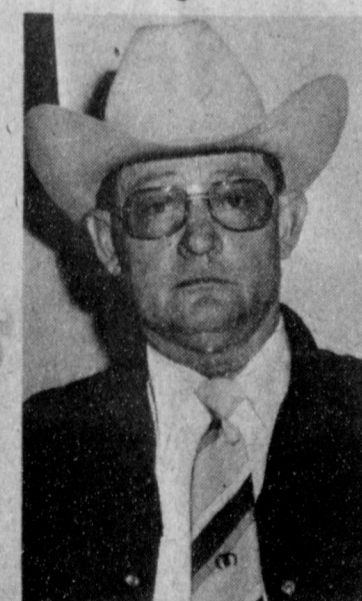
Mrs. Treadwell said she is available to see patients.

Henderson, Scott Win In Primary

Some 42 percent of the registered voters in Bailey County went back to the polls Saturday in the second Democratic Primary to choose a sheriff, county commissioner candidate, and candidates for three state offices.

In the balloting, Bob Henderson won the sheriff's election with 824 votes in the county. Jerry Hicks carried the entire city, but it was not enough to offset the rural nod, which went to Henderson. The same trend as in the

Sanders, Bock Win Top Jaycee Awards

Numerous awards were handed out Saturday night at the annual Muleshoe Jaycee awards banquet at the Muleshoe Country Club.

"Leadership and community involvement," said incoming Jaycee President, Galen Bock, "that's what it's all about." He spoke briefly after being installed as president by District Director Jim Bowman of Lubbock.

Bock asked Jaycees to "get fired up for the new

year", and spoke of the excitement of being a Jaycee.

According to the new president, he will be stressing more community service projects during the year.

Charles Moraw presented a JCI Senator's award to Kent Kelly. Moraw told the members and guests that when the award was instituted four years ago, it was not set up as a yearly award, but after Ricky Mata was presented the award in 1977; it was

given to Chuck Smith in 1978; Galen Bock in 1979; and to Kent Kelly in 1980.

Receiving the Citizen of the Year Award was Robert P. (Bob) Sanders. It was explained that the award is presented to a person who is considered to be outstanding in community involvement.

It was outlined that Sanders, who is a farmer, was a county commissioner; a member of the Board of Directors for the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG), is a member of the Bailey County Tax Appraisal District Board; a member of the Muleshoe Area Youth Activities Committee; a member of the Masonic Lodge; and an individual who works extensively with youth.

Outstanding Young Farmer named was Alan L. Davis of the Goodland community. His background in farming was given. Davis is married to the former Charlotte Wedel, and they are the parents of one child.

Kent Kelly presented an award rarely given by the Muleshoe Jaycees. He gave a complete background on the recipient of an honorary membership in the Muleshoe Jaycees, including the many service clubs he is or has been a member of and the many organizations he has aided through the years.

Southern Area Gets Good Rain

Muleshoe received only .07 of the moisture that moved through the area Tuesday night, but slightly over an inch was recorded in southern Bailey County from a massive electrical storm.

Highway department workmen were called out to man high water locations around the Arch Highway in southwestern Bailey County after the heavy quick rain inundated the highway, creating hazardous crossings until the water had time to run off.

No hail was reported anywhere in the area, although some high wind was recorded for brief times as the storms passed.

At this time, it is not known whether or not the rain was in time to save young crops which had been devastated by a blistering sandstorm some ten days ago, plus a lack of moisture to boost the dry conditions on all farmlands.

Very scattered thunderstorms were predicted through Thursday, but no significant moisture was expected to be added to the Tuesday night amounts.

Four members of the Mighty 'M' Band competed in the Texas State Solo and Ensemble Contest held at the University of Texas last Monday.

Lubbock Hospital Officials Ask Help

Bailey County moved a step closer to subsidizing the Lubbock General Hospital Monday afternoon following a meeting between the Bailey County Commissioners and Administrator Jake Henry, Jr. and chief of the board of the hospital, Dub Rushing.

