## Miner crawls to safety

Ronald Adley, trapped in a tiny, underground cell last Tuussday, crawled to safety early Sunday hours before two fellow miners were found dead and tests left little hope for the survival of five <br> The developments took place as an atmosphere of bitter tension and sor- cow developed outside the Kocher row developed outside the Kocher Coal Co.'s Porter Tunnel mine here. Dozens of persons have kept an around-the-clock vigil here since Tuesday, when a wall of water swept through the mine, splintering and The two bodies were found within 70 feet of the closet-size cavity where Adley, 37, spent 116 hours. Rescue workers slipped down his escape tun- nel and found the body of Ralph Renninger, 40, Donaldson, Pa., lying atop a huge pile of debris. $\qquad$ was found under a four-foot pile of loose coal farther down the passage. It brought the known death toll to four. Asked how Adley had survived and the others had not, Sam Klinger, a company mine foreman, said, a miracle, that's all I can say. <br> Adley, the father of two, refused to <br> have been offered $\$ 10,000$ for exclusive rights to his story. He ap- parently was in as good physical condition as could be expected after such broken bones or open wounds. <br> Walter J.
