Preventative for Pellegra

That the inclusion of proper food the duily diat plays a very portant part in the maintenance of ood health was stressed in a state nent issued this week by Dr. Georg W. Cox, State Health Officer
"One of the most dreaded of all iseases, pellagra, is caused entirely y not eating the kinds of food which would insure properly bal nced diet" Dr Oox aid "Th blic is pre to public is prone oorer the ser ous nature of pellogra At best isease, but aside from thio thear rese, bible revil this one puesible All tr trequa ery tragic. All to frequently pe lagra leads to serious menda dia rurbances, Dr. Cox warned, a some caser, actual iosanity. According to the State Healt Officer, pellagra is known as a dis ase which is no respector of per ons. There is dauger of pellagra triking at any age and either sex when the diet is consistently faulty To make sure that the diet con ains the proper pellakra-preventiv elements, it should include plent of milk daily, some fresb, lean meat aod as many freah vegetables, ospecially green vegetables, as is possible. Tomatoes and whole whea bread are aiso very valuable. Egg contribute their share to pellagr prevention as do all varieties of fresh fruits.
