The Lazbuddie Longhorns, who were the District 2-B South Zone Champions, swept the All-District 2-B South Zone honors this week. During the season, the Longhorns, under leadership of football coach DeWayne Sexton, were undefeated in

South Zone competition.

Andy Rogers, a 150 pound junior, was named to the first team as quarterback and Russell Windham was named to the first team as a running back. Russell is a 175 pound junior.

Named second team running back from Lazbuddie was senior, Apolonio Sanchez.

On offense, Reggie Treider was named first team tackle and Keihm Smith was named first team guard, while Phillip Jesko was named second team guard.

## Momentum Gaining With 'Mule Mania'

Advance Ticket Sales End At 4 P.M. Day Of Game

It will be football at its best Friday night, when the Muleshoe Mules travel to Canyon to take on unbeaten, high scoring Childress for the Regional Championship. Gametime is 7:30 p.m. in Kimbrough Stadium (Buffalo Bowl). The Muleshoe fans will be on the home side (west) and visiting Childress will be seated on the east side of the large stadium.

If weather predictions are correct at mid-week, the weather will be cooperating, and good playing weather is expected at gametime.

Due to the regional football game in Canyon Monday night, Neal Dillman, Superintendent of Schools, announced that all schools will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. that day. A pep rally is scheduled for 2 p.m. in the MHS gym.

Unbeaten Childress has racked up 376 points during the first 11 games they have played this year while giving up a total of 78 points, while the Mules have given up 102 points. This is 22.2 points average for Muleshoe and 34.18 average points for Childress per game. Also, Childress has averaged giving up 7.7 points per game, while Muleshoe has averaged giving up 9.12 points per game.

Mike Northcutt is Muleshoe's outstanding quarterback from Tucumcari, N.M. is ranked as the second best quarterback in the nation in high school football.

Childress Bobcat head football Coach Charlie Johnston has led the Bobcats to the playoffs in 10 of the 12 years he has been at Childress and during that time, the Bobcats have reached the finals three times.

For Childress, their high game of the season was against Henrietta, where the score was 61-0. Their closest game was the fifth game of the season, when they narrowly defeated Clarendon 39-37. They also found Dalhart hard to handle last Friday night when they went relieved with a 19-7 victory over the Dalhart team, who went into the game with a 6-4 season record.

In pre-district play, Childress played Paducah, Memphis, Wellington, Quanah, Clarendon, and

Tulia. Tulia lost to Muleshoe by a score of 24-0 in the third game of the season, and lost to Childress by 35-0.

District opponents for Childress are Henrietta, Electra, Seymour and Olney.

At the same time, the Mules dropped their season opener to the Portales Rams 2-7, then dug in and did not lose another game all season, although their homecoming game against Abernathy ended in a 20-20 tie.

Muleshoe defeated Floydada, Tulia, and Idalou in pre-district play. Then they went on to a clean sweep for the district title. Dropping in order were Friona, Olton, Littlefield, Dimmitt and then Morton.

When asked Tuesday morning how quarterback Mike Northcutt perhaps may have surprised him this year, Coach Mike Wartes commented, "Mike has a lot of talent and I guess the biggest surprise has been the way his leadership has come along. He has proven to be a great leader on the field."

"Another thing about Mike is his teamwork and quickness," added the Cont. Page 6, Col. 1.

# TFB State Convention Scheduled

Farm program legislation, balancing the federal budget, priority allocation of fuel for agriculture, and land use planning -- these and more issues affecting Texas farmers and ranchers will be aired at the 46th annual Texas Farm Bureau convention here Dec. 2-5, according to Carrol Chaloupka, TFB president.

About 1,100 voting delegates from the 213 organized Texas county Farm Bureaus will meet at the McAllen Convention Center to decide on policies that will guide Texas Farm Bureau for next year, Chaloupka explained. The delegates will also approve recommendations for national Farm Bureau policy which will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting in Phoenix in January.

