WASHINGTON. Washington, January 30—Manager Barnes, of New Orleans, delivered the dispatches required by him to Morrison's committee.

SENATE—Mr Wright, of Iowa, submitted a resolution that the Senate proceed in accordance with the provisions of the electoral count bill, to appoint by a viva voce vote, five Senators to be members of the Commission in said act provided for.

Mr Edmunds, of Vermont, submitted a resolution, authorizing and directing the President of the Senate to appoint two tellers on the part of the Senate to perform the duties required by the electoral count bill which recently passed. Agreed to.

Mr Allison, of Connecticut, submitted a resolution providing that the proceedings before the Commission authorized by that bill be printed in the Congressional Record from day to day. Laid over.

FOREIGN. ENGLAND.

A SEVERE STORM—EASTERN NY. London, Jan. 30.—There was a severe gale in South and South-western England yesterday and last night, accompanied by rain and sleet, which caused considerable derangement in telegraphic lines.

ROME. AN ENCYCLICAL TO BE ISSUED. Rome, Jan. 30.—The Pope is preparing an encyclical in protest against clerical abuses. The act will probably be published at the Consistory, which will be held some time in March.

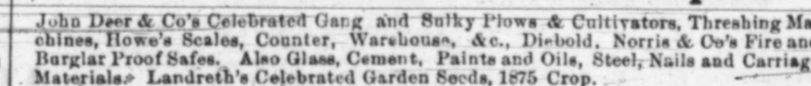

Anonymous letters also circulate extensively in this city, and may be divided into several classes. For instance, there are business communications, or those at least which have business objects in view, and which the authors desire to keep secret until more direct measures are reached. Business men desire generally to feel their way, and often employ anonymous messages. Others are warnings sent to the faithful, but of a nature where the authors do not show their hand. These are frequently received at the Coroner's office, and always command attention. Some important investigations have been occasioned by just such notices. In cases of crime, anonymous messages abound. Nearly a half dozen were received by the police at the time the Nathan horror was under investigation. A very curious instance of this kind was furnished by the famous Webster and Parkman murder. After Webster had been arrested the Sheriff received a letter intended to throw suspicion in another direction. It was signed "Clevie," and was written in a very coarse hand. The prosecution proved, by experts, that it was Webster's handwriting, and it was supposed that a pointed stick had been used instead of a pen. A still more remarkable anonymous communication incidented with the New York crime. I refer to the letter received by Sheriff Hart of this city, while John C. Colt was under death sentence. It contained \$5,000 in bank notes, and promised a further remittance of double that sum on condition that he should refuse to carry out the execution. Mr. Hart handed the money to the authorities, which was certainly very honorable, and at the same time announced his determination to hang the prisoner, but there are those who believe that his conduct was only intended to blind the public. According to this theory, Hart actually conveyed the prisoner's escape. This was done by firing a bullet into the wall of the prison at the moment of execution, and this led to the admission of a large number of fugitives. The undertaker's wagon was there with a coffin. The theorists say that during this confusion Colt was allowed to escape in a fireman's dress, and that a corpse was carried into the cell, which was near the entrance. This theory I do not accept, but it has found many believers.

The last anonymous letter that has appeared in criminal affairs has had the effect of delaying the sentence of a convict. I allude to the Blanchard case at Newark, in connection with the Brock murder. An attempt was made by such a trick to avert a criminal charge. But it will be unsuccessful. Anonymous letters may prove dangerous to their authors, and in one instance such a writer was in this way brought to the gallows. This was the result in the case of John Stephens, who was hanged in the Bonifas for wife-murder. The victim, who had been poisoned, was buried without suspicion. Stephens' motive was to marry a young woman, who had, however, another and a more favorite admirer. In order to break up the match, Stephens sent the lover a number of anonymous slanders on the woman's character. The object was attained, but the latter, in revenge, raised suspicion against her assailant. She recognized Stephens' handwriting in these attacks, and the result was his conviction and execution.

WELCOME THE RAILROAD. A SUGGESTION THAT SHOULD BE HEARD. AN IRISH TURK. (Chicago Catholic, January 30th.) Eugene O'Reilly, the apostate Irishman, who was compelled to fly from Ireland in 1848 for being an Irish Nationalist; and who afterward "turned his coat," joined the Turkish army, and is now known by the title of "Hassan Bey," has been recently alluded to by the Irish Times as "a genuine Irishman in a Moslem battalion." We are proud to record the brave deeds of Irish soldiers in foreign armies who fight for liberty, but we detect the actions of any crawling reptile like O'Reilly, who turns his back on his native land, or takes up arms in defense of a despotic and barbarous power. The Irish American, speaking of this subject, very truly remarks that "Before it is possible for a genuine Irishman to turn Turk—or Mormon for that matter—he must first have become a renegade to the tradition of his race and the land of his birth." The old saying, "trait communications," etc., is partly applicable in this case. O'Reilly's regiment was attached to the British army during the Crimean war, and after the war was over, O'Reilly, while on a visit to England, took occasion to refer to the English Government as "the best in the world, and thought the Irish people should be blessed in living under it." Whatever spark of nationality ever was in his bosom was quenched from him by his associations in the British army. The more he rises in the estimation of the "Sublime Porte," the more his name will be detested by Irishmen; and, while the names of his former illustrious companions will live fresh in the memory of the millions of Irish yet unborn, his will sleep in oblivion, except when it is spoken of in tones of contempt and hatred as that of a traitor.
