The three dice used are the Supreme Court, the Senate and the House of Representatives; and both are landing over the table with the most terrible earnestness depicted on the countenance of each. But it seems that Hayes played the old tricks of using dice.

THE Republican party evidently learned a lesson by the November election. Since the Florida decision many of their papers while feeling naturally excellent on the issue, have shown they are afraid to let their joy have full sway. They jump off with a rush, but catch themselves before half through, to provide for contingencies. This agonizing kind of joy is hard to bear. It saves them in one respect, however. Should the balance in the remaining disputed cases incline the other way, they won't have so far to fall.

MATT Carpenter seems confident of his ability to carry the Louisiana case for Tilden. It will be too easy, he thinks, for the Commission to swallow. There should be something in this, for Matt certainly has had an extensive experience in nasty things. But we were really not aware he had a costing to his stomach. We presume he refers to the copper case, which he has been testing "thousand years." It would not be safe to bet on that, for by this time it must be in a leaky condition.

PERHAPS the Democratic press that was in wild haste to denounce Senator Eaton for his opposition to the Electoral Commission, will now, under the Florida reverse, record him credit for more wisdom than they were then willing to allow. Those who will read his remarks as published in the Congressional Record, will find matter well calculated to back up and sustain his position. Roger Q. Mills, one of our notable Texas delegations, took the same ground, and sustained it by a forcible and logical argument that makes him the worthy peer of the best talent with whom he is associated. We, by no means, give up Mr. Tilden's case before the Commission, but mention these tried Democrats as most worthy the trust that has been placed in them. They could not be shaken from the honest conviction of right and duty. They deserve, and the future will bestow on them, a merited reward.

Justice Clifford is still joined to his old Democratic idols, and Justice Field has a brother—Globe-Dem.

The insinuation contained in the above paragraph strikes us in view of the facts as wholly unwarranted. Justice Field is the brother of David Dudley Field, a member of the House, and one of those who had charge of the Florida case for the Democrats. But because Justice Field in the sworn discharge of his duty, can not find it according to the law and to justice, and under the oath he took, to strain at a technicality and swallow a case "taunted with frauds and clouded with error," it is insinuated he has been best by the influence of his brother. It would be well if some such influence could impress those of the Commission, who have found themselves able to make the decision they have recorded in the Florida case. It would be as well also for the Republicans to bear in mind that the advantage they have in the Commission has been accorded them by the liberality of the Democratic Judges, Clifford and Field, who choose Mr. Bradley, when, if they had been partisans, would have insisted upon Judge Davis.

LOUISIANA.
We have always regarded the Louisiana case as much the strongest the Democrats could present. We confidently look for a favorable decision, after the points as indicated by the Democratic counsel in that case have been presented and argued before the Commission. It does not seem to us as easy to give a State to Hayes that was carried by his opponent by a majority of near 5000, as one in which the majority claimed by either side was not far from 100 votes. In the Louisiana case, Leveas, the ineligible elector, as proven by the Democrats, did not resign till after his appointment as an elector.

The Democrats propose to prove that according to the Statute of Louisiana the Returning Board, as constituted, had no authority to canvass the vote. That the law requires that the Board shall consist of five persons, taken from all political parties. That the Republicans also refused to allow a Democrat to be appointed. It will be shown, in answer to the charge of insinuation, that the vote cast in Louisiana last November was largely in proportion to the voting population, and larger even in proportion to the

registration, than in Northern States; that while Illinois cast 108 votes to every 127 males over twenty-one, Maine cast 100 votes to every 120 males over twenty-one, and New York cast 100 votes to every 118 males over twenty-one years, the returns show Louisiana, with bad roads and distant polling places, cast 100 votes to every 119 male persons over twenty-one years, and that while the vote of Democratic New Orleans was but slightly increased over 1874, the vote of the country parishes where intimidation was alleged was increased over 1,400 in two years.

THE COUNTING.