The theme for this year's convention is "Pride in America, Farm Bureau, and Agriculture."

Speaking at the convention are U.S. Congressman Kiki De La Garza of Mission, vice chairman of the House Agricultural Committee; Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives Bill Clayton, Springlake; Carrol Chaloupka, Dalhart, TFB president; and Warren Newberry, Waco, TFB executive director. S.M. True, Jr., Plainview, TFB secretary-treasurer, also will make his annual report to the delegates.

Farm Bureau members adopted recommendations for state and national policies during the county annual meetings in September and October, Chaloupka said. The recommendations were forwarded to the state headquar-

ters in Waco where a 41-member Resolutions Committee used the ideas in drafting a set of tentative resolutions to be presented at the state convention. Resolutions can also be presented from the floor during the business session, he said.

Besides the business of policy-making, other important convention matters will include the election of the organization's president, vice president, secretary treasurer, and seven of the organization's 13 state directors.

Various recognition awards will be given to county Farm Bureaus and members throughout the meeting. Public relations, safety, and membership awards will be given to outstanding counties. Individual awards will include the Texas Farm Bureau Meritorious Service Award and the Outstanding Young counties. Individual awards will include the Texas Farm Bureau Meritorious Service Award and the Outstanding Young Farmer and Rancher Award.

The convention begins on Sunday, Dec. 2, with registration at the McAllen Convention Center that afternoon. Scheduled events for the evening include a vesper service and the annual Talent Find contest. Guest minister for the vesper service will be the Reverend Wilbur R. Aten, executive chaplain of the International Seamen's Center in Brownsville. Master of ceremonies for the Talent Find Contest will be Charlie Rankin, farm director of radio stations KURV and KESI in Edinburg.

Monday activities will begin with the Young Farmer and Rancher breakfast at 6:30 a.m., followed by a general session at 8:30 a.m. TFB President Chaloupka, True, and De La Garza will address the delegates at this time.

A ladies' luncheon will be held at noon Monday in the ballroom of the Holiday Motel near the convention center.

Twelve special conferences are scheduled for Monday afternoon. Farmers and ranchers will attend conferences on Energy, Farm Bureau services, animal health, wheat and feed grains, cotton, and rice. Also scheduled are conferences on research and education, farm labor, livestock, water, peanut and oil seeds, and dairy.

Ten finalists from district queen contests will compete for the title of Texas Farm Bureau Queen on Monday evening in the convention center auditorium. Millard Shivers, manager of rural development at Blue Cross/Blue Shield

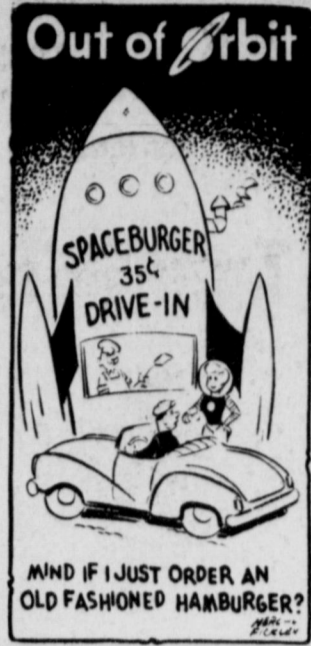

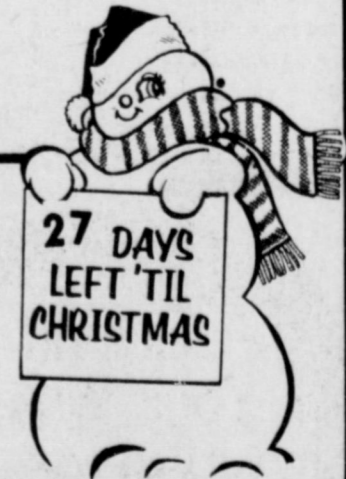

Coach. "He is very quick to give credit to the linemen and people around him. He is a completely unselfish player. Many times, Mike has stepped out and praised the linemen and backs that make blocks for him." Mike has two back-up quarterbacks, who can go in a game and fill his spot. They are Monti Vandiver and Cody Crittenden.

