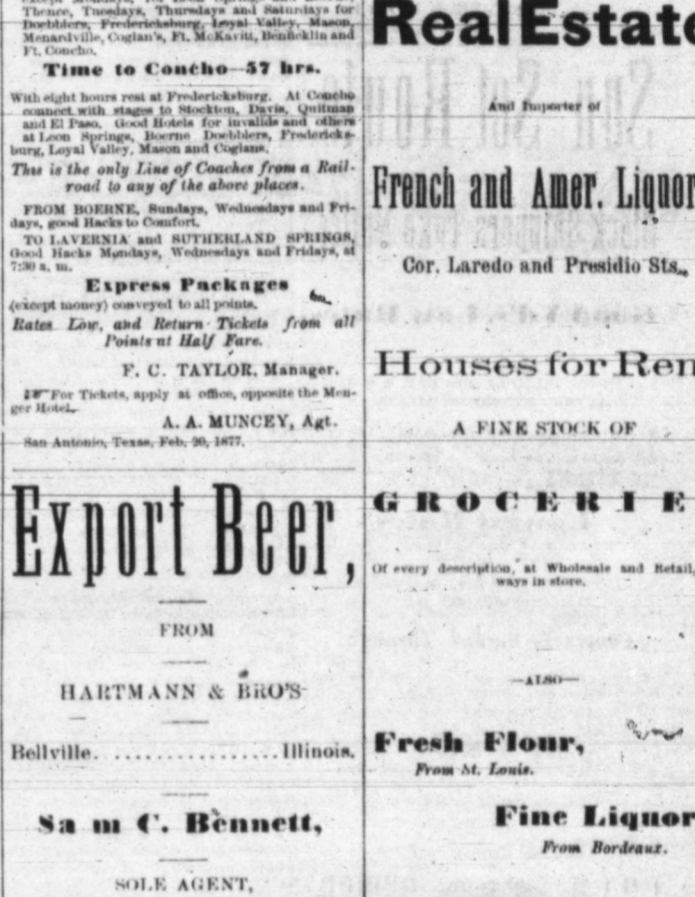
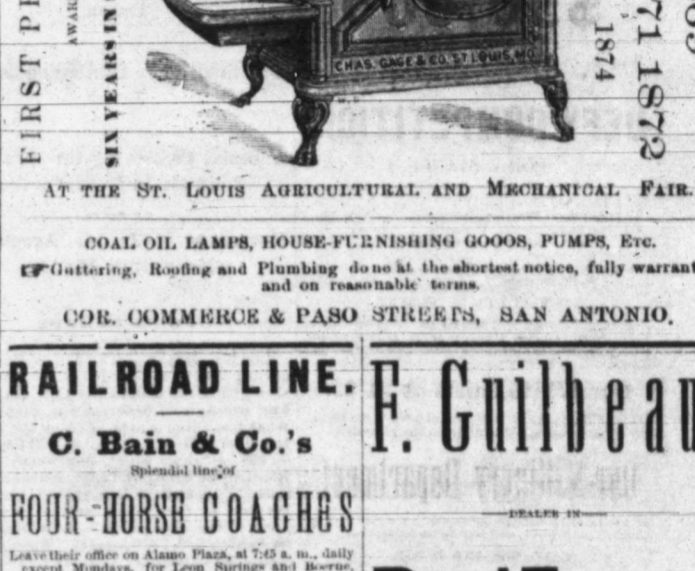
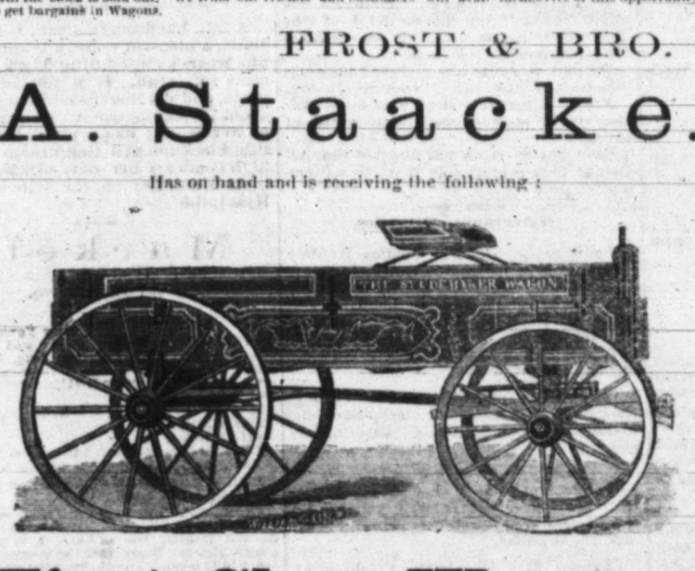

Chinese Adopting Yankee Notions. The self-complacent contempt of the Chinese for the invention and manufacture of outside barbarians is gradually diminishing through intercourse with foreigners. For instance, the Celestials have almost wholly abandoned the old flint and steel apparatus for lighting fires, and now import thousands of boxes of lucifer matches. The old paper umbrellas of the country have been almost superseded by the European article, and the manufacture of umbrellas has become an important business in Canton. Clocks and watches of great value and of various kinds are largely imported; foreign needles and thread are highly ap-preciated; woolen socks and mittens are very generally worn, and the keratine and other mineral oils have been introduced, with lamps suit-able for burning them. A New Southern Product. A gentleman has brought to the Times office a sample of St. Elmo moss, an entirely new article which the inventor manufactures from one of the commonest of Southern pro-ducts. It is in reality the leaves of the yellow pine tree, prepared by a cheap and ingenious process, so as to bear a close resemblance to tow or moss. Upon examining it we find that the pulpy matter having been removed, there is left a straight, soft and moderately strong fibre, which, while it has the pun-gent odor of the pine, is not in the least resinous or inclined to become solid and lumpy. Lighter than moss, and less liable to become infested by vermin, this moss, if durable, must prove of great value as a substitute for hair in mat-tresses, paddings and cushions, while its small cost and unlimited source of supply must place it with in the reach of the poorest of our people.

