Good Rains Soak Most Parts of Sterling County

A good rain fell over Sterling county Monday night, ranging from one to three inches except on the divide (which needed it most) which received only a quarter inch. Highest rainfall reported was over three inches on the Lee Bros. ranch. Other reports are as follows: J. I. Cope .96 inch, Ester Sims Price 2 1/2 inches, Herman Garlington .25 inch, J. T. Davis 2.20 inches, George Case 1.3 inches, Joe Emery 2.2 inches, Lee Reed 2.60 inches. Monday's rainfall was the largest since July 14, 1943, when 4.41 inches fell. On Wednesday night .33 inches was recorded at J. T. Davis' ranch here in town. Roy Foster said he got .25 inch on his ranch. With range prospects in good shape now the county can point ahead to a good year, except the farmers on the divide that still lack enough moisture to plant their crops.

A Ninth Air Force Troop Carrier Command Station, England—Sergeant Leelvy Compton, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rube Compton of Sterling City, Texas, is now serving with a Troop Carrier Unit of the Ninth Air Force Troop Carrier Command in the European Theater of Operations.

Sergeant Compton is a mechanic on gliders, which are used in such operations as dropping paratroops and transporting airborne personnel.

He entered the service in December, 1942, and after receiving his preliminary and basic training attended an Army Glider Mechanical School.

A graduate of Arden High School, he was employed by the R. B. Myles Co. of Lubbock, Texas as a tool dresser until his induction into the armed forces.

A brother, T-Sgt. A. J. Compton, is currently stationed at Dow Field, Bangor, Me., where he is a member of the 7th Base Hq. & Air Base Sq.

The IX Troop Carrier Command, to which Sgt. Compton's unit has been assigned since arriving in England, is part of the 9th Air Force, veteran of the North African desert campaign, now U. S. Component of the Allied Expeditionary Air Force.

North Concho River Soil Conservation District News

H.G. Garlington has kept busy during the prolonged dry period building up his terraces and completing end closures to hold all rain on the fields where it falls. This work has been done with a one way plow and a whirlwind terracer.

Joe Emery's water spreading terrace system on his 12 acre field utilized all the run off water from a 300 acre water shed during the 2.2 inch rain Monday night. This spreading system will add an average of 4 inches of water per year to this 12 acre field increasing the usable moisture approximately 40%, stated H.M. Kautz, Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service.

Ralph C. Bynum worked out a conservation plan on his 1673 acre stock farm in the Moon Chapel community last week. He plans to divide the 120 acre field adjoining the church house into two approximately 60 acre fields and plant to sudan for temporary summer pasture. This will give him opportunity to defer all of his range land during the growing season thus increasing the density and vigor of the more palatable and more productive grasses.

Bynum planted land which had been stubble mulched with large sweeps earlier in year to feterita and combine maize last week.

Roland Lowe held on his 40 acre field all runoff water from approximately 4 sections of range land during the 2.2 inch rain Monday night.

Supervisor J. R. Sims has received application for district assistance from H. H. Seal and Preston Barker of the Divide church community north of Water Valley. Soils and range surveys were completed on these two stock farms totaling 1740 acres stated A. T. Bratton with the Soil Conservation Service.

Preliminary engineering surveys on the George Demere ranch north of Water Valley revealed the possibility of one water spreading system which will add extra water to 50 acres of range land and a number of detention dams in headers.

DeWITT SNEAD: "Yeah. Absolutely. If we intend to prevent another war in 20 years, we'd better."

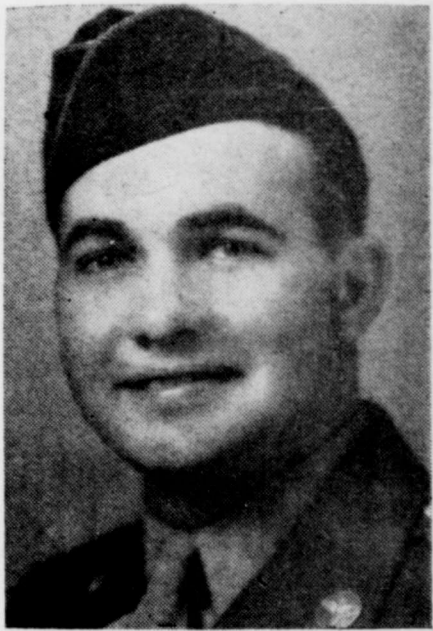
MRS. W.Y. BENGE, SR: "Just be prepared, because there's another time coming."

