FROM EUROPE.

London, May 23.—The Daily Telegraph's Paris dispatch says a portion of the Arabian garrison took the road to Andonitoch, having cut its way through the Russian columns, which succeeded in intercepting it.

The Russians are said to have closed in upon the rear of Batoum, which is once more seriously threatened.

Berlin, May 23.—The North German Gazette states that Russia has declared to Tunis that if military or pecuniary aid is rendered to the Sultan, the Bey must prepare to see his capital bombarded.

The government is also disgusted by the concentration of a French force on the frontier.

London, May 23.—A Vienna dispatch to the Daily Telegraph announces that the Austrian government's attitude is directed on the increasing agitation in Hungary.

There is an eager clamor for war amongst all classes.

Paris, May 23.—It is said forty Legitimate Senators, dissatisfied with the government's intentions concerning clerical questions, have decided to join the left in refusing to grant a dissolution.

London, May 23.—A Vienna dispatch to the Daily Telegraph says that the Sultan is promising a lull war against Russia, and the almost simultaneous announcement that the Sultan for the Danube has been decided upon, would somewhat show that the advice of those who all along looked upon the present struggle as one of existence for the Ottoman Empire has gained the ascendancy in the council of the Porte.

The Times' Paris dispatch has the following: France will doubtless pronounce overhwhelmingly against President MacMahon at the election on Friday if the Senate gives a majority in favor of dissolution which is very doubtful.

Refusal of the Senate to authorize the president would inevitably cause MacMahon's resignation.

London, May 23.—The Times' Bucharest dispatch says it is believed Russia will first recognize the independence of Rumania and that Germany, France and Italy will follow. England and Austria are expected to delay recognition.

From Washington.

Washington, May 23.—The letter of resignation of Chief Justice Lewis of Washington Territory proves to be a forgery, and the appointment of Associate Justice Green to the place, made yesterday, is withdrawn.

General Wharton has been appointed United States Attorney for the District of Kentucky, Vice H. F. Finley removed.

Washington, May 23.—The appointment has been made of W. H. Lusk as collector of the port at Annapolis, Md., vice Clark resigned.

A Philadelphia delegation waited on the President to-day. They desire a change in the Federal offices there.

Key knows nothing confirmatory of the report that his second and third assistants are to be honored.

Governor Tom Young assured the President that if his second and third assistants are to be honored, there would not be a thousand Republicans in Ohio dissatisfied with it.

The Secretary of War has returned to Washington.

Dr. William P. Jones succeeds Dr. Rawl as postmaster at Nashville, who, the Star says, is removed for cause.

Indian Commissioner Smith will be absent two months, inspecting the agencies.

They are promoting the mission to Belgium to General Harbridge, of Kentucky.

Senator David Davis is critically sick at Bloomington, Illinois.

Blaine was at Wichita Falls again this morning. He wants to have John L. Thomas made collector of customs at Baltimore.

Postmasters South and West complain of silver accumulating on their hands.

They are compelled to take it in sums of dollars for stamps and report otherwise. Jesse W. Jackson has been appointed Internal Revenue agent for the district of Georgia and Alabama, vice Al. W. B. Clark resigned.

The counties of Rockdale and Newton are transferred from the 3rd to the 2nd Georgia district. A. Clarke, collector of the second Georgia district, has permission to make a new bond so as to release the old bondsmen, who desire it.

Church Matters.

Baltimore, May 23.—In the Methodist Conference, the boundaries of North Carolina were changed so as to include Greenfield, West Virginia. The Committee on Boundaries reported concerning Pittsburgh, West Virginia and North Carolina districts, and recommending the abolishment of the Tennessee and North Carolina districts, as they were included in other districts. The reports were discussed at length without action.

Chicago, May 23.—A telegram has been received from the Presbytery Assembly South in session at New Orleans, which says the Southern Assembly disapprove of that part of the Northern Assembly's grounds which contain references to the main part of their paper sent to Brooklyn from Savannah, and says if our brothers of the Northern Church can meet us on these terms, which are just and righteous, we consent to require, then we are ready to establish such relations with them during the present session of the Assembly.

Baltimore, May 23.—Pittsburg has been selected as the next place of meeting of the Methodist Protestant Convention. Consideration of the report of the Committee on Boundaries and the report adopted. The District of Michigan, West Virginia, Indiana and Kentucky remain unchanged. Other districts in the North, South and West, with a few unimportant changes, remain the same.

Cleveland, Ohio, May 23.—The Reindeer Insurance Company organized in 1873 with \$200,000 capital, has resolved to discontinue business.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 23.—Davis Chambers & Co. have had work done on their premises. Loss one hundred thousand dollars.

Philadelphia, May 23.—Carpent weavers of J. & J. Dabson's mills at Falls, Schuylkill county, who have been on a strike for a month, resumed work yesterday.

Chicago, Ill., May 23.—The large three-story brick block at Cedar Rapids, Mich., belonging to Moolty & Preston, fell on Monday. Seventeen men injured, and of whom one was killed, and four or five were mortally wounded.

New York, May 23.—Meeting Directors Bank of Commerce resolved to reduce stock from ten to five millions.

Washington, May 23.—Indications for the West Gulf States—Slight changes of pressure or temperature, northeast to southwest winds, and clear or partly cloudy weather.

Richmond, N. Y., May 23.—W. H. G. Hosmer, the poet, is dead.

Simcook, N. Y., May 23.—Wm. Flannery, aged seventeen, while intoxicated, shot his step father fatally. Some of the neighbors were his mother's hand off.

New York, May 23.—Mrs. Steinbecker died Monday from poison, which was in consequence of a quarrel with her husband. To-day Steinbecker shot himself fatally.

A Railroad Stock Excitement.

New York, May 21.—Lake Shore has been a feature of the stock market this afternoon, opening at 51 and fluctuating rapidly with a declining tendency and closing at 49 at close, having sold during the afternoon as high as 52.

The excitement is attributed to a rumor in Chicago that Vanderbilt has telegraphed from Europe to reduce the passenger rate from Chicago to New York to fifteen dollars on account of the starting of a fast train on the Pennsylvania railroad. This rumor cannot be verified.
