## Robbery Suspects Captured Monday

### Lindsey Jewelry Holdup Victim

### First Daytime Robbery In Last 47 Years Here

Because a trooper for the Texas Department of Public Safety 'just happened to be at the right place--at the right time--three robbery suspects enjoyed their 'loot' for only 14 minutes Monday afternoon.

DPS Trooper Jim Dulin, stationed in Muleshoe, was just completing an investigation of a two vehicle accident in southwest Bailey County Monday afternoon when he heard a radio call about an armed robbery in Muleshoe. According to the report, the three suspects were headed south on State Road 214.

Fourteen minutes and 20 miles later, the trooper had all three suspects in custody.

It all began when a local resident, Faye Poyner, started to enter Lindsey Jewelry on Main Street in Muleshoe around 4:30 p.m. Mrs. Poyner said she saw masked men inside the store 'stuffing' jewelry into bags. Mrs. Poyner backed out of the store and hurriedly notified Iris Clements, who was crossing the street to 'Call the police, the jewelry is being robbed.'

Mrs. Clements went into her store and notified police. The call came in to the dispatcher at the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center just as the robbery alarm was activated at the jewelry store at 4:32 p.m. One minute later, at 4:33 p.m., Muleshoe City Police Officers Julian Dominguez and Mark Whitley arrived at the store.

Receiving a description of the persons and the vehicle they left driving, Officer Dominguez broadcast the description on his radio to other officers.

Trooper Dulin, who was returning to Muleshoe from the accident, set up a long roadblock just north of Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge and a few minutes later, spotted the approaching automobile carrying the three suspects.

A chase that reached up to 98 miles per hour on the trooper's radar unit ended five miles when the trio surrendered to the locally-based officer.

Minutes later, other officers from Muleshoe and Sudan arrived, and helped secure the suspects with handcuffs. Recovered from the suspect's vehicle was a large amount of jewelry, valued at above \$50,000. A handgun, which officers speculated was tossed from the vehicle when the suspects saw the DPS Trooper waiting, was recovered 1.2 miles from when Dulin began his high speed chase of the trio. ## Local Election Creates Interest Polls To Stay Open For Both Primaries

Saturday, May 3, is primary election time, and the most hotly contested race at this time is for the Bailey County Sheriff's position.

A total of 48 candidates are listed on the ballot for the Democratic Primary for the primary election for all offices; and the Republicans have 13 candidates listed for all offices.

Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements announced he would not be seeking another term in office after serving in his 24th year. Seeking the office are his chief deputy, Bob Henderson; Muleshoe City Police Lt. Jerry Hicks and former Bailey County Deputy Sheriff, Pete Black.

The sheriff's office candidates are all running on the Democratic Primary. There are no republican candidates for sheriff.


Four candidates are listed on the Democratic Primary ballot for the post of County Commissioner, Precinct One. Longtime Precinct One Commissioner Matt Dudley elected not to seek re-election to his office. Democratic candidates include R.L. Scott, Chester (Chub) Embry, L.K. Dean and Marshall (Catfish) Williams. Winner of the Democratic Primary will face Thomas S. Freeman, Republican, who is unopposed on the Republican ballot.

In Precinct Three, incumbent R.P. (Bob) Sanders is unopposed on the Democratic ballot, however, he will be facing James Warren, who is unopposed on the Republican ballot in the November general election.

Also creating interest locally is the contest for the 31st District State Senator's post. Incumbent Bob Price is unopposed on the Republican ballot, but will face the winner of the Democratic primary. Gerald McCathern and Bill Sarpalius are both vying for that win on the Democratic ballot. Both men reside in Hereford, while Price is a resident of Pampa.

According to figures released from the Bailey County Courthouse, LaVayne Williams, Bailey County Tax Assessor, shows a total of 3,710 persons registered and eligible to vote in the Primaries this Saturday. She said this is a very large number of eligible residents registered to cast their ballot.