When asked the meaning of total team effort, stressed strongly by the Muleshoe Mule coaching staff, Coach Wartes added, "There's not anybody on the team who realizes any more than Mike the concept of total team effort. The other backs, Zeke Pecina, Charles Walker, Felix Norman and Lyndal Stovall are likewise strong on total team effort. They know that anytime they pick up yardage, it is through team effort and not all through individual effort."

"The team has a goal of 300 total yards on offense per game and we can help that goal through the efforts of the offensive and defensive team efforts."

"The linemen get as much satisfaction from the big yardage plays as do the skill players. They have the satisfaction of knowing they were the main impetus in creating the situation that allowed the yardage to be made."

As a part of the coaching concept, Coach Mike Wartes and his entire coaching staff stand firm on the conviction, "...To have a truly championship team has to be total team effort. A team has to throw away jealousies, and the Muleshoe Mules have done that as well as any team I have ever been around," continued the coach.

In answer to the question, "Who are we talking about?" the coach said,

"When we started this season, we had one starter on the line, Ramiro Torres. We had to fill five other positions. The greatest improvement on the team's offensive line was evident when we look back over the season. At the beginning of the season, the players' inexperience showed. They look at Idalou 10 games later, you will see the improvement is very evident."

"We are pleased with the outstanding job done by our offensive line to allow us an average of 22.2 points per game."

Tight End Sam Whalin, who has done an excellent job according to all his coaches; Ramoro Torres, Tackle-- the best 'base' blocker on the team; Jeff Meeks, a sophomore, playing Strong Guard, who is a newcomer with a prospect of becoming an outstanding football player who has come in and done a 'super' job for the Mules; Curby Brantley, a junior, who has the biggest heart on the line, say his coaches add, and has consistently gotten better. The Quick Guard position has had three this season. Curtis Elder, who was injured in the Morton game who was termed the quickest and put out fantastic effort; Jesse Lackey who was said to be adequately filling in before being injured in the last Idalou game. That position is now filled by junior Benny Pena, who is said to have done an outstanding job against Idalou.

Another Tackle, James Atwood, converted this year from defensive to offensive tackle and is considered to be an outstanding player. He has adjusted, according to the coaches, and does an outstanding job. Defensively, Coach Wartes cited the inexperience of the defensive line, with Nose Guard Dennis Watson being eliminated by

injury early in the season. Both James Atwood and Sam Whalin, who were returning defensive players, converted also to offensive linemen. They provide the foundation for the defensive line. They are stable and good leaders, said Coach Wartes, and give important leadership and maturity to the players.

Senior Terry Burton, who plays end, was in the secondary last year and Coach Wartes said he is the big play artist for the Mules and comes up with at least one big play each game. Benny Pena has been his backup as has Jesse Lackey, and both have done a good job added the coach.

Rodney Unrein and Victor Leal also play Nose Guard and the season has seen them switched back and forth, according to which one could play the best against the team coming up on Friday night.

For defensive tackles, midway through the season, Curtis Elder converted to tackle and his coaches have said he did an excellent job before he was injured in the Morton game. His position has been filled by Mike Henry and now Wesley Rasco, who was moved up from J.V. Coach Wartes said Wesley will be an outstanding player for the Mules.

Marvin Lewis has been considered the most consistent player in the defensive line. He was injured early in the season, and the position was filled by Oscar Hernandez, who moved to the Nose Guard Position. Linebacker Carol Precure was moved from JV to varsity and Coach Wartes said he is the most improved player in football.

George Vela, a sophomore, was also recently added to the team moving from the JV team.

