

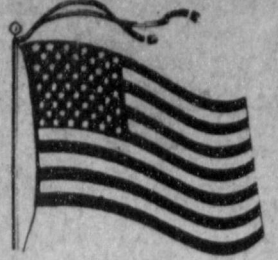

City Rebate Check Down For April: Up For Year

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said city sales tax rebates for April totaled \$24.1 million, about \$10 million less than Texas cities received in April last year.

He said 1980 rebate payments of the optional one-percent city sales tax from the first of the year now total \$162.8 million, compared to rebates of \$135.2 million over the same period in 1979.

Because year-to-year payments are up over last year, it's too early to say whether the decreased monthly payments reflect a downward trend in taxable sales or simply seasonal adjustments, Bullock added.

"The next couple of months bear special attention and may give us a clear x-ray about what's happening and what to

City Receives \$12000 Grant For Planning

A grant in the amount of \$12,000 has been made to the City of Muleshoe, by the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) for improving the city's planning and management capacity, according to Sidney M. Wieser, executive director of TDCA.

The program, according to Governor Bill Clements' office, requires a local match of one-third of the project cost and is to be completed by June 30.

In announcing the grant, Wieser, said the grant will be administered by his department, and is made available through the '701' Comprehensive Planning Assistance Program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Morton shows a minus eight percent for the year with \$15,045.11 rebated through April last year, reduced to \$13,793.08 at the same month this year.

Farmers Feel Lack Of Adequate Supply

Although heavy clouds and wind heralded the approach of a thunderstorm Tuesday afternoon, when it was all said and done, the possibility of moisture for the area just fizzled out when the clouds moved on out after depositing only very light showers.

However, the storms did threaten the Lubbock area, who posted the first tornado warning for Lubbock County this year.

Department of Public Safety officers stationed around Lubbock reported a funnel cloud approximately 10 miles south of Lubbock around 7:30 p.m. Although the approaching storm did not touch the ground or do any reported damage, nervous residents kept a close watch, and in some portions of Lubbock more than an inch of moisture was received.

At Tahoka, more than three inches of rain was reported, along with a heavy hailstorm.

Around Muleshoe, less than one-tenth of an inch of moisture was received during the brief thunderstorm, with National Weather Service predicting the possibility of additional rainfall for the immediate area on Wednesday and Thursday.

In Muleshoe, sand preceded the showers that failed to settle the dust in the air, and the clouds moved on out of the area after depositing the minimal amount of moisture.

Early predictions Wednesday carried a warning that 'possible severe thunderstorms' would be roaming the South Plains both

on Wednesday evening, and continuing into Thursday.

Clerk Hurt In Robbery Of Allsup's

Around 3 a.m. Sunday, Catherine Murrill, night clerk at Allsup Convenience Store at Earth was beaten by two men who also robbed the 24-hour grocery store.

Ms. Murrill was still hospitalized at presstime, recuperating from the injuries she received. Although she told officers the men were armed with a gun, apparently she was beaten by the men with their fists.


A Lamb County deputy sheriff investigated the incident. Muleshoe officers were notified, and a road block was set up by Muleshoe City Police Sgt. Wayne Holmes and Patrolman Julian Dominguez. It was reported that a white, or very light stationwagon, of a small make, was driven west by the two black men who beat the clerk and robbed the store.

Officers reported that the small stationwagon had apparently already come through Muleshoe or bypassed Muleshoe, as the officers manning the roadblock did not see a vehicle such as the one described by the clerk.

According to a report, an unspecified amount of money was taken from the store in the robbery.



Members of the Lazbuddie Board of Education met in a regular monthly meeting on April 14 in the Board Room of the school. The Meeting began at 7:30 p.m.

President Jerry Don Glover called the meeting to order, and the minutes of the previous meeting in March were in no need of correction.

Among the items of business was the acceptance of the resignation of Janet Wilke from the school system.

New Board Members, Glen Lust and Ronald Elliott, were inducted, and there was an election of new board officers to serve for next year.

Alfred Hicks was named as the new Board President, and Marvin Mimms was selected as the Vice-President of the board, with Max Steinbock named as the Board's Secretary.

March bills were approved for payment by the members.

Lazbuddie's junior high track team won the Dist. 4-B boys track championship on April 15 in Sundown.

In a strong display of good team depth, Lazbuddie outscored Amherst 151 to 96 to gain the district not. Sundown had 92½ points to garner third place.

In this particular meet, Lazbuddie broke several records. Danny Silva, a seventh grader, set the new standard in the 400 meter dash with a time of 58.6. The 1600 meter relay team of Silva, Saul Garza, Adam Monreal, and Noe Gonzales sat a new school record in that event by a timing of 3:57.7.

