THE DEVASTATING LOCUST.

We find in the Boston Globe a telegran from Washington, announcing that Sena ator Ingalis, of Kansas, has interested himself in the institution of a commission to ascertain the best means of destroying or providing sgainst, the locust plague The bill proposed to be introduced into Congress touching this matter appropriates \$25,000 for salaries and expenses of the Commission created, which is to con sist of five entomologists, to be appointed by the Secretary of the Interior, in connection with the United States Geological Survey. It is to examine particularly into the history and habits of the locust. The Territories and recently admitted States being more generally affected by the locusts than the older Western States, they were recently visited by Prof. Packard, who collected personally and derived from farmers and others a mass of new information concerning the ravages o these destructive insects. This, with new observations on the habits of allied lo custs in New England, will enable him to extend our knowledge of the distribu tion of this destructive locust, and will i great part furnish data from which he can begin the construction of a map sudica ting in colors its distribution and migrations. By conference with Professor Abbe of the Westher Signal Bureau, the facts observed seem to point to an intimate connection between the prevailing winds at different seasons and at different altisudes, which may offer an explanation of the actorishing extent of the migrations et locuste eastward, and the return in warms westward of the succeeding genration born in Kansas, Wisconsin, etc. It is the conclusion from study of the mi grations of the locusts in the Recky Mountain region that their periodical visits probably conclude with unufual seasom and that there are cycles of years securring favorable or unfavorable to insect life; and it is believed that it will yet be possible to predict the arrival of injurious insects, and so render it possible to provide for depredations by them. If we shall be able to predict a visitation of locusts on spoh a year in Kansas or No. braska, for metance, from meteorelogical crops as are most sought after by them, and increase those less liable to their ravages, and store them up for a year of the most polished period of the age of femure, as did the ancient Egyptians. This may seem visionary to some, but it indicated by the various chrows of the civilized Indians of Oklahoms. They propose an intermediate stage, for which the five years ago. There are in round numbers 300,000 inlians within the limits of the United
liates territory. Of these one-fifth are
sivilized, one-fifth balf-civilized, and at
east another fifth considerably above the
avage state. Oklahoma (the Indian

hirches, schools, and newspapers. Of
the 43,000 "citizens" of the various nabons which occupy that Territory some
200 are pure whites, married into the
libes or adopted in full council by tribal
axis about 3,000 are freedmen, mostly pure
lacks, and 10,000 of the class commonly
lifed "White Cherokees:" that is, con-

taining half or more white blood. The name must not mislead, as the Choctaws and Chickasaws have as many of the mixed families as have the Cherokees. This leaves 40,000 or more either full-blooded. Indians or with so slight an admixture of white blood that it is scarcely perceptible, The traveler along the cattle trails or main lines of road gets an erroneous impression as to this matter, as nearly all the hotels, stores, and offices are kept by the "white Cherokees." The full bloods usually live away from the roads and in the timber along the streams. To this 40,000 add the isolated tribes still resident in the States

and we have an aggregate of £0,000 civilzed Indians.
Of the half-civilized there are, first, the Pueblos of New Mexico and Arizona, num-bering about 20,000; the few Mission In-dians of California; the Nez Perces and kindred tribes of Oregon, and the various smaller communities in the border States. Perhaps a portion of the Utes and Nava-joes should be included in this class; they are at least above the barbarous condi-

tion, as they work in iron, wool, and leather, manufacture excellent blankets and pottery, have clearly defined ideas of personal property and private rights, and a tolerable well developed civil system. If we exclude from this class those who live about the agencies and cultivate the soil under direction of white officials; the aggregate will be smaller than above It would surprise some people who have

been indignant over the death of Custer and his companions to learn how small comparatively is the number of hostile Indians. A strip of 500 miles wide, from the Missouri to the Pacific, is rarely visited by hostiles; and at no time for the past ten years have more than one-lifth of the race been in arms or even threaten-ing. All the border States except Texas are free from hostiles. Of the nine Terri-tories only three have been seriously troubled since 1867, and the three Pacific States have had even a longer exemption.
Within that time I datan hostilities have
been confined to three districts. First, and greatest, is that strip of mountain forest, and desert including all Northern Wyoming, Southeastern and Eastern Mon-tana, and a small portion of Western Da-kota. Next are the highlands of Western Texas, raised by the Comanches and their allies; and lastly that part of New Mexico and Arizona dominated by the Apaches.
To judge how coatemptible a performance an ludian war is, how small the glory in proportion to the aggravation, be it noted that the whole Apache race numbers less than 8,000, and can not possibly mount

2,000 warriors.