As a group, Mike Wartes

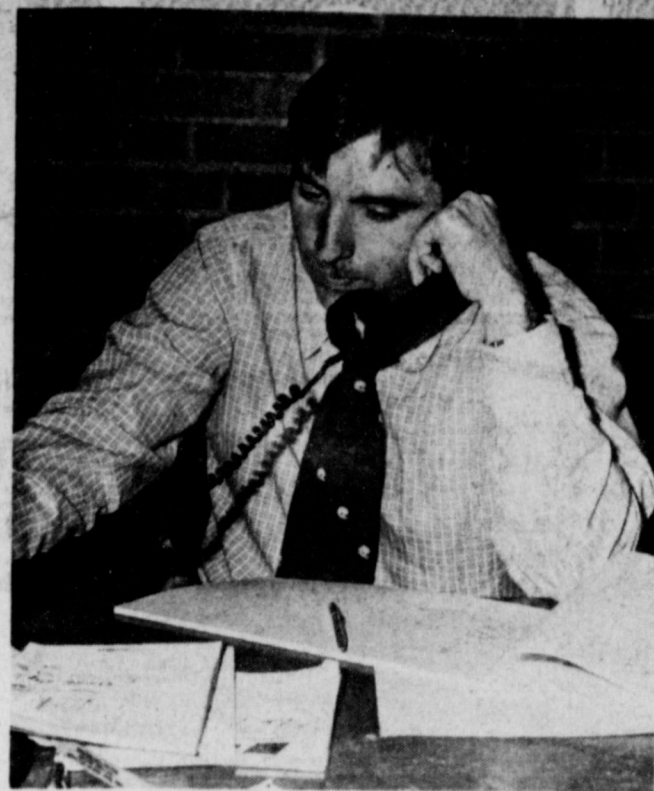
said the secondary is the most improved unit. "If the line makes a mistake, there is a five yard gain, but if the secondary makes a mistake, there is a 50 yard gain," stated the head football coach. Secondary includes Tommy Wheeler, Joel Bratcher, Jim 'Bones' Norman, Mark Northcutt, Mike Northcutt, Clifford Watson, Cam Hawkins and Mike Mills.

"Defensively, we feel our defensive line is very consistent and does an excellent job containing the offense. I think Idalou was the first very good defensive game we played, followed by the Littlefield performance, which I think may be one of the best defensive games we have had since I have been here. Our players had an outstanding defensive football game," said the coach.

"We think we have one of the better AA defensive teams," continued Wartes. "Our defense has played extremely well, all the way through except for the first quarter and a half with Friona and with Abernathy."

"One thing we like in a team. In order to win, a team has to be aggressive. Our team is very aggressive and we have not been outit very many times."

