Letter from Rev. J. W. Neil.

The following letter from Rev. J. W. Neil, written just before sailing from New York will interest his many friends and parishioners here:

New York, June 15th, 1877.

DEAR SIR: - I promised to drop you a line from here, to let you know how we got on thus far. We made the quickest trip to St. Louis that had ever been made from San Antonio, (48 hours) reaching St. Louis Wednesday morning. Had I come, right on, I would have reached New York Thursday night at 6 o'clock. But we concluded to lay over in St. Louis, and rest a day, and on Friday we took the Plains House and spent all day there. I found Dr. Nichols had left Monday and called from this port on Tuesday, and will not be back until Saturday. Wednesday night we came on until we got to Indianapolis. There I parted with Mrs. Neil and John. They went to Danville, where they arrived (Thursday) at 5 o'clock, as I learned by telegram awaiting me here. I came on and reached here this morning at 10 o'clock. I found Mr. Norton's friend (Mr. Gamble). We went to the office of the Anchor Line and I paid my passage (\$400) for. Our ship sails to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock. I am staying at the Astor House. This afternoon I rode out to Central Park, saw the Great Eastern Depot, Postoffice & Co. building, and returned at 5 o'clock. I am already feeling better, and hope to be much improved by my trip. I hate to leave my school without a shepherd, and I think that his road shall be second to none in the style of its equipment. The two cars are of the Wagon Manufacturing, and are named respectively "The T. W. Peiro" and "The T. W. Peiro." I have some complaint to our city. They are very handsome outside; inside they present a most inviting appearance, being fitted with the large revolving chairs, covered with rich heavy plush, while the woodwork is solid mahogany. The windows are large, of French plate glass, five being sufficient for the purpose. The cars are 40 feet long and 14 feet from the track to the top of the cars, weigh 25 tons, seat 20 persons, including the station room, and cost \$10,000 each. Railroad men who examined these cars asserted that few, if any, other cars of the kind furnished more costly than these.

Boer's Items.

Dr. F. Peterson, who is now located at Boerne, returned to San Antonio yesterday.

F. E. Standebach, the sheriff of Kendall county, is in the city. He comes fully equipped to capture our District Judge, whom he intends "consulting" regarding the new Kendall county jail, that His Honor does not include any interest that may be considered due, on account of any omissions of former city administrations in the premises pertaining to this matter, and under the circumstances having laid so long in a dormant state, as it were, did not go into the matter of accrued interest, but strictly adhered to obtaining figures for the face of the records, that whatever interest may be due and accrued, can be credited to the public school fund as the same is paid hereafter.

The annual interest upon \$10,000, say at not less than 6 per cent. per annum, would yield \$600, which would be annually appropriated from the City Treasury, to which may be added \$2,000 from the State, say \$5,000, will aggregate \$3,600 per annum for the support of the school fund, which would be a sufficient amount for such purposes for the present.

The committee recommend in order to make a final disposition of the result of their investigation of the city indebtedness to the "City Public School Fund," that an ordinance be drafted recognizing and admitting the amount of \$10,000 to be the principal due the school fund, and in this way the matter can be definitely settled, and the amount of \$10,000 be submitted an ordinance for your consideration.

AN ORDINANCE To define, adjust and regulate the "City Public School Fund" and to prescribe the duty of the City Clerk in relation thereto.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio,

Section 1. That all moneys derived from the sale of city lands heretofore sold or hereafter to be sold, in accordance with Section 4 of the charter of 1867 and acts of the Legislature subsequent thereto, and hereby declared to belong to the "City Public School Fund."

Sec. 2. That the amount now due the "City Public School Fund" as ascertained and reported by the Finance Committee, from the books and records of the city, amounting to \$10,000.00, be, and the same is hereby declared to be, the principal of the "City Public School Fund," and shall be entered upon the books of the city accordingly.

Sec. 3. That it shall be the duty of the City Clerk heretofore, as the principal of the said fund, commencing February 28, 1878, to credit the "City Public School Fund" with 6 per cent. interest on the balance that may be due the said fund at that date; provided, that for the present fiscal year interest shall be computed from the date of the 28th of February, 1878, and credited immediately upon the passage of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. That all appropriations of money from the city treasury on account of the city public schools shall be appropriated from the contingent fund and charged to the contingent fund of the City Public School Fund; and that this ordinance, take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

The Recent Fight near Devil's River.

A correspondent of the News, writing from Del Rio, Kinney county, gives the following account of the recent fight near Devil's River:

The Diaz soldiers, three hundred strong, drove Col. Pedro Valdez's men, seventy in number, about the Rio Grande, about fifteen miles above the mouth of the Rio Grande, on Monday morning. The Diaz party left the river and marched into Texas about ten miles, and went to camp at the mouth of the river. Some got to their horses and saddled them, and others mounted the first horse they came to, while many more took to the rocks and hid themselves.

Those who could, came down the El Paso road as fast as horse flesh could carry them, and reached the soldiers' camp at Del Rio, U. S. A., now has them in charge. Lieut. Evans and Dr. Comery were sent out to the scene of action with the aid of the great presence of the enemy was a volley of musketry. Not a sentinel had been posted or a vidette put out to warn them of the approach of the enemy.

Some got to their horses and saddled them, and others mounted the first horse they came to, while many more took to the rocks and hid themselves.

The Diaz party lost in the engagement, fifty men wounded and six or eight missing, two horses and seventeen beef cattle. There is a party of Mexicans now looking for the Diaz soldiers, and it may be possible they will find and capture some of them.

Col. Valdez ordered his troops to meet him in Eagle Pass, but the Diaz party refused to move by the military. The capture of the Diaz men have for going to sleep without having sentinels posted, so that they were on neutral ground and did not think the enemy would follow them. The opposite bank of the Rio Grande is very high. Scouting parties are looking for the Diaz soldiers, and so far has been very quiet in San Felipe.

Report of the Finance Committee Concerning City Public School Funds.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

GENTLEMEN: - In accordance with the recommendations of the Honorable the Mayor, in his last annual message to the City Council, your committee have the honor to report the result of their investigation into the matter to-wit:

The committee have diligently examined the records in the Mayor's office, and find that they show the city is indebted to the city public school fund \$10,000.11 per cent. interest on the city lands sold heretofore. The ledger account of sales of city lands exhibits on the 27th March, 1877, a credit of \$7,923.63 as principal, and an interest account \$3,672.34, aggregating \$11,595.97 outstanding to the credit of the city public school fund.

From October, 1857, to December 31, 1860, there appears to have been paid to the school fund, on account of city lands sold, \$19,262.30, which the committee believe to be the correct amount. There are no records or evidence from which could be obtained more definite data; there is nothing evidencing that any money had been paid on or expended for the school fund, hence the committee were in doubt as to what is really the current amount of the school fund during that period. Believing that some expenditures must have occurred on this account, the committee have concluded to include this item for want of exact figures to support their report.

The committee find from the same book, and in the report of three years ago, collected and paid to the City Treasurer during the late war, but in Confederate money, which of right ought to have been accounted for, to the credit of the school fund, which doubtless went into the general fund for the maintenance of the city government, and the fact that Mayor Thielsch recovered this amount, hence the committee did not entertain anything that transpired during the war by the city government, relating to this matter, and therefore respectfully recommend to the Hon. the City Council to let it stand as a closed account, so far as the interest of the school fund is concerned, as between the city and the tax-payers, the general results were mutual. There appears to have been made by the city government, during the late war, a period of four years, when the State received the city of its charge of the public schools. During that time, the receipts
