshoe to go to any fire, they will at that time become agents of Bailey County in all respects during the fire or emergency action.

COLLEGE STATION -- Guard against unscrupulous telephone solicitors with a little knowledge of how they operate, advises Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist.

Many types of goods and services are sold by telephone -- magazines, kitchenware, insurance and land -- but some dealers may try to trick consumers

into a purchase or contributing to a phony charity, she explains. Ms. Kerbel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

She recommends following these tips: 1) Never agree to buy a product, let a salesperson come to your home or make a charitable contribution during the first phone call.

Tell the salesperson you will call him back if you decide to buy or let someone come to your home.

2) Call the Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce to check on the company, then call the salesperson back if you really need what he is selling.

3) If it is a charitable organization, ask them to send you information about the charity.

4) If the company represents itself as helping the handicapped, ask if the handicapped are employed by the company and how much goes to the handicapped.

5) If you are told that you have won a free prize or gift, find out what you have to do.

Often the prize is only given if you buy something, and frequently you will be overcharged for the item you are required to buy.

6) Be sure to ask if you have to listen to a sales pitch for a product or service.

dous progress in the harvest during the last six days," commented the county agent on Tuesday morning. He cited the cooperation of dry weather as being the contributing factor in the harvest being approximately 40 percent complete.

With the cooperation of good, dry weather, Irwin said the harvesting had skyrocketed and the season is now rapidly approaching the peak of the season.

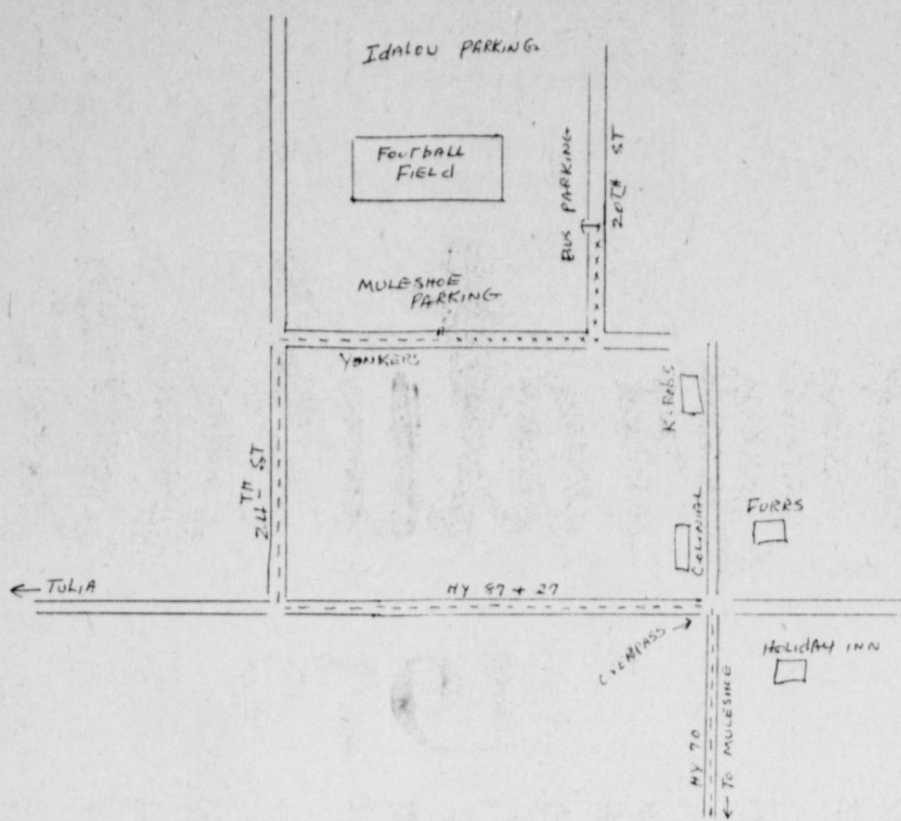

### HIGHLIGHTS

The only way Texas could have a tougher two-game conclusion to its season would be to have to face Arkansas and Houston all over again. Beating both the Bears of Baylor and the Aggies of Texas A & M the next two weeks will be the Longhorns' double-barreled assignment in order to hold their spots in both the Southwest Conference and in the national rankings. Baylor, Saturday's opponent, has lost to three of the toughest - Alabama, Houston, and Arkansas. A & M has been a more frequent loser, but one of the losses was by just one point to Brigham Young, another by three to Houston. Texas is favored over both teams, but the spreads are rather thin. The Longhorns will defeat Baylor by eleven points and Texas A & M by just seven.

The Oklahoma-Nebraska classic is without a doubt one of the great finales to every football season. Last year the Cornhuskers beat the Sooners 17-14 during the regular season as the two powers tied for the championship of the Big Eight Conference. However, Oklahoma came back to whip Nebraska in a re-match in the Orange Bowl, 31-24. In 1978, the two teams rolled up a rather unbelievable total of 860 points. Oklahoma leads the nose-to-nose competition through the years 32-24. Norman is the site of this year's struggle and we think the Sooners will squeeze by the Cornhuskers by just two points.

Again this year the Southern California-U.C.L.A. scrap is significant as far as the Pac-10 title and Rose Bowl are concerned. The Trojans have almost wrapped up both honors - but not quite. They should close out their regular season with an eighteen point win over the Bruins.

Penn State hosts Pittsburgh in what could be another cliff-hanging battle between two of the East's powerful independents. The Nittanies beat the Panthers 17-10 last season, and this year's confrontation could be closer. The teams are meeting for the 79th time, Penn State holding a three-game edge. The winner: Pittsburgh by two points.

Looking ahead to Saturday, December 1st, Army clashes with Navy in their "Big Traditional" in Philadelphia, and Auburn challenges Alabama in Birmingham. By beating Army, Navy would finally pull even at 37 wins apiece in their long series. And it appears it may happen as the Middies are 17-point favorites. And Auburn, 34-16 losers to Alabama last year, won't be strong enough to stop the 1979 Crimson Tide. Alabama will win by 18 points.
