## LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITIES

By Senator Matcalfe
This week both Houses of the legislature made good progress on matters of major importance.
The House in a session lasting until well past midnight Monday passed an omnibus tax bill and sent it to the Senate. This bill taxes many things and would raise approximately thirty million dollars in new revenue, chiefly from in creases on natural resources. fran chaise taxes and utilities.
The original House bill allocated funds to meet the need for teacher funds to meet the need for teacher
retirement and the constitutional retirement and the constitutional
provisions for dependent children provisions for dependent children
and the blind, and after settiag and the blind, and after settiag
aside a reasonable amount for the aside a reasonable amount for the
state's general fund, sent the re state's general fund, sent the re
mainder to pay aid to the old folks This latter portion is probably more chan one half of the entire amount levied. The bill will go to a Senate committee early this coming week. There is strond sentiment among a majority of the Senate to put through a tax bill which will raise sufficient funds for the pressing sumient funds
The Senate passed the House bill increasing the load limit on trucks basing it on the gross weight of load and vehicle and placing a maximum of 38,000 pounds. The Senate added regulatory features and a provision limiting the hours of drivers in order to protect both driver, and the traveling public.
The Governor addressed a joint session of the two houses and recommended a measure curtailing strikes and lockouts in national deense industries in Texas
The State Department of Education advised me this week that under the provisiong of my Senate Bill 42, authorizing a supplemental cholastic census in areas affected by defense projects, in Browa County alone 1584 additional scho lastics have been added to the rolls Supplements will probably be made car the other defense areas in the istrict.
The limit for introduction of bills into the Senate was reached this week, resulting in a flood of bills eing poured into the hopper before the deadline. At the urgent request of commissioners' courts, school boards and other large groups, I istroduced bills (1) autherizing commissioners' courts to lower the salary scale of county officers in some counties; (2)bills regulating he transportation and sale of min aows, use of tret-lines and size limit of catish in Coke and Conche Counties; (3) amending the present law to increase the amount of land a county can procure for park purposes after authorization by a vote of the people; (4) Tom Green Couny hunting license measure; (5) changing the administration of funds or control of predatory enimals from the Live Stock Sanitary Com miseion to $A$ \& closed season on \& M. Gollege; (6) aril in Coke County. All of the uall in Coll bils which are of a local nature will e set for committee hearings and interested peopie from counties ento be heard both in snpport and in opposition thereto. It is my siscere desire that the people understand that none of these bills of local nature are initiated by me, but are isroduced because I was requested to oo so by people from the counties avolved. If a majority of the people
want them passed, that is agreeable with me, or if a majority do not ap prove them, I am ready to discard them.
