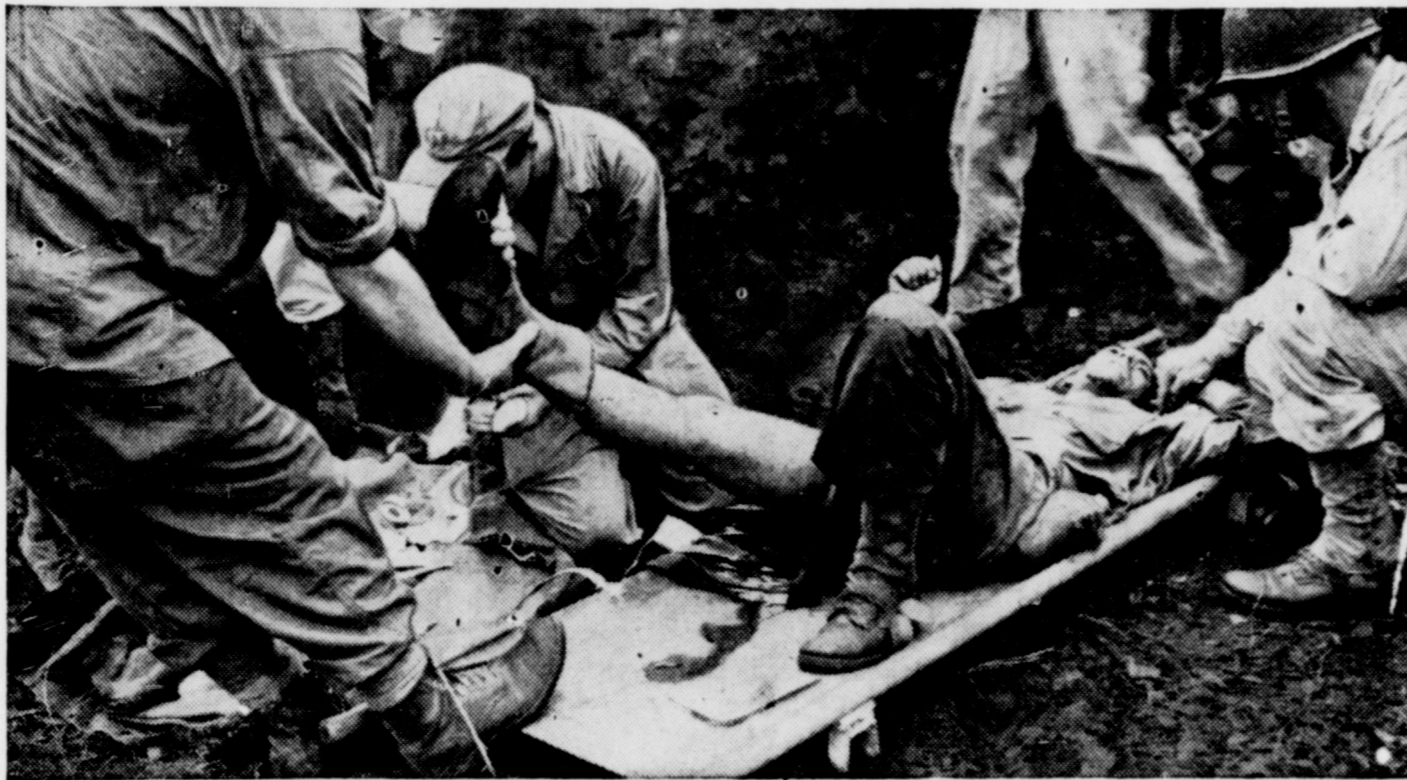

240,000 Pounds Wool Appraised

Approximately 240,000 pounds of wool were appraised at the Martin C. Reed Wool Warehouse here last week by government appraisers, Tom Richey, Joe Hunter, and Bob Miller. On hand at the warehouse still to be appraised are 700,000 pounds.

