Democratic Primary Election Tomorrow, Saturday, July 22

No Run-off in Sterling County

The Democratic Primary election will be held Saturday, July 22. There will be no run-off or second primary here in Sterling County, so Saturday's election is the one that counts. There will be a bulletin board in front of the Utilities office Saturday night where the county and state returns will be posted. The polls open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m., said Chairman Homer Pearce.

The voting places and election judges are as follows in Sterling County:

Prec. 1, L. R. Reed, election judge—at the courthouse.

Prec. 2, Robert Foster, election judge—at Roy Foster's ranch.

Prec. 3, J. T. Brannan, election judge—at Tommy Humble's ranch.

Prec. 4, Mrs. H. Garlington, election judge—at Moon Chapel Church.

Prec. 5, N. H. Reed, election judge—at N. H. Reed's ranch.

Prec. 6, Mrs. W. N. Reed, election judge—at W. N. Reed's ranch.

Prec. 7, L. H. Bade, election judge—at Mrs. H. Bade's ranch.

There are only two contested races in the county. Vern Davis, incumbent, and John Skeete, are in the race for sheriff, tax assessor and collector. Mrs. Leah Wyckoff and W. W. Durham are in the race for county and district clerk.

Chairman Pearce reminded that precinct conventions will be held Saturday at 2:00 p. m. to elect delegates to the county convention. A convention will be held July 29 to elect delegates to the state convention.

August 1 is the final day for candidates to file their expense accounts with the clerk.

North Concho River Soil Conservation District News

John Reed and Herman Garlington have made post pulling easy by the use of two old cultivator wheels and a 4" x 4" attached to the axle which acts as a lever to lift the post out of the ground. This post puller is a labor saving device and reduces the hazard of back strain in removing posts.

The 30 ranches on which conservation plans have been completed have an average of 3/4 miles of fireguards per section. Representative of this type of protection from loss of range grasses by prairie fires are the 35 miles of fireguards run by W. N. and L. R. Reed, the 10 miles run by Riley King, and the 4 miles run by Fred Hodges.

The county equipment of the several counties in the district has been used to run all fireguards except those along the highways which have been built with state highway equipment.

Soils and range surveys are in progress on the W. M. Key, Jr. ranch southwest of Sterling City.

Marine Corporal Was Fighting Japs

Word was received on July 13, 1944 by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Rhoden of Kerrville, Texas, that Cpl. Durwood Rhoden, U. S. M. C., was killed in action in the performance of his duty and service of his country. No other information is available at present according to the telegram from Lt. Gen. A. A. Vandergrift.

Durwood was born in San Saba County but had resided in Sterling County eleven years prior to his enlistment in the Marine Corps. He was a graduate of Sterling high school in 1941. After his basic training he came home for a 10 day leave in November 1941. He was shipped overseas in January 1942.

He served at Gaudalcanal with the Engineers of the 2nd Marine Division, after which he spent 9 months in a rest camp in New Zealand. While there he announced his engagement to Lynette Mitchell of Wellington, New Zealand.

When completely recovered from malaria contracted in the Solomons, he went into action on Tarawa where he was decorated for outstanding ability. He was then put into a rest camp for a short rest and was believed to have been killed on Saipan as the 2nd Division was known to have been there.

The survivors include his parents, five brothers, Darrell, Dan, Bradford and Alton all of Kerrville, and Clyde of Sterling City, and one sister, Mrs. Gordon Daves of Sterling City.

Mrs. Hubert Williams, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Will Meyer, returned Wednesday from Temple. Mrs. Williams went through the clinic there to ascertain causes of frequent headaches. Mr. Meyer met their train in San Angelo Wednesday morning.

Hot Suds, Clean Towels, Banish Dishwater Bacteria



The easy way with dishes is the systematic way. Scrape, rinse and stack dishes in an orderly arrangement. Use 2 dishpans or 1 dishpan and drain basket unless you have a divided sink with stoppers. In one pan have hot, sudsy water. Keep boiling water at hand for rinsing.



Wash glasses first; a dish mop is handy for cleansing inside them.