At mid-afternoon Tuesday, on the final date of absentee balloting, Bailey County Clerk Hazel Gilbreath said 72 Democrats and 23 Republicans had cast an absentee ballot. This also, is a very high number of absentee ballot-cont. on Page 6 col 5

## Bailey County Fair Plans Are Completed

Thursday night, the Bailey County Program Building Committee met in a county-wide session to announce a major plan for the committee in Muleshoe.

They announced plans for a Bailey County fair, scheduled for the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum on September 11-12-13.

According to the Program Building Committee, the county-wide fair will also encompass entries from Parmer and Lamb Counties, and will be open to all areas featured in the

larger fairs except animals.

A booklet, including the general rules and regulations, and extra information in a catalog form, has been compiled and is ready to distribution to possible entrants in the various divisions of the fair.

Competition will be open to all age groups, and will include agriculture, with cotton, corn, shorghum, other grains and seeds; bundles for forage; vegetables; fruit; and ornamentals to be included. In the culinary will be

For canned fruits and vegetables will be fruits, vegetables, pickles, preserves, jellies, jams, butters.



### High School Latest Vandal Victim


Vandals broke into Muleshoe High School sometime before midnight Monday, and by the time they completed their rampaging up and down the halls of the school, they left much debris scattered.

Following initial reports from a resident who said they saw 'boys' running from the school, Muleshoe City Police Officers Monte Phipps and Mark Whitley and Deputy Sheriff James Williams accompanied As-

sistant High School Principal Bob Graves through the halls strewn with books, papers, athletic equipment.

Officers and Graves found no major damage to the school, and it appeared that only lockers were emptied in the halls, and in at least one instance, books and papers partially filled a girl's restroom.

At presstime, the investigation into the report of vandalism was continuing.

### Rural mailboxes can be dangerous

**COLLEGE STATION** — Each year the nation has a significant number of fatalities, maiming injuries and extensive property damage resulting from car impacts with mailboxes on rural roads. The boxes are poised 42 inches off the ground, exactly the right height to smash through a windshield.

"What is amazing is how mailboxes line up at windshield height for subcompacts right up through full-size cars," commented Dr. Hayes E. Ross, Jr., a Texas Transportation Institute engineer at Texas A&M University.

Ross believes national mailbox safety standards are overdue. "Mailboxes obviously are not problems along major interstate routes," he said, "but they are on secondary and rural road systems."

point, quilts and comforts, rugs, tatting, women's clothing, men's clothing, children's clothing.

Under crafts and hobbies will be holiday parade, macrame, pictures and miscellaneous.

According to the rules, The fair will be known as the Bailey County Fair Association, and is open to any person living in either Bailey, Lamb or Parmer Counties. Agricultural products to be exhibited in the Bailey County Fair must have been grown in either of the three counties.

Adult divisions will be for age 18 and above, with the youth division for exhibitors under the age of 18.

Commercial exhibits may be included for a rental fee of \$15 for a 12-by-12 foot space.

All exhibits must be in place by 9 p.m. Thursday, September 11, and remain in place until 5 p.m. on

Saturday, September 13. Entries may be checked in starting at 9 a.m. on Thursday, September 11, and judging will be done on Friday, September 12. The fair will be open all day on Saturday, September 13 to the general public for viewing the exhibits.

Ribbons will be awarded in each class for first, second and third places and a purple rosette will be presented for the best exhibit in each category for youth and adult divisions,

provided there are three or more entries in each category.

Reports on the various committees were also given during the meeting last week. This includes Ted Harrison, Livestock Committee; Robert Hunt, Crops Committee; Linda Huckaby, Family Living Committee; Eugene Shaw, 4-H and Youth Committee; Donald Harrison, vice chairman of the committee also introduced the special speaker of the evening, Marvin Sartin, area

economist.

Joe Wheeler, chairman of the Bailey County Program Building Committee reported on the program for this year.

"How To Beat Inflation" was the subject of Sartin's discussion. He predicted soft grain prices, and said there will be average to better prices on cotton, depending on weather conditions, including the lack of rainfall and lack of production.

He advised people to hold off on purchasing money market certificates and CD's with the expectation that interest rates will be decreasing prior to the November elections. He also said he expects less than a two-digit inflation, and says it will certainly be no more than 10-12 percent. Sartin reminded that it is hard to 'fight inflation, with inflation.'

Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley praised the 15-member committee for their year long planning for the first county fair.





## RECIPE

### Baked Stuffed Fish

Fish weighing 3 to 5 pounds may be stuffed and baked with head and tail removed or not, as desired. Clean fish, dry and rub inside and out with salt. Stuff and sew or skewer opening. Place on piece of heavy paper on baking sheet and bake in an oven 550 degrees 10 to 15 minutes or until browned. Reduce temperature to 425 degrees and bake 30 to 45 minutes to the pound for first 4 pounds and 5 minutes for each additional pound. Baste lean fish every 10 minutes or cover with thin slices of fat salt pork or bacon. Do not baste fat fish. To serve, lift fish with paper and slide fish onto platter. Serve baked fish with White Sauce, White Sauce with Eggs, Tomato Sauce, Brown Almond Sauce, Onion Sauce, Almond Butter Sauce, Drawn Butter Sauce, Horse-radish Sauce, etc.

2 c fine soft bread crumbs  
1 t grated onion  
1/2 c chopped celery  
1 T lemon juice  
1/2 t salt  
3 T melted butter  
2 T water

Trooper Dulin escorted one suspect to Muleshoe; Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements drove one suspect and DPS Driver's License Trooper C.D. Fitzgerald brought in the third suspect.

The trio, identified as Joyce Holmes, 25; Robert Charles Willard, 26 and Jimmy Jordan, 32, all of Lubbock, were arraigned before Bailey County Judge Glen Williams late Monday night, on charges of armed robbery. Bond was denied for Willard and Jordan, and Judge Williams set a bond of \$100,000 on the Holmes woman.

Clerks at the jewelry store, including owner Vi Lindsey, Ethel Murray and JoAnn Sikes were unharmed in the robbery, although Mrs. Sikes told officers she had been struck alongside the neck and head by the man carrying the gun. All three of the clerks were tied with small rope by the trio they described as the persons who robbed the store.

time, said the duo took something around \$1,600. Jim Cook, now a resident of Amarillo, was the Bailey County Sheriff when the bank was robbed.

Mrs. Bobo said no one was injured in the robbery 47 years ago, and the robbers were not apprehended and the cash was never recovered.

### New drug may aid glaucoma victims

COLLEGE STATION — Laboratory tests of a new drug for treating glaucoma, which affects at least a million Americans, have begun at Texas A&M University's College of Medicine.

The drug DMB may be even more effective and have fewer side effects than other drugs currently on the market, explained Dr. George C. Y. Chiou, head of medical pharmacology at Texas A&M.

The new compound, said Chiou, may be a purer form of another glaucoma drug called DMC already being tested on human volunteers.

About 178,000 new cases of glaucoma are reported in the United States each year



**EDITORIALS**

**The Next Congress**

Most non-partisan forecasters are predicting gains for Republicans in the House and Senate this year. That's not always the outlook in presidential election years. The out-party is traditionally favored only in non-presidential election years. Thus the 1980 outlook reflects what forecasters see as voter dissatisfaction with the state of affairs in the nation and the world.

Since Democrats have been in control of Congress since President Eisenhower's first two years in office--1953 and 1954--some wonder if there is a realistic chance that Republicans can gain the majority in Congress if Ronald Reagan wins the White House in November. The answer is--a very, very slim chance.

There are today--in the 96th Congress--58 Democratic Senators to 41 Republicans. Only a third of the Senate, a continuing body, is elected each two years so it would be very difficult for Republicans to pick up enough seats in the upper chamber to gain a majority. Yet circumstances greatly favor Republicans this year. Only ten Republican seats are expiring, whereas twenty-four Democrat terms end.

Also, among the Democrats are some notoriously big spenders (Bayh, Chureh, Cranston, Culver, etc.) and one of two notoriously "Israeli" Senators (Stone).

Membership of the House is currently 278 Democrats to 159 Republicans. GOP Party Chairman Bill Brock predicts his party will gain 20 to 25 House seats, which would leave a considerable Democrat margin. He estimates Republicans will gain four or five Senate seats. A gain of five would make party strength there close--53 to 46--but even that would leave Democrats in firm control.

