Columbia, S. C., Nov. 27.—The following
signed by Senator Gordon of Georgia,

South Carolina, and members of State
Legislatures and Congress, was tele-
graphed to the members of the State,
who had just been sent to the President of the
United States:

We the undersigned citizens from a
dozen Southern States, Democratic mem-
bers of the South Carolina Legislature, the
Democratic Executive Committee and ex-
ecutives, having just seen by Associated
Press dispatch that Gov. Chamberlain had
appointed a board to be placed at the
meeting to-morrow, send this solemn protest
against troops being placed under com-
mand of Gov. Chamberlain, and his ob-
jection to the presence of troops, and
will co-operate with them in preserving
the peace, but we protest against the use
of the army in controlling the organiza-
tion of the Legislature and the members
of the Legislature, who have been de-
legated by white and colored voters.

There is not the remotest danger of
disorder by the presence of the troops,
