As previously stated, the capacity of this mill is to treat an average of 600 yards of finished goods per day of ten hours labor. The casimere manufactured here is of the finest quality, and is very much appreciated by the public. The mill is situated in the north-eastern part of New Braunfels, on the south bank of the Comal. It is powered by steam, thirty-six horse power, and is supplied with water by the Comal. The machinery embraces every appliance for a complete two-twenty mill, two sets of carding machines, two sets of mangle rollers, and 5 single looms. A brief description of the process of manufacturing may not be out of place here. The wool is first cleaned by the Comal, and is then washed in the Comal. The wool is then carded by the Comal, and is then pressed. The wool is then spun on jacks, each jack having 300 spindles. The warp threads are then spun on jacks, and are then woven on a loom. The cloth is then finished by the Comal, and is then ready for market.

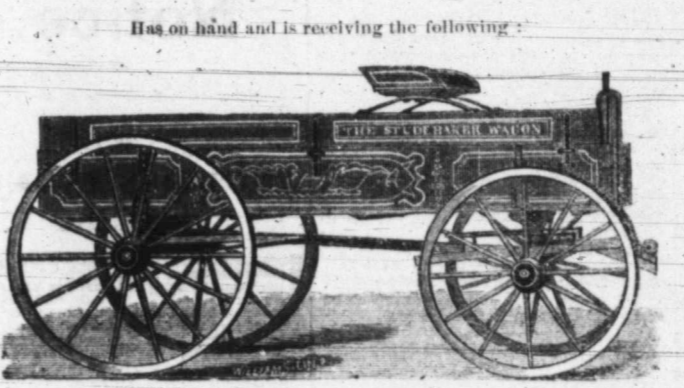

RELEASED FROM JAIL. He was not the Man who Murdered the Minister. Two weeks ago Monday night last, Chas. Williams was arrested on a charge of assaulting a woman named Louisa Harris.