In the field events, Lazbuddie carried themselves well. Shane Smith jumped to second place in the high jump, with Tony Waddell placing fifth. Franky Garcia was a second place finisher in the discus with Randy Cantrell third, and Lee Scott, Fourth.

Adam Monreal lead all of the junior high pole vaulters as he finished first, and Saul Garza was a third place finisher in the long jump.

Shot Putters Randy Cantrell and Mike Monreal finished third and sixth respectively, while the Longhorns continued their success in the running events.

The 400 meter relay team of Danny Silva, Larry Nail, Saul Garza, and Adam Monreal placed third, while Gary Cantrell and Larry Nail had good times in the 800 meter dash, where they placed second and sixth, respectively.

Noe Gonzales led the pack in the 110 intermediate hurdles for Lazbuddie as he was the first place finisher. Carlton Jacops finished third and Evaristo

Sanchez had a fourth place finish.

Danny Silva sat a new record in the 400, meter dash, but teammate Adam Monreal was not far behind as he placed second.

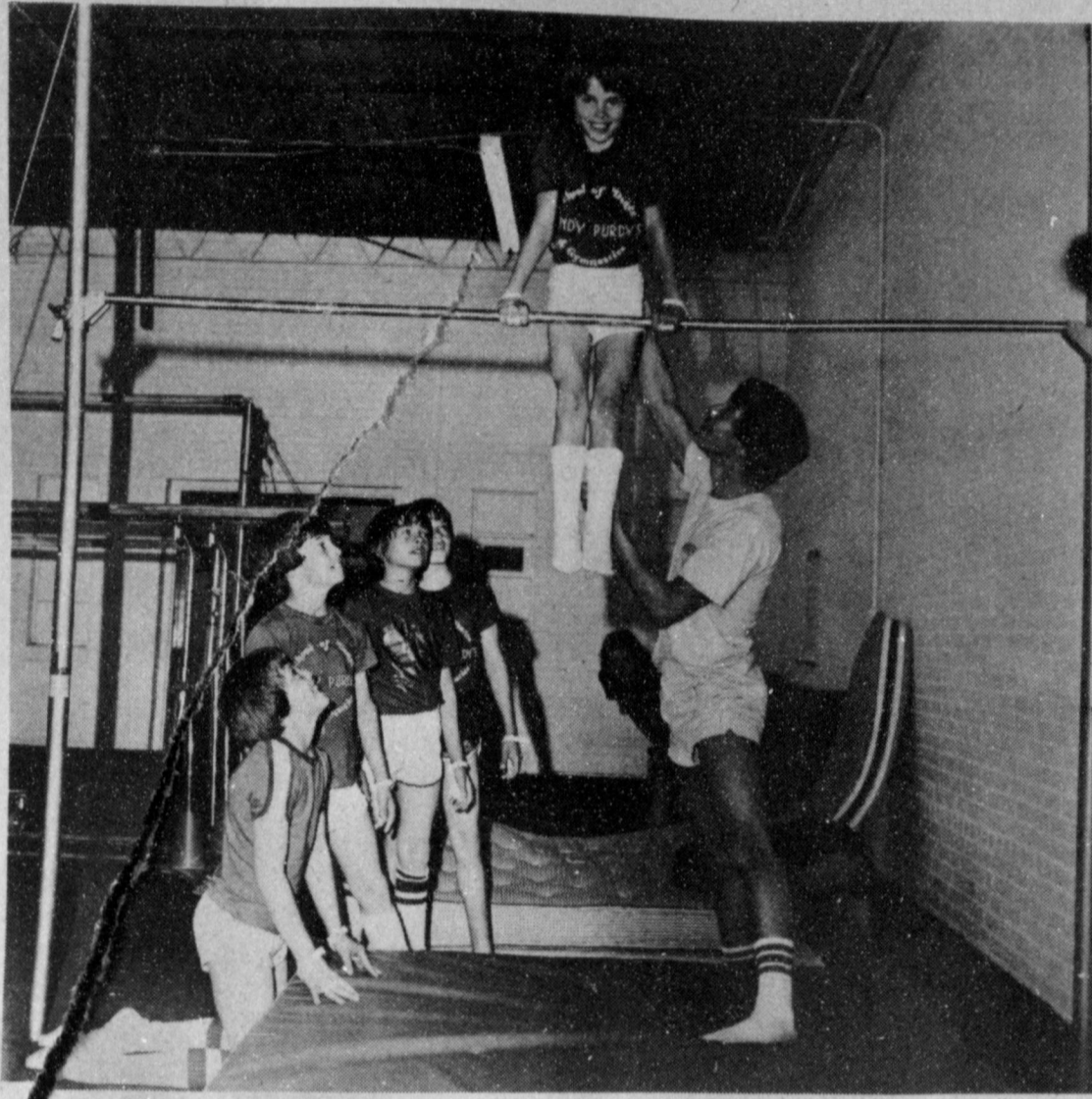
