A NATIONAL DUTY

"But how about the Mexican raiders nd Indians?' Thus ends a letter now before us, written by a gentleman at the North, whose thoughts have lately been turned toward Western Texas as his residence. He is a man of more than average intelligence, and is well informed, especially about the opportunities which this State affords for a man of enterprise and property. He knows about our eli-mate and the vast tracts of grazing lands; but he also knows something about Mexican raids and Indian depredations. That ie, he knows about them as people at the North generally know about them-just enough to deter them from risking life and property in that part of the State

and property in that part of the State liable to them. We confess we can not answer his question as satisfactorily as we would like, especially if he wants to know what we are "going to do about it." We are in very much the same predicament as the skipper of a down-east packet vessel in a fog, when a passenger asked him, "What will you do now, Captain!" He could only say, "That is just what I should like to know myself." Some things we know too, well. We know that, for the last six mosths there have been more raids, more mostly tending their flocks have been shot down in cold blood in order to prevent their giving information to others of the presence of the marauders. Ranch men their giving information to others of the presence of the marauders. Ranch men have set in silence all night, with their hands on their rifies, expecting every moment to use them in defence of their herds. Men in camps have put out their fires at nightfall and removed the bells from their horses, lest by the light or by sound the steatthy robber should be attracted to their hiding place. Horse and catile have been "gobbled up" by the score and the hundred, and hurried across the border; and hundreds, too, of sheep have been slanghtered out of pure wantonness and deviltry. And all this has taken place, not once, or twice, and upon the immediate border of the Rio Grande, but over the whole country for more than a hundred miles away from its banks, and up and down the valleys, or canons, of the Prio, the Nueces, and the other rivers running parallel to the Mexican boundary. running parallel to the Mexican boundary. All this we know; and we have often reported sickening details that filled the minds of all with indignation.

It is no answer to say that our own State authorities ought to give relief. They cannot do it effectually, though they might do more than they have done. But the national officers have put such limitation upon State action as to cripple and hamper it. Congress can do what is necseary, if the chief executive won't or don't, and it is their duty to do it. They can appropriate money, and raise troops, and direct what shall be done. We doubt not Mr. Schleicher and our other Representatives are doing all they can, but they should be backed up by an except and determined constituency.

There has been, we fear, hitherto, too much of sickly sentiment toward Mexico as a "sister Republic." But when that Republic sends to the frontier, and keeps in command there, the great patron of raiding robbers, our own Government should utterly dismiss all recollection of anything but the protection due to their own people. Mexico, represented by Cortina, reminds one of the old vagabond of sixty canght robbing a hen-roost, who plead lastily for mercy upon the ground that he had no mother or father, and was ntitled to commiseration as a poor orphan. Let us dismiss mawkish sensibility, and attend to the punishment of the guilty, even if in doing so we must hold a nation to ite just responsibility.

Instead of being benefited, they are, under such circumstances, positively worsted. People from the Northern States form a very erroneous idea of our climate. They have gathered the sotion that our winters are as mild and gentle as springtime; that cold weather is something only read of. Such is, fortunately for us who live down here, not the case. Were it se, the healthtroupe now playing in this city, and to fuiness of our climate would be seriously impaired. Mild winters are generally succeeded by summers that everage more sickness than those that follow the colder seasons, Mild winters allow vegetable decomposition to go on, and the sun beaming down warmer and warmer as the spring advances, fills the air with a miasma fatal to continued good health. We have much open and delightful weather through the winter, surpassing that, we think, to be found any where on the continent. But we have northers, that make overcoats most comfortable, and also periods of damp, wet weather, most disagreeable to experience, yet without which, as can be easily understood, the country would sufferely from drought and its attendant consequences. So far as climate goes, Western Texas is supremely fortunate, and those who grumble will be found to do so without sufficient ground. When their complaints are sifted, as we have hinted, they come here with the wrong twist in them, and it is bird to bend them straight.