The two Lubbock men

came to Muleshoe to discuss the possibility of a subsidy with commissioners, and said they are also visiting with commissioners in Lamb and Cochran Counties.

Bailey County Judge Glen Williams explained that the Lubbock General Hospital is in a hospital district that comprises just Lubbock County, and receives state and federal funding. "The Lubbock General Hospital is regional in concept," explained Judge Williams, "and provides services not available elsewhere, including emergency OB's premature births, emergency burns and a trauma center."

The judge explained that he and two of the local county commissioners visited the hospital recently. While there, Judge Williams said a premature baby from Muleshoe was admitted to the hospital. The bill for the baby was \$13,000, "and someone has to pay

One Injured Monday Night In Rollover

Monday night, around 8:45 p.m., an accident was reported 10 miles west and two and a half miles south of Muleshoe on FM 1731.

Hospitalized at West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe where he is undergoing treatment for several broken ribs and other injuries is Billy Hicks, 21, of Bovina.

Apparently the one vehicle rollover was witnessed by two persons in a rear view mirror. They told investigating officers they had just met the car, then watched the northbound driver, Hicks, lose control on the beginning curve of an 'S' curve, veer off the roadway and overturn.

Mark Bruns, Lee Elder and Quentin Merrill, employees of Watson Alfalfa were in a nearby field when they saw the cloud of dust. On arriving at the accident site, they said they found the vehicle on top of Hicks, and turned the vehicle back onto its wheels and off Hicks' body.

Two of the young men stayed with the victim, who was having breathing difficulties while the other went to a nearby house to call for an ambulance and officers.

Investigating the accident was DPS Trooper Larry Northcutt, of Littlefield.

These include frozen fruit juices, canned vegetables, cake mixes and frostings, she says.

MEATS --- Economy-minded shoppers will concentrate on pork and poultry, so it may help to know different poultry terms, she adds.

"Poultry" means chickens, turkeys, ducks, geese or guineas.

"Ready-to-cook poultry" means whole dressed poultry which has been cleaned and is ready for cooking.

"Broiler" (or "fryer") is a young chicken usually seven to ten weeks of age. It's tender-meated with smooth-textured skin.

"Fowl" or "stewing chicken" or "hen" is a mature female chicken usually more than 10 months of age with meat less tender than a roaster.

"Roaster" is a young chicken usually three to five months of age that is tender-meated with soft, smooth-textured skin.

Since poultry is very perishable, be sure not to leave it uncooked in the refrigerator for more than one or two days, the specialist cautions.

DAIRY --- Watch for promotionals on milk, yogurt, margarine, cheese slices, cottage cheese and a variety of cheddar cheese.

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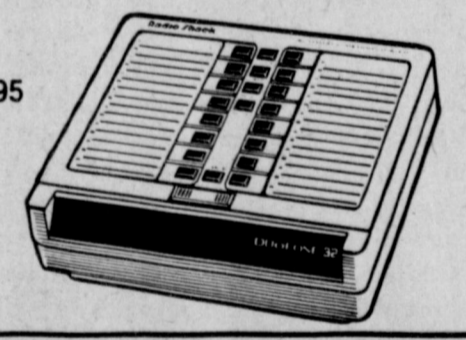
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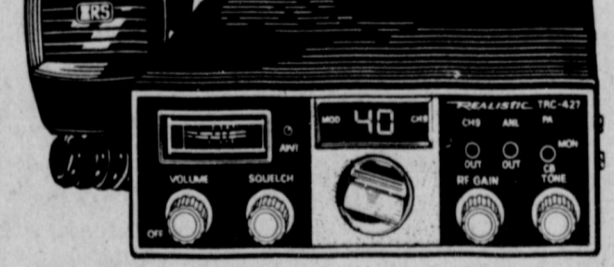

the judge.

Lubbock General calls the out-of-county emergency patient problem "dumps" on the hospital, which are generally made up of indigent patients.

