Surprisingly enough, with all the hail and weather damaged cotton reported in all sections of this county and southern Parmer County, the cotton still turned out over 100,000 bales in Bailey County.

Professor combats math anxiety

COLLEGE STATION -The fear of math seems to develop during the junior high and high school years, says a Texas A&M University mathematics professor.

Dr. Norman W. Naugle notes that younger pupils, usually through the sixth grade. can do math problems with just a little help. Somewhere in between something happens and people lose their interest in math, says Dr. Naugle. Later in life, this creeps up as math anxiety and causes some students to fail math courses even though they may be perfectly capable in other areas.

To combat math anxiety. Naugle has developed a selfpaced program for those who may not have as an extensive high school math background as other students and who may need to work at a slower pace.



Texas A&M medical school trains rural doctors

COLLEGE STATION -Texas A&M University's College of Medicine, the state's newest, is designed to produce 'primary care" doctors — family, internal and general practitioners — for nonurban areas of Texas, where medical help has lagged in past years.

About 60 percent of Texas A&M's first medical school graduates are expected to enter such practice, but it will be 1981 before the first M.D. degrees

Texas A&M's medical students, who are vounger and score higher scholastically than the national average, receive two years of predominantly classroom training at College Station followed by two years of clinical training in Temple at Veterans Administration and Scott and White hospitals.

Economists Predict Good Farm Year

COLLEGE STATION --- Texas farmers ranchers face prospects of lower net incomes in 1980 than during the current year, an agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says.

Dr. Carl G. Anderson, marketing economist, says it simply boils down to costs increasing faster than farm prices.

He notes that cow-calf operators generally will fare a little better in 1980 than most other agricultural producers. Fewer calves and strong demand are expected to help hold prices near the averaged in 1979. An exception would be those ranchers of South and Southwest Texas who are hard-hit by the current summer and fall drought and are dispersing their entire herds.

Higher feed costs and the likelihood of a sluggish fed cattle market may mean that cattle feeders may find profit margins slim over the next 12 months, Anderson points out.

"Large supplies of competing meats, particularly pork and poultry, likely dampen any big rise in price of fed beef. The expected economic recession will increase unemployment and add to the cooling off of demand for beef," he predicts.

As a result of abundant supplies, hog, broiler and turkey prices are expected to remain low until late in 1980, when a possible reduction of output could

bolster markets. Lamb prices may run slightly less than in 1979 as total meat supplies are expected to be sizable. particularly in the first half of 1980. A small increase in U.S. lamb and mutton production is likely in 1980, with the inventory of sheep and lambs exected to be up from a year

Crop farmers of the state can expect 1980 price levels to remain near those of 1979. Little price change is foreseen average prices for cotton and grians, but soybean prices may weaken slightly as increasing world consumption failed to match this year's increase in production, says Ander-

The economist says vegetable supplies are up, causing market prices to weaken. And the plentiful supply of fruit and tree nuts points to moderately lower prices for producers until the 1980 crop size can be determined.

Anderson says production expenses for U.S. farmers moved up about 16 percent in 1979 and will probably incréase another

11 percent or more in 1980. "For irrigated farming in Texas, the increase will be much higher because of rising fuel and energy

costs," he points out. No let-up is foreseen in the rising price of energy and climbing inflation rates.

"Early this fail, prices paid by farmers for fuels and energy were 44 percent higher than a year earlier. Prices for tractors and other machinery were 11 percent higher, and for building and fenching. prices were up 10 percent. Interest rates on farm mortgages had jumped 25 percent during period," Anderson notes.

Farmers Face New Strategy

COLLEGE STATION --- Cotton, cotton everywhere--is pushing prices down. So farmers must sharpen their marketing skills to get the most for their crops.

"This year's bumper cotton crop in the U.S. will likely mean lower prices in the months ahead," says Dr. Carl Anderson, cotton marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & University System.

"All indications point to a sizeable increase in carryover stocks by August, the end of the marketing year."

According to the specialist, cotton prices held up fairly well during the summer and fall due to limited supplies from the 1978 crop, strong export late crop. However, larger supplies of 1979 crop cotton are entering the marketing channel as the harvest season progresses, causing downward pressure on prices.

Faced with this situation, what can producers

land

"They can follow sev-

eral strategies," points out Anderson. "One option is sell now and avoid storage and interest costs of holding cotton. Another is to establish a price and arrange delivery at some future date. A third strategy is to hold cotton and sell later. A final alternative is to put the cotton under CCC (Commodity Credit Crop.) loan programs and hope prices go up."

Producers must base their choices on a number of factors, such as anticipated price movements, financial positions and willingness to face the risk of lower prices.

"In making their marketing decisions, producers should consider the main forces that will affect market prices," says Andemand and this year's derson. "A big factor is that producers in Texas as well as most other states traditionally sell most of their cotton in December and January. This can cause a market glut in a matter of weeks."

> Anderson looks for the export demand for cotton to remain strong although sales could peak early.





Compensation Urged For Crime Victims

Senator Ron Clower (D-Garland) noted today that along with the beginning of a new year, legislation which he sponsored and passed during the last Session of the Legislature would become effective and would provide for the first time in Texas that monetary compensation from the State of Texas be made to individuals who are the innocent victims of crime.

"SB 21 which I sponsored", Clower said, "sets up a Compensation to Victims of Crime Fund which will be administered by the Industrial Accident Board. The fund began collecting monies September 1, 1979; and at present, there is approximately \$90,000 in the fund." "Awards from the fund". Clower commented, "would be made to victims (or their dependents) for financial losses suffered because of personal injury or death resulsonal injury or death resulting from the crime which must occur in Texas on or after January 1, 1980. The legislation also provides that awards can be made to private citizens injured while attempting to prevent a crime or apprehend a criminal."

"Under the program" Clower explained, "a person injured (or his or her dependents) could be awarded compensation up to a maximum of \$50,000 for the cost of 1) medical, hospital, nursing, or psychiatric care or counseling, and physical therapy; 2) loss of earnings not to exceed \$150 per week; 3) car of minor children, enabling either victim or spouse to work at a rate not to exceed \$30 per child per week up to a maximum of \$75 per week for any number of children; and 4) loss of support by dependent and funeral and burial expenses if the victim dies. Victims would not receive compensation for pain or suffering nor for loss of property, only for actual financial losses due to injury or death."

"To qualify for compensation" Clower said, "a victim will hve to be a Texas resident and will have to suffer 'financial stress' as a result of his or her injuries. The victim will also need to report the crime to the appropriate state or local public safety

or law enforcement agency within 72 hours after the crim is committed and file a claim with the Industrial Accident Board within 180 days after the date of the crime. Forms will be available from hospital emergency rooms, law enforcement agencies and the Industrial Accident Board," Clower further commented.

Clower added that "no state general revenues would be used for payments and that money for the fund would be generated by adding \$15 to the court costs for any felony conviction in the State and \$10 to the court cost for any misdemeanor conviction punishable by imprisonment or a fine of more than \$200." Clower pointed out that no additional court costs would be added to most traffic violations or any other Class C misdemeanor. "These additional court costs should generate the approximately \$2 million it is estimated that the program would cost each year. It is also estimated that about 3,000 claims will be filed the first year, that reimbursements are anticipated to awarded to about 1,200 of these crime victims and that the average award will be about \$2,400."
