Sterling County has approximately 55 farm and ranch families using the Federal Land Bank and the National Farm Loan Association system of cooperative, low cost, long term farm mortgage credit, ac cording to D. C. Durham Secretary reasurer of the Sterliog City Nation al Farm Loan Association.
Outstanding on December 31, 1941 Sterling County were 52 Land Bank loans totaling $\$ 351,800$. From May 1933 to date, 19 Land Bank orns amounting to $\$ 161,000$ were closed. The seven-year period had 21 Commissioner loans supplewent ing the normal Land Bank services for a tutal of $\$ 68,600$. Of these 17 oans for $\$ 52.800$ remain.
"This system," weid Mr. Durham, was founded to finance farm mortgage debts on terms to fit the needs of the farmer and ranchman. ## Infantile Paralysis

Dr. Geo. W. Cov, State Heelth of ficer, states that infantile paralysis is largely a summer disease. Although cases may occur during any time of the year, over half the total number of cases of poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis) have been re ported to the Stete Health Department from city and county bealth officers over the state.
Direct contact between persons form the chief tactor in the spread of infantile paralysis. Because of the seasonal prevalence of the disease, flies and other insects have been suspected of conveying the virus or germ, Insect transmission has not, however, been scientifical ly demonstrated. Although animals are subject to paralysis, they are seemingly not susceptible to the human type of this paralytic the human type of this paralytic disease. Carriers are difficult to de termine and this fact makes it ad visable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts during any out break of the disease
Early symptoms of infantile par alysis are a headache, fever vomit ing, drowsiness and irritability fol lowed by stiffness in the neck and back. Prompt medical care, early recognition of the disease, and re porting of cases to local health ou thorities make possible the use of preventive and control measures.
After the acute state of the dis ease bas passed and the patient is permitted to walk, it is most im portant that the affected part of the body not be fatigued. The sec ret of rehabilition lies in the conti nuance of professional medical care and larke doses of patience.
Children under five years are most susceptible to the disease and all children under twelve should be watched for suspicious symptoms Your family physician should be called immediately and patient isolated for at least 21 days. olated for at least 21 days.
Children should not visit homes here the disease or symptoms of the disease exist. Promptness in diagnosis of poliomyelitis is one of the most important factors in its control measures.

## Bird Kills Snake

Details of the efficient manner in which road runners, or chaparrals fo about killing snakes, was contain ed in a report of a game warden to the Game Department recently. The warden got in on the start of the fight and remained until the close, ex actly an hour and 21 minutes later The roadrunner was jogging down a small path through the brush when it stopped suddenly and start ed circling a bunch of cord grass. The warden approached to within wenty yards of the bird and remained there while the chaparral proceeded to trim a 43 inch snake down to its size and then to dis. patch it. Darting in and out the road runner dug viciously at the rattler time and again and each time managed to evade the fangs of the six button reptile. After 81 of the six button reptile. After 81 minutes the rattler was lifeless. The haparral took two more vicious stabs at it, cocked his eye at the
warden and nonchalantly strolled warden and nonc
off into the brush.
Upon examining the reptile, the warden found a hole completely through the center of its head, three lacerations on its belly and the rattler was missing both its eyes