The 97th Congress, then, is almost certain to be Democrat-controlled again. The GOP chance for legislative control seems to be 1982. Assuming some GOP gains this year, further gains in 1982 could produce a Republican margin there. In 1982, twenty Democrat terms in the Senate expire, only twelve Republican.

**Pennsylvania**

One major effect of Pennsylvania's presidential primary is to prolong the underdog hopes of Senator Ted Kennedy and George Bush. Bush may be encouraged to continue his campaign into the summer as a result of his victory.


Because of the close vote in both the Democrat and Republican primaries, President Carter and Ronald Reagan remain overwhelming favorites to win their parties' nominations. In the meantime, however, the suspense will continue a little longer, which will perhaps benefit only the news media.

**NEWS NOTES**

**AGREEMENT REACHED**

**ANKARA, TURKEY** -- The United States and Turkey signed a new defense cooperation agreement recently after five years of strained relations between the two NATO members. The Soviet news agency Tass said "local observers" believe the pact "makes it easier for the United States to organize armed intervention against Iran in view of the aggravation of Iranian-American relations."

**LEBANON & ISRAEL**

**JERUSALEM** -- Israeli officials portrayed their army's invasion of southern Lebanon as a defensive action without a time limit, aimed at screening their northern frontier from infiltrating Palestinian terrorists such as those who took children hostage recently at the border kibbutz of Misgav Am.

**ON BLOOD PRESSURE**

**BOSTON** -- A new blood test may warn young people that they will grow up to have high blood pressure, a disease that now afflicts about 15 percent of American adults. The test, developed

at Harvard Medical School, detects an apparently inherited abnormality in the way red blood cells absorb sodium.

**CANADA TO BUY JETS**

**OTTAWA** -- The Canadian Government announced recently that it had chosen the McDonnell Douglas Corporation's F-18A fighter plane for its air force at a cost of about \$2.5 billion. The decision ended three years of intense competition, delays and political squabbling over what is the biggest defense contract ever awarded by Canada.

**WASHINGTON**

**ON SPENDING**

This year's Democratic and Republican presidential candidates cannot spend more than \$29.44 million in their general election campaigns, the Supreme Court ruled. The justices unanimously upheld federal laws attacked by the Republican National Committee and others.

**TREASURY RUNS LOW**

The Treasury Department is delaying sending about \$3 billion in tax refund checks for a few days just to be sure there will be enough money in its accounts to cash them.

**MILITARY BUILD-UP**

The United States, moving to bolster its military presence around the Middle East and the Persian Gulf, is asking allied Governments to build up their forces in Western Europe and the Far East, Carter Administration aides said.

**ON CENSUS RETURN**

The Deputy Secretary of Commerce, Luther H. Hodges Jr., said that about 84 percent of the households that were sent census forms had already returned them. The figure, he said, was above the 80 percent goal set by the Census Bureau for the nation's 20th population count.

**SOVIETS & GRAIN**

Despite President Carter's curtailment of grain shipments to the Soviet Union, the Russians have managed to buy most of the feed grains they were thought to need before their harvest this summer, Agriculture Department officials said.

**RETAIL SALES OFF 1.3%**

Sales of food, cars, durable goods and other items sagged at the retail level in March for the second consecutive month, giving further evidence that the nation's economy may be headed into recession, the Government reported.

Our nation is in the same situation every family has experienced at one time or another: We must admit that we can't afford all of the worthwhile things we would like to do and buy.

Deciding how to divide a limited family budget among seemingly unlimited needs and desires is painful. It is equally painful to have to say as a nation that we can't do everything everyone would like us to. But making those tough decisions is the only way to pull our economy back from the brink of economic ruin.

I am pleased to see a growing realization in the Congress that we must balance our budget. Unfortunately, neither the President nor the Democrat leadership in Congress has been willing to go far enough. And their "balanced" budgets do not allow for enough defense spending to meet the minimum effort required to preserve our national security.

