THE ST. LOUIS GLOBE DEMOCRAT ON GEN. ROBT. TOOMBS.

The Globe Democrat with an article headed "Still Bilious" says: "It has been nearly seventeen years since Mr. Toombs of Georgia, stood on the platform of Faneuil Hall, in Boston, to assure the people of Massachusetts that if they elected an Abolitionist President the South would withdraw, and that then the poverty-stricken, unproductive remnant of the Union, which existed chiefly through the exuberant bounty of the South, would sink into poverty and decay."

What we did not value as a defense of Mr. Toombs against the thrust made at him in the extract above quoted, yet we cannot refrain from indulging in a courteous notice of the statements made even though it be at the risk of being considered ultra in our Southern sympathy and feelings.

"Nearly seventeen years since," when Mr. Toombs put the people north upon notice that secession would be resorted to by the South, in the event of the election of an Abolitionist as a test of sectional triumph, he meant just what he said, and the sequel showed he was right.

The letter of this distinguished gentleman and soldier, written in May last to Col. Duncan, of Louisville, Ky., though not intended for the public, yet found its way into the columns of the Louisville Commercial, and was copied very generally and drew forth from the press considerable attention. The letter referred to has been brief and not designed for publication, but the friend to whom it was addressed, has caused the General to address another very brief letter to the subject, explanatory of his former, which we take pleasure in copying.

AN EXPLANATION OF HIS RECENT COMMUNICATION TO COL. BLANTON DUNCAN.

New Orleans, May 26, 1877.—I notice that in your issue of yesterday you reproduce from the Louisville Commercial the letter I wrote hurriedly on the 10th inst. to Col. Blanton Duncan, of that city, in reply to one from him relating to the present war between the States and Turkey, in which I gave him, in a few words, the synopsis of a plan of defensive campaign for the latter power. My letter, which was intended for publication, was reproduced by a few complimentary remarks on the part of the editor of the Commercial in which he states:—"In 1860 the sovereign Prince of Romania tendered to Gen. Beauregard, then in Paris, the command of his army. He then offered him the rank of Field Marshal, with a liberal outlay of \$100,000 a year pay. Gen. Beauregard was to be at liberty to select his own staff, and the army was to be kept at 100,000 men, etc."

Why the Globe-Democrat gets his "check" upon the occasion of Gen. Toombs' little harangue at the Hot Springs we cannot divine, unless the editor of that paper has another feeling of bitterness against this section, which like a torpedo, explodes when touched by its own showing, as Mr. Toombs' little harangue speech. Yet the editor declares that "Toombs is merely an extreme case of a common complaint." Yet he takes the advantage of the "extreme case" to deliver himself of the following extraordinary language:

"We should like to ask the Southern orator, who seconded Toombs, and applaud his utterances, why it is that he has not from Oregon or Maine or Michigan can speak of the Union as a whole, and can treat of political questions without indulging in sectional bitterness and biliousness, while the Southern orator invariably treats of the Union as a badly soldered junction of two dissimilar parts, and never aims to speak of more than one part or to think of more than one?"

Surely the editor is grievously afflicted with the disease he attributes to Mr. Toombs—viz: "biliousness." The readers of the Globe-Democrat are told frankly that "Mr. Toombs is merely an extreme case," and yet almost in the same paragraph he speaks upon the occasion of Mr. Toombs' speech to remind anew the old feelings of sectionalism north by charging that "the Southern orator invariably treats of the Union as a badly soldered junction of the dissimilar parts, &c. Now let us try the logic of our clever but unjust cotemporary. If the South is to be condemned because of Mr. Toombs' speech, why is not the North condemned because of Morton's letter? If the logic is good in one case, why is it not good in the other? Might we not with propriety suggest that ample work is nearer home than Georgia, or even the South, when he seeks to eradicate sectionalism. First purge your own section of the political heresy of sectionalism by remedying your Mortons and Blaines, and then can you undertake the conversion of our "unreconstructed Job Toombs." We will say it again, and yet not momentarily, we gain nothing by calling up the sad struggles of the past. We struggle for the present and the future of our country, our whole country and all her interests. And whilst we deprecate all sectionalism and sectional controversies, and, however national may be the feeling of the Southern people, their local attachment is undying. And when assailed by our northern friends with the charge of "sectional," we cannot avoid harping back the unjust imputation with the kindly reminder to our cotemporary of the Globe-Democrat "that people living in glass houses must not throw stones."

My letter to Col. Duncan, covering only two pages of manuscript, could not, of course, contain a very elaborate plan of campaign, so no mention is made of the war for armies numbering about half a million of men on each side. I will add, however, that before the region north of hostilities the Turks had in Europe (excluding the Danube line proper) four defensive lines, such as the following:

1. Along the northeastern frontier of Rumania, from the Carpathian Mountains, near Vostok, to the Sereth River; behind the latter to Galatz, on the Danube; thence, in the rear of this river, to the Black Sea—a total distance of about 150 miles, protected almost entirely by a mountain range and two rivers.

2. In the rear of the broad Danube to Chernovitz, thence along the railroad to Kertch, on the Black Sea, near the mouth of the old Trajan wall, whose length was only about forty miles.

3. The naturally strong and almost impregnable Balkan Mountains, so celebrated in the Roman wars.

4. Across the narrow and mountainous peninsula from the Sea of Maroma, at or near the strait of Kanakaj, to the Black Sea—a distance less than 25 miles, which, properly fortified, could be defended by less than 100,000 men against all the available forces of Russia, so long as she is not mistress of the Black Sea. Indeed, I venture the prediction that she will never get permanent possession of Constantinople unless her fleet shall have entire control of the Black Sea and of the Bosphorus, for she could not otherwise protect her flanks and her lines of communication, which would be immeasurably long and vulnerable at almost every landing point of the Black Sea.