Judge Williams, during an interview Tuesday morning, agreed that Bailey County should bear some of the expense, and assume some of the responsibility for the payment of medical bills for indigent patients from this county. However, Judge Williams said the county would be limited to a certain specified amount, due to high bills which could deplete the cash supply of the county.

Henry explained to commissioners Monday that if the Lubbock County Hospital District can prove it is trying to work with area counties toward solving the financial problems, he thinks Governor Clements will be more receptive toward state funding for the hospital. He also is of the opinion more federal funding would be forthcoming to the emergency hospital in Lubbock.

Henry said Lamb County

has agreed to pay up to \$5000 during the year, and no indigent patient is sent to the hospital from that county, they will not pay anything. The Lubbock hospital official also said Lubbock General Hospital will keep the out-of-county indigent patients just long enough to stabilize them for transfer to another hospital elsewhere.

Rushing agreed with local commissioners that it would be necessary to 'put a ceiling' on any subsidy to protect the finances of the county.

Commissioners declined to take immediate action as one commissioner was not at the meeting. The suggestion was tabled for future consideration, when Commissioner Loyd Stephens is present.

Monday during the meeting, commissioners also approved surgery for Janice (Holmes) Bares, an inmate in the county jail. They approved payment of one-half of the hospital bill and all of the doctor's bill for the surgery. They approved dental work for a blind individual and transferred \$28,000 from the general fund to the officer's salary fund.

jewelry display according to her testimony. She also identified she called to a friend crossing the street to call police.

New grass found for shaded sites

COLLEGE STATION -- Researchers at Texas A&M University say they have found a grass that grows in the shade of a tree, normally the most barren part of a Texas homeowner's yard.

Although the most widely used warm season grass for shaded sites is St. Augustine, the researchers at Texas A&M's Department of Soil and Crop Sciences found it may not be the best grass after all.

While no final recommendations can be made, all supportive information suggests that a grass called tall fescue has excellent potential where there is adequate irrigation, especially in warm, humid regions.

During the three year analysis, the Texas A&M scientists found that the tall fescue grass took root readily and grew without any significant problems if irrigated.

The Speaker Reports



by Bill Clayton

AUSTIN—Last fall I appointed six state representatives and five private citizens to the Select Committee on State Employee Productivity. I charged the committee with the responsibility of studying the laws and policies which affect the training, education, hiring, classification, performance and promotion of state employees. Among the specifics of the committee charge are the following:

- ..an assessment of the agency response to the State Employment Training Act of 1969.
 - ..an examination of expenditures by state agencies for training and education of state employees.
 - ..identification of means to establish a coordinated, cost-effective program of training state employees that eliminates duplication of effort.
 - ..identification of laws and policies that create barriers to increased productivity and cost-effective delivery of essential services by state employees.
- I also appointed an advisory committee to the select committee which is made up of training and personnel specialists from the public and private sector. The select and advisory committees have been hard at work since mid-November. Public hearings have been held in Harlingen, Lubbock, Arlington, and Austin. The advisory committee has met with approximately 40 agency training and personnel directors to brief them of committee activities and solicit their opinions and comments. Research is being conducted of other states concerning performance appraisals or evaluations, overtime pay, flextime, career development, grievance procedures, performance awards or incentives and other programs for state employees. The committee is also conducting three surveys to ensure input from the state agencies and the employees themselves. The first is a survey of all agencies on in-place training and a training

needs assessment. The second is an on-site survey by questionnaire of 20 percent of the employees at each of 14 facilities in order to insure quality data concerning their needs and perceptions of State employment. Finally, a survey of some 800 private employers

is being conducted to incorporate the activities of the private sector into the committee's work. I believe that the work of this committee is extremely important in light of the current inflationary economic situation facing our

nation. There is a demand for increased state services, while there is an equal demand for no new taxes. We in state government must find a way of maintaining and improving essential state services without increasing their costs.