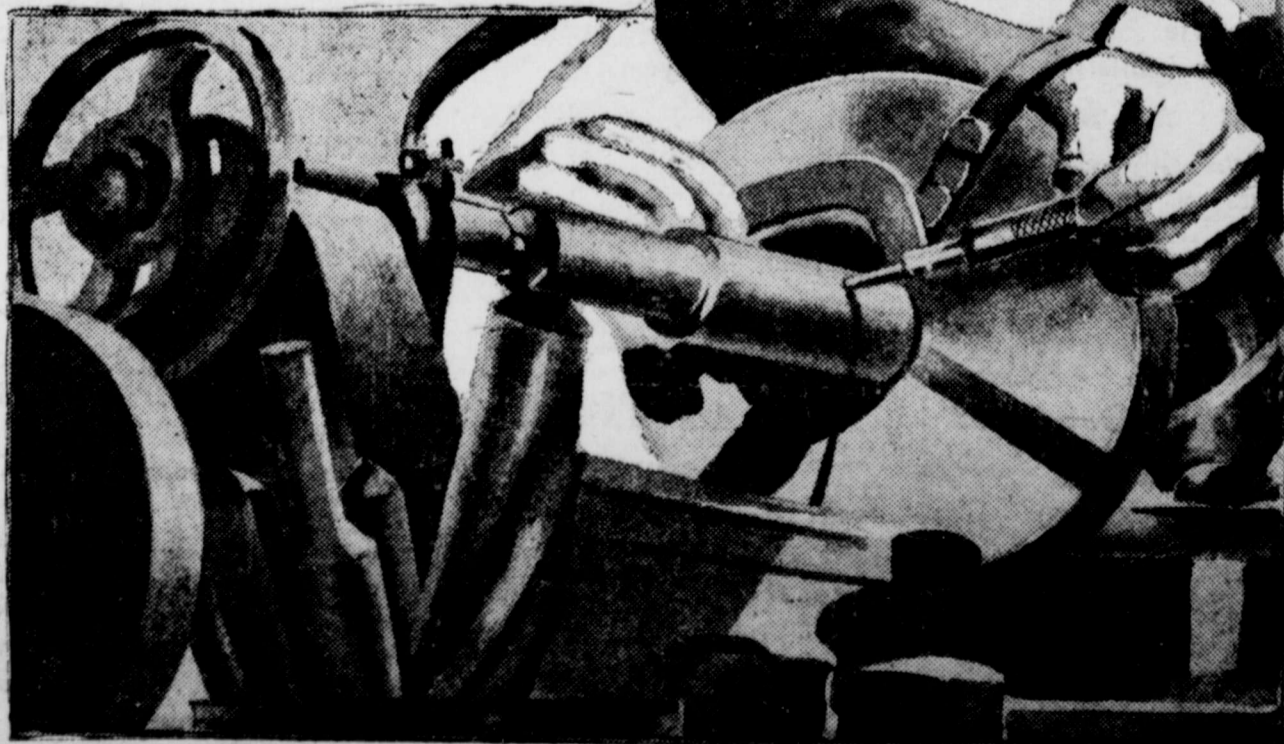

Judge John F. Sutton Seeking Re-election As District Judge

Judge John F. Sutton, who for many years has presided over the District Court, authorizes this paper to carry his formal announcement as a candidate to succeed himself. His candidacy is submitted to the voters of Tom Green, Irion, Schleicher, Coke and Sterling Counties with the request that his official record be examined to determine whether his decisions have been correct, his conduct of the business of the court fair, and the best interest of the people as a whole. Judge Sutton refers to those who have only recently

moved into the District to the hundreds of men who have served as jurors. "Jurors know", says Judge Sutton, "whether a trial Judge discharges his duties with that courage, fairness and efficiency so essential to an economical disposition of the business of the court. It is important to the people generally and essential to the welfare of the Government that a District Judge be well trained and experienced in the construction and application of both civil and criminal law."

Judge Sutton, a native son of this immediate section of West Texas, was 54 years of age Friday, May 26th and he and Mrs. Sutton have resided in San Angelo twenty-three years. He was educated in the University of Texas and began the practice of law in 1916.

In placing his candidacy before the voters, Judge Sutton states "In announcing through the press for reelection to the office of District Judge I desire to express to the voters my deep appreciation for the privilege of having served them in such capacity, and at the same time thank the citizens as a whole for the cooperation given the Court and court officials in the handling of the business of the court."

"On three occasions the people of this District placed their stamp of approval upon my judicial record by giving me a very substantial majority over my honorable opponents. This majority has grown at each succeeding election, resulting in the last election in my receiving approximately three votes to each vote received by the opposition. For this I am grateful and such a majority has been a reminder of my official obligations to the people. Again I submit myself for reelection upon my official record and on that record solicit the vote and active support of every voter in the district, and in return offer you a continuation of the same character and kind of judicial service I have heretofore rendered, improved by that added efficiency that comes only from judicial experience.

"I shall not be able to see any

considerable number of the voters and personally solicit their support. The work of the Court must be carried on and will consume much time, as it always has. Our people are busy and burdened down with the sorrows of war and the tremendous responsibilities that are ours until the war is won and peace restored. We are urged by our government to conserve automobiles, tires, gasoline and oil, that the military forces may maintain the necessary stock pile to carry on. I have fair tires and a reasonable gasoline allowance allotted by the Tom Green County Ration Board for the purpose of attending to the necessary court work in the five counties comprising this Judicial District. I shall keep faith with our military forces, our boys at the front and the cause for which we and our allied nations are fighting, by not diverting my gasoline allotment from essential court work to political campaign."
