Sergeant Bubba Foster Got There Quick

Sgt. Jesse Q. (Bubba) Foster, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Foster, didn't waste much time here in the U. S. after joining the Air Forces in January 3, 1942, less than a month after Pearl Harbor. He started for Australia the very next month, and landed there in April following a long trip around the Cape. He served as a mail clerk for awhile, then took aerial gunnery course, and graduated at Melbourne.

Bubba served as a tail and turret gunner with the famous 19th Air Force in New Guinea. He has been awarded the Distinguished Unit Badge with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the Air Medal, the Pacific Ribbon and the Good Conduct Medal.

He is now in the armament part of the Air Forces in New Guinea with the 5th Air Force.

He has collected more than a hundred pictures of the natives, his Army friends, and scenes of the country. His hobby, with his three tent mates, is beautifying their surroundings by planting vine and flower seed sent to them from the United States.

Sgt. Bubba's postwar plan is come home, raise horses, and fill up on Mother's cooking--especially chicken.

Since a doctor's day is a long one, the genial disciple of Hippocrates finds time to be the chairman of the Board of Stewards of the First Methodist Church, Secretary of the local Masonic Lodge, President of the Lions Club, Vice-president of the Tom Green 8-County Medical Society, Boy Scout Troop Committeeman, Cub Scout Troop Committeeman, OPA Meat Panel member, Medical Examiner for Sterling County, County Health Officer for Sterling and Glasscock Counties, and Chairman of Health and Medical Service, etc., etc., and etc.

A native of Alabama, Doc has been in Sterling since 1930. He attended Emory University in Atlanta and the University of Alabama. He did hospital work in Shreveport and Atlanta, and he had a scholarship in Baylor University in obstetrics and pediatrics several years back.

He married Opal Chumley in 1926 in Bronte, Texas. They have one son, Billy Joe, 9, who is a replica of papa Doc.

In spite of the fact he was born and reared below the Mason and Dixon line, Swann is a Republican. truth in it. A U. S. Government survey found our soldiers were the soberest, the best behaved in history—with most of them drinking nothing stronger than a moderate glass of beer.

From where I sit, that kind of "loose talk" can do just as much to undermine morale as any rumor that the Axis could invent. And it's up to every one of us to spike that kind of sabotage before it spreads.

Sterling Demo Delegates Vote With FDR Group

The Sterling delegates to the State Democratic Convention, Vern Davis and Homer Pearce, walked out of the Austin Convention Tuesday, and went with the Roosevelt supporters that formed their own convention. Pearce said Chairman George Butler wouldn't recognize a resolution to instruct the national delegates to vote for FDR, and Mayor Miller of Austin led the Roosevelt supporters over to the Senate chamber for a real Democratic Convention, pledged to support the party nominee.

The disunity and friction was very disgusting, said the delegates, and such a fuss doesn't look too well during wartime.
