Vienna, Feb 16—A correspondent of the Times says it is the opinion of persons at St. Petersburg who agree with the Casar, that war is needless because the fall of Midhat Pasha marks the commencement of a state of anarchy which will eventually compel Europe to interfere.

General Ignatieff, who has arrived at St. Petersburg and conferred with the Casar and Prince Gortzshakoff, supports this view. The idea among the peace party seems to be that the Powers, in answering the Russian circular, might enable Russia to withdraw and await the result of the Turkish efforts at reform, by publicly recognizing the sacrifices which she has made in behalf of the Eastern Christians.
