## Democrats Plan Ballot And Assess Candidates

The Sterling County Democratic Executive Committee met Tuesday afternoon to assess the candidates and determine the order in which the names would be printed on the ballot. Present were Homer Pearce-County Chairman, J.S. Cole-Precinct 1 Committeeman, Riley King-Precinct 4 Committeeman, E. F. McEntire-Precinct 5 Committeeman, and M. Brown-Precinct 3 Committeeman. The Candidates for County Office were assessed \$174.69 with which to hold the primary election. It was agreed not to hold a runoff or 2nd primary, as such would be unnecessary.

It was agreed that the judges and clerks appointed by the Commissioners Court in February (to hold elections) would serve also at the July 22 primary.

Candidates for the following offices were assessed as follows: County Judge--G. C. Murrell, \$9.55; Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector--Verne Davis and John Keete, \$50.00; County and District Clerk--Mrs. Leah Wyckoff and Will Durham, \$45.00; County Treasurer--O.M. Cole, \$7.14; Justice of the Peace--A.W. Dearen, \$4.00; and the Commissioners--R. L. Foster, L.R. Knight, Herbert Hope, and W.N. Reed, \$8.00 each.

## John H. Brock Spent 14 Months In Aleutians

John Henry Brock, son of Mrs. Will Meyer, returned to his Naval base at Shoemaker, California last Friday after a leave spent here with his family. A Carpenter's Mate 2c, John has been in the Navy Sea Bees since he joined in August 1942. Never getting a leave he was sent to the Aleutians for 18 months. He came home the first part of the year when his grandfather died--for the first time since he joined.

John was stationed at Dutch Harbor, Adak, Kodiak and Attu Islands. Souvenirs from Attu include pictures of dead Japs, a Jap canteen, a Jap 60 millimeter shell, a Jap hand grenade and a Jap knee mortar. At Dutch Harbor he did a little crab fishing and saw the huge Kodiak bears on that island.

John saw Sgt. Gene Durham on Attu. (Gene is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Durham.) Brock said the gunfire during Jap air raids provided better fireworks than any 4th of July show he ever saw. His company (Co. B, 23rd Batt.) caught a Jap fox on Attu and made a mascot of it.

Going up John got seasick. Coming back he got scared. His ship was blown 800 miles off course and nearly wrecked.

John is heading out again--possibly to the South Pacific--which should be a welcome change--palm trees and balmy weather from the cold, barren, foggy Aleutians.

## \$5 Federal Auto Stamp Due

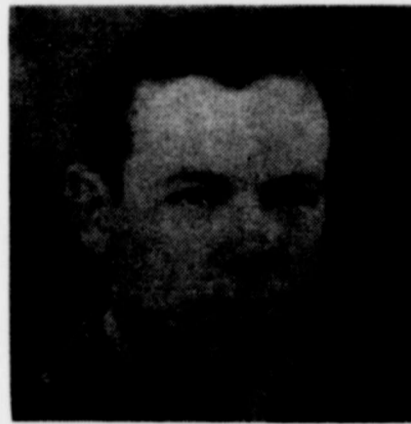
BY JULY 1st

This collision made him too late for the Tunisia battle, but he has been in Italy for the fireworks.

He has sent home three old pistols, 2 cap and ball type and one old double barrel pistol. These relics he bought in Italy. Also he sends home battle souvenirs. He had his picture painted and some photographs etched which he sent to his parents.

As an alternative, sheepmen may ship their lambs to Kansas City, St. Joseph or St. Louis, where spring lamb receipts have been light, and good prices are prevailing. Shipment may be made over the Santa Fe from here.

### North Concho River Soil Conservation District News

L. R. Stringer marketed his crossbred lambs in Fort Worth this week. The oldest lambs were only four months old.

Several moisture penetration checks on Foster S. Price's Bob's Creek Ranch on Monday, June 19, two weeks after the three inch rain June 5, revealed that on an area where extra water was added to range land by means of a diversion terrace the moisture has penetrated to a depth of 33 inches whereas on a similiar area with no extra water added no available moisture for plant growth remained in the soil.

L. R. Stringer, using soils, engineering, and range survey information collected on his 7282 acre ranch near Water Valley by Soil Conservation Service Technicians, worked out a conservation plan for the operation of his ranch for a period of five years. He plans to graze not more than the 35 animal units per section which he is running at this time until the grasses on the burned over areas and on the more heavily used areas have opportunity to become fully vigorous and establish deep root systems.

To supplement proper rate of use Stringer plans to defer a pasture this summer or fall for a period of approximately 60 days after a seasonable rain.

Other practices planned are road diversions, diversion terraces, fencing and brushings overfalls in gullies, and eradicating pear.