Silver should be thoroughly washed, rinsed and placed on a folded towel, or pad to avoid scratching. Kitchen silver may be placed in the drain basket or rinse pan.

"YOU can't do business with dishwater bacteria. They don't understand polite hints. Banish them!" That's the advice to housewives given by Marjorie Griffin, Home Editor of Capper's Farmer, a publication of national circulation. "Sparkling china and gleaming silver may be beautiful homes to many families, even unto the millionth generation—of bad little bacteria," writes Miss Griffin. "The gentle hints of half-way dishwashing just encourage the squatters. They thrive and multiply in lukewarm water, on dishcloths and dish towels. They'll go on making themselves at home, spreading colds and other contagious diseases until their unwilling hostess puts an end to them. "If she's wise, she'll use plenty of hot, sudsy water, the cleanest of clean dishcloths and towels and scalding water. She will change the water before it gets cold and gray." Students at Washburn University who studied supposedly clean dishes under a microscope found colonies of bacteria—all descendants from early settlers left living on a cup washed by ordinary methods.

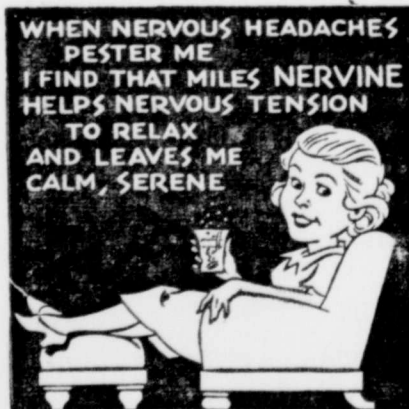
Mrs. T. Revell Is Club Hostess

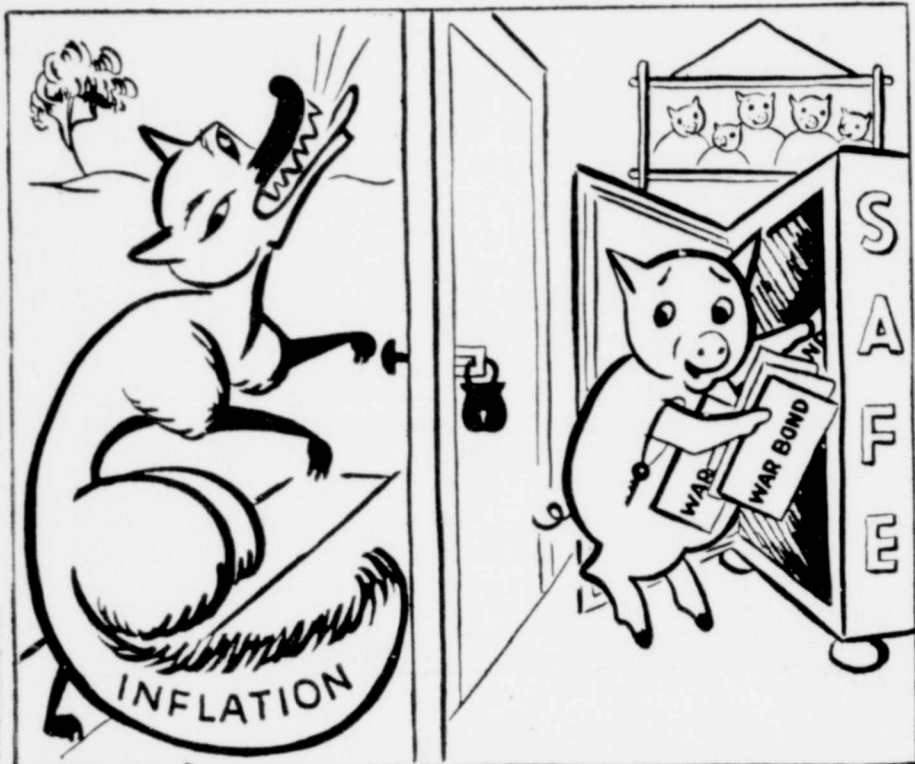
4-H Club Goes All Out in War Bond Effort