Fac-Simile of the Wonderful Pie of Mechanism in Strasbourg Cathedral.

From the Boston Advertiser. A fac simile of the original a pos. tolic musical and astronomical clock in Strasbourg Cathedral, a curious and wonderful piece of mechanism, celebrated the world over, was opened at the Horticultural Hall yesterday. It is the work of a young clockmaker's apprentice, Fritz Von Engle, of Strasbourg, who, having conceived an idea of making a fac simile of the clock invented by Isaac Habricht, obtained permission from the sexton of the cathedral to copy it. After seven years close application to his self imposed task his work was completed, and so overjoyed was the young man that he became insane and died 6 months after. A disagreement rose among the heirs respecting the disposition of the clock, which was purchased about a year ago by the present proprietors for the sum of \$5,000 fn gold. The cleck stands on the base four feet front, three and one-feet deep, and ten feet tour inches high. The lower section has a dial representing the ancient zo. diac, with the stars of the first, second and third magnitude, with the signs of each month of the year-exhibited at the proper time and seasons, the dial making but one revolutien in the year, and but one half of it exposed at the time. About this, in each corner, are lions' heads, with rings in their mouths. Above this is another section, with a dial twenty two inches in dfame-ter, on which is represented on the outer circle the hours and minutes in the usual manner. Within are four dials, the month, day of the month, day of the week, and phases of the moon. In alcoves on either side of the frames are carved figures of Time and Justice. Above this are two Roman columns with capi tal, representing two rams' heads. On the top of the capital there stands a wolf watching the sheep. Above the dial is a key-stone, with a small door in the centre, with cherubim on either side guarding Wilson Sewing Machine Co. it. The top section is in the form of a Gothic chapel, with a small door on either side, and a large one over a stair in front in the centre, with a balcony over centre, and spires extending up either side. At every half bour is heard the tinging of a bell, and the door of the cey stone opens, showing the figure Death, followed by the music of organ. Three minutes after a hime of twenty bells is heard,

then from the right door of the chapel the Disciples come out in procession, when the centre opens and the Savior comes in sight. As the Disciples reach him they pause, one by one turn their faces and bow, except Peter, which is the central figure. The bow is recognized by the Savior, and immediate ly a cock perched on the right hand corner, flaps his wings and crows, when Satan appears and disappears in the balcony above. Meanwhile a Roman sentinel on the left of the procession has faced to ward it and remains until the procession has passed, when Satan appears again, turning his face in the direction of Judas. After Satan appears he is followed by the music of the organ, when the left door closes the scene. The Apostles come out once every half hour dur ing the day and evening.

The Richest Living New Yorker.

Peter Goelet, the eccentric old batchelor, of New York, is now probably the wealthiest living representative of the old families ot Gotham. His property is estimated at from twenty to thirty millions, the most of it having been made by trade. A French emigrant commenced the hardware trade before the revolution, and by hard work made money. Every dollar made was invested in farming lands a mile or more from the store down town, and for three generations this has been the rule. What was farming lands then is covered with six story buildings now, and what at first Goelet bought for \$20 an acre is worth to day bundreds of thou-

Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence.

Partial List of the Surviving Veterans

Forty one years ago yesterday, while the Spanish guns were booming through the San Antonio Valley and a storm of bullets were hissing over our city, while the long and terrible death struggle in the Alamo was in progress amid the shouts of defiance from within and the savage yells of the besiegers thirsting for blood. were rending the air without, and the was over all at the town of Washington, on the Brazos, a convention of the heroic sons of Texas declared their independence of the Spanish crewn.

Yesterday morning in honor of the fortyfirst anniversary of that heroic declaration, the old flag of the Republic of Texas-two bars, red and white, attached to a blue ensign bearing the "Lone Star"-was unfurled in front of the headquarters of the Texas war Veterans on Soledadistreet, nearly opposite the postoffice. And as the gray , veterans gathered under it and gazed with loving admiration upon the bright folds of the flag that had been baptized in their blood when strans swift and warm from their vains, strange stories of he C. Groesbeck, r f. could be heard from lips that are blunching now, but with age; in voices, tremulous now, but which once rang out in vigorous shouts, in wild hurrahs of war.

It was the intention of the veterans to parade yesterday morning; but the idea was abandoned on account of the muddy condition of the Streets, and no formal celebration was held. The veterans mostly ceased their labors however, and passed the day in "lighting their battles over again," their tales of life upon the tented field and the deadly charge, holding long Our active young friend, L.
