## Even Government Owned Telephone Systems Are Having Trouble

"According to a statement of the pos master general of Australia in the House Representatives, there has been a los; 32,319 or approximately $6 \%$ of the telephones in that country since June, 1930.
"The Postmaster General announced th there was no hope, at present, of making reductions in telephone charkes. He stated that the loss on the telephone service last year was approximately 400,000 pounds and that the figure for the present year would be no better.'

Telephone Companies are not free to lower prices during depression times as do commercial and industrial interprises. small saving a telephone company may realize in reduction of operating expense always more than offset by a reduction in the volume of business; while commercial in terprises bave a frequent turn over in their stock in trade, and are free to charge for their products all they can obtain during prosperous times as well as restock during dull periods at lower prices; telephone com panies have ouly service to sell, and their stock in tracie represents investments in poles wire, cable, and equipment which of necessity is used over a long period of years.

It must be apparent, therefore, to every thinking man that telephone rates cannot be subject to frequent price fluctuations which are incident to commercial interprises.

Telephone cumpanies are obliged to ex pand and make extensions adequate to meet the public demands, and the financial obligations incurred in maki ig such extensions must be met along with the increased taxes and maintenance thereon.