Early in the season, before the first game, Coach Wartes expressed some concern on pass defense for the Mules. When queried about the defensive efforts in pass defense in the playoffs, the coach added, "Our pass defense has really come on. We were hurt a little in the Portales game, but the Mules accepted the challenge to stop the air game of their opponents. 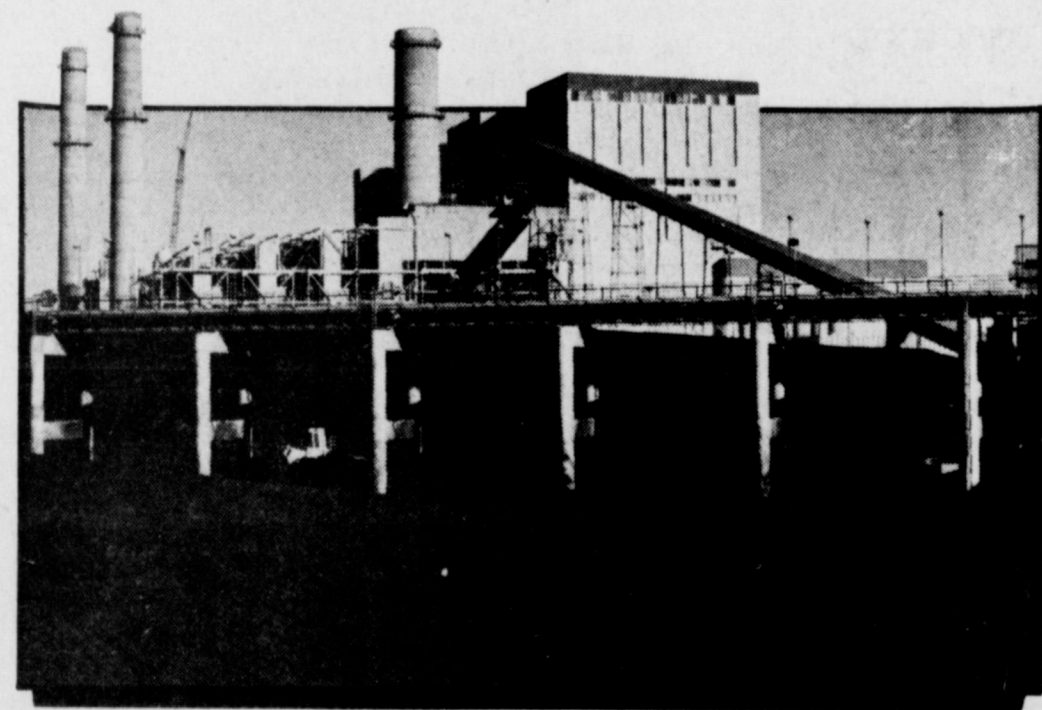

## Sweet Potatoes Give Good Nutrition, Taste

COLLEGE STATION-- Sweet potatoes offer high nutrition -- they're nearly a balanced food -- and just plain good eating, says a foods and nutrition specialist.

They offer protein, carbohydrate, minerals and vitamins, explains Dr. Rose Tindall with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In fact, one medium-sized, boiled, sweet potato contains only 141 calories -- and it provides more than twice the recommended daily allowance of Vitamin A for an adult.

Also, it provides 36 percent of the vitamin C an adult needs each day -- along with one-tenth of the necessary iron and thiamin, plus other vitamins and minerals.

Sweet potatoes are in largest supply from September through December, so now's the time to look for the most reasonable prices.

This traditionally fall-menu favorite has an interesting history and "family tree," too.

Used as a staple food for troops during the American Revolution, the Civil War and Reconstruction, the sweet potato is native to the Americas and was cultivated by the American Indians.

Actually it's neither a true yam nor a relative of the potato.

It is really a tuberous-rooted perennial and was named "batata" by the Spanish from the original Peruvian "papa" meaning tuber.

True yams are not even produced in the United States, and they belong to a different plant family, the Dioscorea.

In the United States, two types of sweet potatoes are available to consumers.

One type, the "Jersey"

variety gets its name from its growing areas -- primarily around New Jersey and other mid-Atlantic-seaboard states. It has a dry, mealy flesh and remains firm when cooked.

A "moist-fleshed" type is the second variety. It's very soft and sweet when cooked.

This type thrives best in the warm climates of the southern and southeastern United States, and they grow in the Southwest. Louisiana is their primary growing area, however.

No matter which variety you choose, remember sweet potatoes are one of the most all-around nutritious foods of the world, so you make a good choice when you take some home.

### SERVE CRANBERRIES WITH FLAIR

Serve cranberries--even leftover cranberry sauce--with a new "flare."

Combine them with spareribs--an American favorite traditionally served plain, broiled or barbecued.

- Cranberry Spareribs
- 3 to 3 1/2 lbs. spareribs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 3 tbs. all-purpose flour
- 1/8 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/8 teaspoon ground all-spice
- 2 1/2 Tbs. vinegar
- 1 TB. lemon juice
- 1 cup water
- 1 can cranberry sauce

Place ribs on broiler rack (trim off fat, if necessary). Broil until brown. Turn to brown second side.

Remove from rack, and pour off drippings. Return ribs to broiler pan (without broiler rack).