A Child Attacked by an Eagle.

We are informed that about four days ago a child was attacked on Grosse Tete by a large eagle. It was the evident intention of the eagle to seize and carry the child off, but his efforts were thwarted finally by persons who heard the screams of the child and its mother, and came to the rescue with pistols, shotguns and clubs. Upon hearing the screams of the child, its mother ran out of her house into the yard, and when she discovered the eagle endeavoring to carry off her child, she commenced a desperate attack upon the intruder to save the child. During the fight between the eagle and the mother the child crawled under the house, and finally the mother was forced to retire, as the eagle fought with unusual desper-ation. Several persons were attracted to the spot by the screams of both mother and child, and after firing several shots at the eagle he was finally killed. The eagle was very large, but we did not learn from our informant his exact size.—Baton Rouge (La. Advocate).

Seventeen Year Locust.

A dispatch from Greenbush, New York, says: The seventeen year locust has made its appearance in Rensselaer County. The last time it appeared here was in 1820, and it also prevailed in several other places in 1843. The insect may be seen making its way out of the ground in the fields and woods. It emerges as a grub, coming out of the ground late first. It soon de-velops wings, and at once seizes a tree, where it renews the ravages of its predecessors of seventeen years ago. When fully grown the insect is about an inch and a half long, and resembles a beetle. Its head is plainly marked with a letter W, in white streaks. They dig deep grooves in the branches of the trees and the foliage soon turns yellow. In 1820 the insect made its appearance in June, and in a short time the forests and orchards were as dead looking as in November. Some people insist that the seven-teen year locust has a fatally poi-sonous sting, but the falsity of that was proved in 1820. The insects keep up a shrill din day and night. Appearing so early in the season, it is feared that they will entirely de-stroy the fruit crop.

Probable Effect of Flooding the Desert of Sahara.

As has already been noted, the proposition is seriously made to form a sea of the desert of Sahara by cutting a channel to the waters of the Mediterranean—an enterprise regarded as entirely feasible, more so, in fact, than the cutting of the isthmus of Darien, which may be said to be an assured project. A German scientific writer, however, goes so far as to assert that the Sahara project, if carried out, would eventually turn Europe into another Greenland. He alleges that the diversion of the Gulf Stream, by the cutting of the Suez canal, has already begun to have an influence on the climate of Europe, and that the covering of the burning sands of the great African desert with water would destroy the hot winds, which are necessary for the melting of the Alpine snow and ice, and would finally result in a glacial formation that would overwhelm Italy. He instances the changes in climate in Australia and New Guinea by the deviation of a warm current of water which form-ally ran through Torres Straits, and the growth of a coral mass, as a practical illustration of his theory.

The following is a Moslem view of the war in Turkey: The feeling of the Turks in regard to the war is well illustrated in a conversation which a correspondent of the Augs-burg Allgemeine Zeitung held with a Turkish merchant in Rastehk just before the outbreak of hos-tilities. "Said the merchant: "It seems that not only the Russians, but also the rest of the nations want to drive us out of Europe into Asia, in order to get possession of lands which have been ours for centuries. It is possible that this may be brought about, but it is as certain as it is natural that we shall resist it. To this end we have bent all our energies at whatever sacrifice. We will spend the last dollar and the last man to prevent the outrage. To protect ourselves touches the highest interests of mankind; it concerns our faith, the soil that nourishes us, the roof over our heads, the care and health of our children. Inspired by this thought, we will fight, and if we must we will fall and enter the paradise of our fathers. But if the Franks think they can make laugh-ing stocks of us and put off their onslaught till they are in a better position to attack us, they are very much mistaken. We cannot stand forever on the banks of the Danube expecting their hostilities, and we will not. We will have either an honorable and lasting peace or a fierce and decisive war, and one of the two we know how to extort by force."

Somebody writes to the World: "No wonder Bayard Taylor had the blues when he wrote his letter con-cerning the small profits arising from literary work. He had prob-ably seen the sign in Broadway, between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, which reads: Poets, 75 cents each. Think of that—79 a dozen for poets! One poet, that—was a dozen, is as valuable as another. Take those extremes of excellence, Long-fellow and Bret Harte, each alike 75 cents. Historians are not quoted; probably they would bring \$1.25 each, maybe \$12 a dozen.

Some of the Spanish papers are advocating the suppression of the bull fights, and are publishing an eloquent appeal to the Cortes al-lowed that it may be declared illegal to allow horses to take part in them. There are 100 bull rings in Spain, and only twelve saving banks. Several of the towns which have recently built rings have no schools.