The country has seen, we venture to say with much regret, that in deciding the case of the Florida electoral vote, the Grand Commission has decided just on the line of party politics, Judge Bradley going on the side of his old antecedents. We are not sure that we fully understand the scope of the decision thus made. In the case of Florida, Governor Stearns gave a certificate of appointment to the Republican electors. There was then a recount ordered by the new Governor Drew, or by the Legislature, and a certificate was given to the Democratic electors. Then the Supreme Court of Florida affirmed the validity of this second order and certificate. The Democrats claimed that, inasmuch as the first certificate was obtained by a fraudulent manipulation of the returns, the Commission should go behind that certificate, and determine what electors were in fact chosen by the people of Florida. The Commission seems to have decided otherwise. They are reported as saying "that it is not competent under the Constitution and the law as it existed at the date of the passage of said act [the electoral law act] to go into the merits of the case." They are further reported as saying that "all the proceedings of the courts, or acts of the Legislature or the executive of Florida, subsequently to the casting of the votes of the electors on the prescribed day, are inadmissible for the purpose of showing that the certificate should not be given to the Republican electors. In other words, they seem to have decided that inasmuch as the Florida Republican electors had received a certificate in proper form from Gov. Stearns, and had thrown their votes for Hayes and Wheeler, no proof could afterwards be admitted to show that they were not honestly elected; and no action of the Legislature of Florida, or the Supreme Court of that State, in pronouncing the election fraudulent, or ordering a recount, or giving the certificate to other persons, could be of any avail.

If this is the real scope and intent of the decision, it is not easy to see how the Commission can avoid sustaining the decision of Governor Grover of Oregon in giving the certificates to one of the Democratic electors from that State. If such be the case Tilden would be elected, even if Louisiana is given to Hayes, unless the Commissioners, or a majority of them, retreat through a small hole, which they have perhaps reserved for that purpose, in what they decide concerning the case of the Florida elector, Humphreys, who was alleged by the Democrats to be the holder of a Federal office at the time of his election, and therefore disqualified.—The Commission decided that he was not a Federal office holder at the time; but add that they make the decision "without reference to the question of the effect of the vote of an ineligible elector," leaving possibly the question still open for decision whether they might not go behind the certificate of the Governor, if the Governor of Oregon, for instance had refused to give it to a Republican elector, on account of ineligibility, and had thereupon given it to a Democratic elector, who had not received a popular majority. It would be a small hole to crawl through; but politicians, and political judges can sometimes crawl through a pretty small hole, if necessary for party success.

It can hardly be said how far the rules laid down in the Florida case will apply, or control, that of Louisiana. In the latter case there is presented chiefly the question of enormous base-fraud on the part of the Returning board, known to and sustained by the Governor of the State, and a well proved conspiracy on the part of these officers and others to give the electoral certificate to the Republican electors without reference to the fact of election by the popular vote. The Democrats make a far stronger case, in the matter of fraud, and in some respects a different case from that of Florida. It presents in simpler form the question: Can certain State officials assist the people of their State out of the appointment of Presidential electors by substituting persons whom the people did not elect?

THE REASON WHY A BLIND AND Cripple FRENCH MILIONAIRE WAS ABLE TO DANCE AND SEE.

GOV. TILDEN ON HORSEBACK.

I had started on again, in a sort of brown study, when a solitary horseman turned the corner right in front of me. I looked up, and behold there was the very identical man. I had a chance to observe our ex-Governor's face after he passed, and a calmer or pleasanter face I have not seen for a long time. Not a shadow of anxiety, there, not a line indicating uneasiness or concern about the momentous proceedings in Washington. At all events, he won't allow anything in that line to deprive him of his regular two hours in the saddle, and he keeps the matter as far from him in his comfortable home, facing Gramercy Park, as the circumstances will allow. If Congress and the Electoral Tribunal decide the question against him, I much doubt if Gov. Tilden would lose one hour, or sleep in consequence.