In saucepan, mix salt, sugar, flour, mustard, all-spice. Add remaining ingredients. Cook and stir until slightly thickened.

Pour over ribs in pan. Cover.

Bake at 375 degrees F. for one hour, uncovering pan last 15-20 minutes of the cooking time.

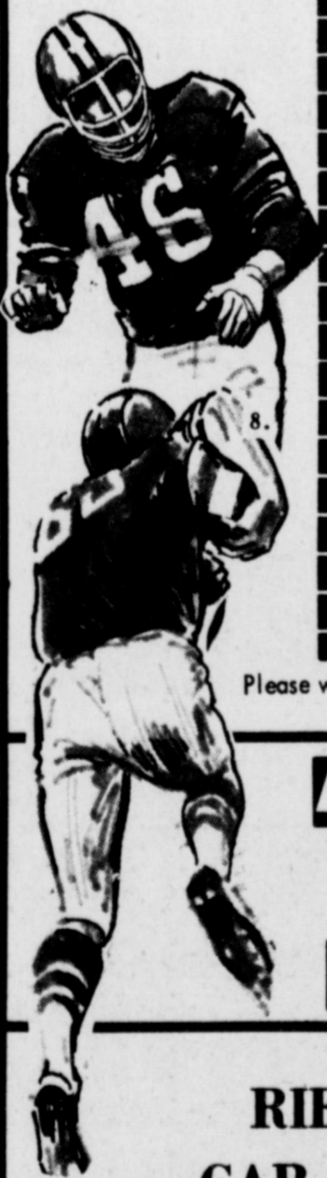

revenues of \$28 million for the first quarter ended September 30, 1979.

In the first quarter of the prior fiscal year the Company had net income of \$1.2 million, or 74 cents per share, on revenues of \$23.6 million.

"This year's first quarter was one of our best, even though the results did not match those of the record-setting first quarter of fiscal 1979," said Ron Davenport, President.

"All segments of our agribusiness operations, with the exception of the sale of Company-owned cattle, were either ahead of or about equal to the gross

profit level of the same quarter of the prior fiscal year," he explained.

"The chief difference in profitability between the two quarters was a narrowing of profit margins on the sale of Company-owned cattle. The cost of purchasing and fattening feeder cattle was higher, which reduced profit margins at the time the cattle were marketed, when compared to the situation in the first quarter of fiscal 1979."

During the first quarter of fiscal 1980 about 17,250 head of Company-owned cattle were sold for a gross profit of \$913,000.

"The Company Cattle

segment was still the most profitable of our operations," said Davenport.

Company Cattle produced the highest gross profit ever in the first quarter of the prior fiscal year when 16,600 head were sold for a gross profit in excess of \$1.6 million.

"Although cattle prices in the July-September period of this year declined from those of the March-June quarter, grain-fed cattle still achieved acceptable profitability," commented Davenport.

The Company's feedyard operations had gross profits of \$862,000, about 26 percent higher than in the first quarter of fiscal 1979.

Profit margins from Custom Feeding improved as occupancy at the Company's operating area slightly curtailed gross profits from the Commercial Feeds segment. Tonnage sold declined about 4 percent with gross profits of \$335,000, compared with \$379,000 in the first quarter of fiscal 1979.

Gross profits from Animal Health Supplies totaled \$478,000, up 5 percent from the comparable quarter of last year.

"Nationwide, the number of cattle on feed and those available for placement in feedyards are below prior-year levels, which are good indications that beef prices

could go higher and the marketing of grain-fed cattle should remain profitable," said Davenport.

Friona has signed a contract to acquire all of the capital stock of Village Packing Company in exchange for 635,000 shares of Friona common stock. Friona shareholders will be

asked to approve the proposed transaction at their annual meeting in December.

Village, with headquarters in Columbus, Ohio, is the largest supplier of hamburger meat to the Wendy's International, Inc. chain of more than 1,600 fast food restaurants.