The wool was appraised at prices ranging from 45.63c to 55.66c with an average of 52.27c. The net average was 47.84c.

Martin Reed, owner and manager of the warehouse, hopes to have another appraisal within the next two weeks.

North Concho River Soil Conservation District News

W. M. Key Jr. made application for district assistance in planning a conservation program on his 10 section ranch 37 miles southwest of Sterling City. He is interested in establishing management practices which will materially reduce the amount of necessary winter feeding, insure more feed production from range grasses, and establish a grass reserve to carry his livestock through extreme drought and other adverse weather conditions.

Roland Lowe has a good growth of sudan and Johnson grass on the portion of his 40 acre field which received added water from his water spreading terrace system at the time of the 2.2 inch rain June 5, 1944.

J. H. and Harold McCabe have a good stand of young feed up on land prepared by the stubble mulch method of tillage.

The recent high winds and hot temperature have evaporated all available moisture from range areas with poor vegetative cover whereas on areas with a good growth of buffalo and side oats grama there is still a considerable amount of available moisture for plant growth to a depth of 33 inches.

The following grasses are growing in the grass plots on the court house lawn:

Buffalo, mesquite, tobosa, African love, weeping love, Hallis panicum, big muhly, red grama, blue grama, Texas grama, black grama, slender grama, silver beard and little bluestem. Each grass plot is properly labeled.

Latin-American Scholarship at Texas University Honoring Miss Ethel Foster



MISS ETHEL FOSTER, T.F.W.C. PRESIDENT, HONORED BY DISTRICT PRESIDENTS

Creation of a Latin-American scholarship at the University of Texas for the 1944-45 school term, honoring the president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, Miss Ethel Foster, Sterling City, was announced last Saturday. Recipient of the scholarship which will be the federation's second to be awarded next term to Latin-American girl students, will be announced soon. Last year's student under the scholarship was Miss Suzanne Gullipote of Argentina, a biology major. Arrangements for the scholarship to be financed by district presidents, was a feature of the summer council of district presi-

dents, Thursday and Friday at federation headquarters in Austin. Outlines of national and state projects of wartime significance were presented by Miss Foster.

District projects for the coming season were discussed from the standpoint of developing local club's war activities along the organization lines of the state aid general federation war programs. Miss Foster also laid stress on the necessity of immediate preparation for support of postwar programs for employment for returned soldiers.

The federation also launched a program of financial aid to the nursing program. In view of the dire need of nurses by the Army

and Navy, the TFWC is helping the different nursing schools which endeavor to fill the needs for trained nurses.

Mrs. C. L. Allen of Dallas died there Monday. The widow of C. L. Allen, former Sterling attorney, Mrs. Allen was a sister-in-law of Mrs. W. L. Foster. Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Hildebrand attended the funeral services in Dallas Wednesday.

