A \$25,000 LOAN PROPOSED
To Pay for the Improvement of 6th and Austin Streets.
The Finance Committee of the City Council have agreed upon a proposition to borrow the necessary funds to make the proposed improvements on 6th and Austin streets, the cost of which will probably reach \$25,000. The proposition provided for the issue of bonds to the amount deemed necessary to pay for the work mentioned, the said bonds to run for twenty years, and bear interest at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum. The committee believe, however, that the bonds should not be issued unless they realize, not at least 90 cents on the dollar.

Another Charge Against Horner.

Whiskey Seizure.
SINKENAY, O., April 21.—John H. Gaff & Co., distillers, at Lawrenceburg, Ind., are among the most noted firms of the kind in the United States. They are now in trouble. This morning United States Revenue Collector Will Cumback, seized 533 barrels of illicit whiskey in their establishment. They are licensed distillers, but have no rights as rectifiers. Out of 1,500 barrels of whiskey in their establishment, 533 were found to be doctored, with burnt peach and sugar. The seizure has created quite a sensation in whiskey circles, wherever known.

A Retic of Chickamauga.
Left at the Times editorial room last night, a brass eagle from the tip of a United States flag, which was picked up on the battle field of Chickamauga. The eagle belongs to a private of the infantry regiment in the 21st Army Corps, and probably to an Ohio regiment. News comes that Dolan has caught the Indians and got nine of our horses. We recaptured three. Some of the Indians were killed. J. M. HOLMES.
Fourteen horses were stolen from this farm, and eight of these have been recaptured.

A dispatch was received in this city stating that the body of M. E. Woolman was found on his ranch near Fort Clark, and that his head had been murdered. It is not known whether he was killed by the raiders or not, but it is thought so, as no demonstrations were made by them in that vicinity.

The troops and armed citizens are no doubt still in hot pursuit, if they have not already killed or captured the Indians, and we may confidently expect to hear of bloody work soon.
