## LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITIES

After the inauguration of Governor W. Lee O Daniel for a second term, the Senate got down to work by giving its attentiod first to measures to help the national defense program. Full cooperation with the national administrations emerg ency plan was recommended by the Governor. The Senate Consmittee on Military Affairs of which Sen ator Metcalf is chairmgn, reported out three bills to facilitate uational defense. One by Senator Clem Fain of Livingstoz would stipulate that no teacher or employee of a ax supported institution of leara. ing in this State shall receive sutries until he or she plederv allegiaries until he or she pledger allegiport ond dense of the port and defene or the Consticution and laws of the S overnments.
Lieutenant Governor Coke Steven son designated Senator Metcalfe to serve as chairman of the Military Affairs Committee and also the important Rules Committee, he was also named vice chairman of the Committee on State Intitutions and Departments. and a member of 11 other Senate committees.
During the first 10 days of the sessiod. Senator Penrose Metcalle introduced 7 bills as follows

1. To abotish the present Agriculcural Department and transfer its fuctions to A, \& M. College and the Comptrollers Department.
2. To abolish the State Auditors Office and tranafer its functions to the Comptrollers Department.
3. To amend the land law so as to allow purchasers of school land to have until 1951 to pay their pria cipal installments to the State, to equire the payment of one fifth of the price offered for school land at the time of sale instead of one fort ieth and to limit to 5 years the time within which land forfeitures may e reinstated,
4. To permit Texas colleges to ther 5 students from each of the Hemis countries of the Western tion,
5. To authorize the Department of Education to include on scbool census rolls children moving with heir parents into areas where new been loched military camps heve 6. To revise

6. To appropriate money for perating expenses of the wool scour iog plant at A. \& M. college for the ext fiscal year.
