The lamb market broke Wednesday at Ft. Worth, after 45 days of record lamb sales wherein the price held steady. More than 1,000,000 lambs were sold at steady prices of 12c to 14 1/2c before the yelled "calf rope" and quit bidding for the lambs.

Livestock commission men have sent word to ranchmen not to send any more lambs to Ft. Worth until the market rights itself. It is assumed that the packers will catch up within 10 days and the market be good again.

As an alternative, sheepmen may ship their lambs to Kansas City, St. Joseph or St. Louis, where spring lamb receipts have been light, and good prices are prevailing. Shipment may be made over the Santa Fe from here.
