The New York correspondent of the Chicago Tribune writes : We are fast running 'specialities' into the ground in this city, when an exclu-sive 'Baked Beans Company' is formed and put' into successful operation. This is a veritable fact, and the wagons of the New York and Boston Baked Beans Company now traverse the streets supplying the tamous Sunday-morning meat to the restaurants and hotels with to the restaurants and hotels with as much regularity as the milk earts. They do a thrilling business. Another speciality here is the man ufacture of whipped cream for Charlotte Russe. One concern manufactures nearly all of this delicate sold in the city. They use machinery, and by dealing in large quantities of materials and using quantities of materials and using labor-saving machines, they can supply the restaurants and confectioners cheaper than they can make it themselves. But the oddest thing, which, though small in itself is a big thing in its way, is the operation of a stock company for manufacturing the article of 'paste' for book-binders, paper-hangers, newspaper offices, etc. The cost of this thing is so slight that it would seem there was no 'big money' in it upon any conceivable terms; but in fact this business employs 100 hands, compress a five story building, and keeps three or four wagons and twice as many horses in constant nee. They supply paste to the suburitan cities and villages, and on terms which prevent competition from private consumers. Another odd cocupation is that of a half dozen butcher boys in Paiton and quantities of materials and using labor-saving machines, they can
