TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS

To be Invested in a Hotel in San Antonio.
That San Antonio needs a large hotel, no one can doubt when it is known that from one hundred and fifty to two hundred strangers arrive here daily. That we need a fine hotel, is evident from the fact that a large number of our visitors are people of wealth, who come here for pleasure or health, and who desire a place to stay where they can be provided with first-class conveniences. At present, our hotel accommodations are totally inadequate. But few of those who come here can secure apartments that satisfy them, and consequently many go away dissatisfied with the whole city, simply because they fail to find sufficient hotel accommodations.

But the present state of affairs promises to not exist long. We have two chances for redress of the present grievance, to say nothing of the improvements in the Menger Hotel now in progress. A Mr. J. S. Bennett of Philadelphia, representing a company of Boston capitalists, is corresponding with Messrs. Adams & Wickes, of this city, relative to the building of a large, commodious and elegant hotel in the city for the convenience of winter tourists especially, and in addition to this a scheme was started yesterday looking to the erection of a hotel here, the cost of which will reach, if not exceed, two hundred thousand dollars. This scheme is of such vast importance that our business men will regard it with favor; in fact, within two hours after it was first broached, \$45,000 of the amount was subscribed.

The matter will be pushed forward with energy, and it is believed the building will be ready to occupy by the first of January next.

RAID ON A CAMP OF THIEVES.

Four of the Rough Riders Captured.
Jim Quigley Ridicled with Bullets.
Monday last a portion of Capt. Caldwell's Rangers made a raid on a camp of thieves in San Antonio, Prio county. It has been known for a long time that a gang of thieves existed in that locality, but their number was so great that heretofore no one dared attack them. However, a favorable opportunity was at last presented, and a detachment of Rangers, aided by Mr. David M. Young, deputy sheriff of Atascosa county, made a raid on the camp, at 10 o'clock, Monday, and captured four of the thieves - Bill Berryman, charged with murder in Llano county, two named Short, charged with theft in Denton county, and James Quigley, who shot Jesse Campbell a short time ago. Quigley was captured on Sunday. While the arresting parties were guarding the road leading to the camp, where the thieves' horses were kept, Sunday, Quigley approached and was ordered to halt. Instead of doing so, he drew his revolver, and attempted to fire, when the rangers fired a volley into him which ridicled him with bullets. He was not killed outright, but cannot survive.

When the attack was made on the camp, two men, Ed Warren, and one named Wolf, ran into the brush and escaped. Their horses and saddles, however, were captured.
A few days ago a gang of thieves ran off fifty or sixty head of horses. The parties captured are now in the county jail at Prio.

THE AMERICAN ATHENS.

What Our City One Day Promises to Become.
Rome was not built in a day. San Antonio cannot expect to jump from an out-of-the-way town to a great city in a day, but that our population and material wealth is daily increasing in a greatly stimulated ratio, since the building of the railroad and the bringing of the many attractions of the city to the notice of the outside public, no observer can doubt. The increased demand for dwelling houses is one evidence of the fact of an increased population, and the number of large and elegant buildings in course of construction, is an evidence of increased prosperity.

Among other important improvements to be made soon, are an elegant residence for Mr. Joe Crosby, President of the Houston and New Orleans Railroad, who will have a splendid house and grounds on the river bank about one mile south of Main Plaza. In the same neighborhood, Mr. M. Marks, a prominent merchant of Galveston, has purchased a grand site for a family residence, and is having it built on the opposite side of the river. Mr. L. Bum, also of Galveston, one of the merchant princes of Texas, will erect an elegant house for his family. Several other wealthy gentlemen from the north and east are negotiating for land in or near this city, on which to erect homesteads.

Give us a good hotel, such as is now contemplated by some of our leading citizens, and place our streets and sidewalks in good condition, and our attractions will be so great that we will soon be the Athens of America, as far as society is concerned, and have a population and business that will make us the envy of the greatest cities of the country.

Military Matters.

A General Court Martial will convene at Fort Griffin, Texas, on Monday, the 10th day of April, 1877, at 10 o'clock A. M., or as soon thereafter as practicable, for the trial of such persons as may be properly brought before it. The following detail for the court has been made: Assistant Surgeon D. G. Caldwell, Medical Department; Captain R. L. Lee, 10th Cavalry; Assistant Surgeon G. W. Adair, Medical Department; Second Lieutenant T. W. Jones, 10th Cavalry; First Lieutenant S. R. Colady, 10th Cavalry; is appointed Judge Advocate of the Court.

Leave of absence for one month has been granted First Lieutenant L. P. Hunt, 10th Cavalry.
Another Grand Railroad Scheme.
We have received a map showing the route of Leon Lewis' proposed Mexican Pacific Railway along the northern coast of Central America from Ciudad-Yucatan to Mirlindian, and thence across lower Mexico to Acapulco, making almost a direct line. The enterprise is vast in magnitude and importance, so vast, in fact, that its advantage to the commerce of the world can scarcely be realized. We shall regard the progress of this grand scheme with the deepest interest.

THE FRIO CITY FIRE

The last, and, doubtless, the most reliable report concerning the fire at Frio City is to the following effect:
On Sunday, the County Clerk, Mr. McMahon, while looking over the books, etc. in his office, discovered that the county records were disarranged, and on further investigation he became satisfied that some one who was unauthorized to do so had effected an entrance to the office, and carried away some of the most important papers contained in the county records. As a precautionary measure, Mr. McMahon took the remaining papers, records, etc., to a place of safety, and they escaped the conflagration ensuing a few hours later. As yet, it is not definitely known what papers are missing from the records, but that interested parties had access to them before the fire, there can be no doubt. The fire was started, without doubt, by the thieves who desired to cover the traces of their crime.

Spiritual Retreat and Mission.

A spiritual retreat for the Catholic Clergy of the Diocese of San Antonio commenced yesterday at the residence of Bishop Pellicani. Twenty-five clergymen are in attendance. A mission for the congregation of St. Mary's Church will begin on Sunday next. It will be opened by a solemn Pontifical High Mass at 10 A. M., at 7 P. M. of the same day, there will be pontifical vesper in the same church. Father Tree, of New Orleans, will preach both the retreat and mission. He will preach at 9 A. M. and 7 P. M. during the mission.