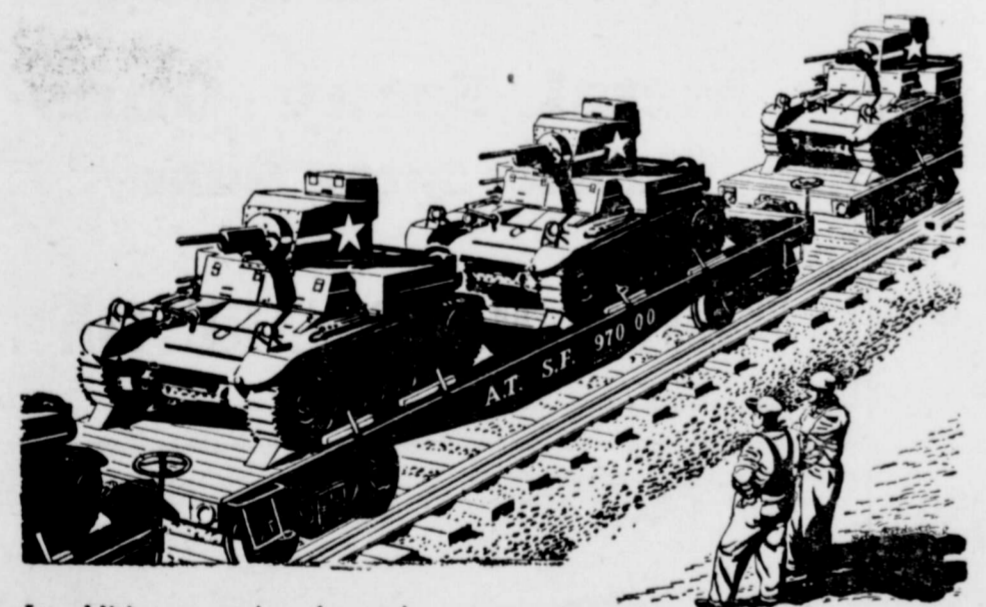

Sterling Boy Scouts Take Honors at Summer Camp

Scouts Jackie Durham, Ancel Reed, Billy Findt, Joe Snead, Norvin Brown, Billy Rusk and DeWitt Snead, along with Scoutmaster Harold Kautz returned last Sunday from a busy and profitable week of summer camp at Camp Louis Farr near Mertzon.

Troop 51 was highly honored on two occasions. There were more than 150 Scouts in camp and only 10 were chosen for initiation into the honorary organization of the Order of the Arrow. Two of these 10, Jackie Durham and Ancel Reed, were chosen from the local troop which had only 7 boys in attendance.

The second honor came at the end of the camp session when the Sterling City boys were awarded the Good Appearance Banner for being the best uniformed, cleanest and best behaved troop, and for having the best and cleanest camp throughout the entire session.

The highlight of recreational games was the Commando Battle which took place on Wednesday and Thursday. The camp was divided into two armies with Scouts acting as officers in accordance with their rank in Scouting. The battle took place over two sections of ranch land with Spring Creek serving as the boundary between enemy territories. Each army had an air field, radio station, bomb site, headquarters, and capitol to defend, and the strategy was left to the Scouts initiative. The Scoutmasters had no part in the game except to try to guess what the strategy would be, and to watch the battles unfold.

Ammunition consisted of small paper sacks of flour which would mark the victim when hit and determine whether he was killed or wounded. All raids were run like clock work, and if an objective was not gained at a specific time the attacking army lost that particular battle.

Preparations started at 2 p. m. War was declared at 4:30 p. m. on Wednesday and continued until 1 a. m. Thursday when a truce was declared. The battle started again at 5 a. m. and ended at 11 a. m. on Thursday. During this time the boys cooked their meals and slept wherever they happened to be.

The purpose of this mock battle was not to train young boys for war, but to give them training in stalking, cooking and sleeping out with little equipment, first aid, leadership, swimming fully clothed, taking and giving instructions, and to accomplish tasks within set periods of time.

A Court of honor was held in the mess hall at the end of the camp session to award honors gained and to issue certificates and badges for advancement in Scout-

ing. Jackie Durham, Ancel Reed, Billy Rusk, Joe Snead, Norvin Brown, DeWitt Snead, Billy Findt, and H.M. Kautz were awarded Honor Campers badges.

DeWitt Snead was awarded his badge for the rank of Second Class Scout.

Merit badges earned toward the ranks of Life and Eagle Scout were as follows:

Joe Snead--Life Saving, Pioneering and Swimming; Jackie Durham--Life Saving, Pioneering and Swimming; Norvin Brown -- Life Saving, Pioneering and Swimming; Ancel Reed--Pioneering and Public Health; Billy Rusk--Bird Study, Camping, Life Saving, Swimming and Pioneering; Billy Findt--Pioneering; Harold Kautz--Bird Study, Camping, Grasses, Pioneering and Swimming.

The Rattlesnake Patrol, which produced two Order of the Arrow candidates, received a Class A camping ribbon. The Kangaroo Patrol was awarded a Class B ribbon.
