London, May 3.—The Daily News' Paris correspondent says a message from Vienna gives the following account of the battle of Karz: "The center of the Russian army, 40,000 strong, under Melikäff, attacked Muhktor, five miles from Karz. on April 29th. The Turks-fonglat-desperately. The Russians, supported by powerful ar tillery, succeeded in dislodging them from their position. Muhktor called out all his reserves and attempted, on the 30th, to recover the lost ground, with 60,000 men, but was defeated and driven back under the guns of Karz. The Russian losses were considerable and those of the Turks were enormous. from various parts of the country, with fifty wagons, left Bismarck for the Hills March 23. At Cannon Ball River dissatisfaction was expressed by many over the slow movement, and a party of five, consisting of Tyler, Faddock and Frank Raymond, of Northfield, Minn.; C. O. 