My staff and I have conducted a line-by-line analysis of the entire federal budget -- hundreds of pages outlining hundreds of billions of dollars to be spent -- and found close to \$40 billion that can be cut from the Administration's original budget. That's enough to balance the budget and meet our defense needs.

Cutting that much from the non-defense budget is major surgery, without question. But we did it with a scalpel, not a hatchet. And I am convinced the plan would allow the federal government to meet its obligations -- and the most pressing needs of our nation.

Some programs can be eliminated. Although I enjoy and support fine arts, I question whether the government has any business spending money in that area. So I would abolish the National Foundation on the Arts and Humanities and the Commission on Fine Arts.

The Legal Services Corp. puts food on no one's table and clothes on no one's back. It can go.

But for the most part, I am recommending that program funding be kept at the same level as this year, or even a return to 1979 budget levels. In other words, my main concern is to stop the growth of government -- its spending and its intrusion into our lives.

To do that, we are going to have to be more careful that our money is wisely spent. For instance, we must revise the Food Stamp regulations to get the middle class off the rolls so the truly needy can be assisted.

We should cut "categorical" federal grants that have strings attached and tend to be expensive to administer. Revenue sharing is more efficient, and allows decisions on how limited money should be spent to be made at the local level instead of in a bureaucracy hundreds of miles away.

Undoubtedly, there will be widespread resistance to making the sorts of cuts I've been talking about. My colleagues in the Congress will fear their constituents will rise in arms against them if they don't vote for the favored programs. But I think they are wrong. I believe the people of Texas are bigger than that, and will insist on responsible budget making.

# 'Horns Shine During Meet Of Thin Clads

Coach Jimmy Noland described "the weather condition as the worst weather they have had for a Regional meet in many years." Tommy and Keim were throwing into a very cold high wind. "I was very pleased with their performances," said the coach.

Dennis Steinbock threw the discus 147' 7" to place third for the Longhorns. He also placed sixth in the pole vault with a vault of 11'. Coach Noland praised Dennis as a "great competitor who has always come through in tough situations. He has been a tremendous asset to the entire athletic program."

Martin Mendoza placed fourth for the Horns in the 1600 meter run with an excellent time of 4.49. Coach Noland was pleased with Martins performance and reminded everyone of Mendoza being only a Freshman.

The Lazbuddie's 1600 meter relay team of Quentin Mimms, Russell Windham, Reggie Treider, and Steve Monreal finished third with a school record time of 3:31.3. "Those four young men were tireless workers and ran the best race they've run all year," said Coach Noland.

Reggie Treider who has

jumped well all year continued his winning form by becoming the Regional High Jump Champion. Treider will compete in the high jump at the State meet May 9th and 10th in Austin.

## Dog Virus Warnings Are Given

Local veterinarians, including Dr. Jerry D. Gleason and Dr. Barry Cowart of the Muleshoe Animal Clinic, have issued a warning to watch for a virus which is currently affecting dogs.

The doctors said, "A newly recognized virus is spreading across the United States and posing a threat to dogs. The virus, a member of the parvovirus group, has been isolated as the cause of a vomiting and diarrhea condition, and death has resulted in several reported cases."

"The incidence of the disease has been much greater in puppies and in dogs that are congregated, such as show or kennel dogs. However, any unvaccinated dog is susceptible to the disease. The clinical signs include (1) vomiting and diarrhea of sudden onset (2) possible blood in the diarrhea (3) weakness and (4) loss of appetite."

"The disease develops rapidly, the animal dehydrates and secondary bacteria infections often develop. Death may occur if treatment is not begun," added the doctors.

"A vaccine is now available to prevent the incidence of the parvovirus syndrome. Puppies are recommended to be vaccinated at eight and 12 weeks of age. Adult dogs should be vaccinated twice, two weeks apart, and if possible, at least two weeks prior to known exposure to other dogs (kennels, shows, etc.)."

"Yearly boosters are recommended, and we will be available to answer any of your questions about the disease and preventative measures for it," they said.

Charles L. Schultze, chief economic adviser: "There is a large potential after the next three months or so for a significant reduction in the rate of inflation."
