Commissioners Court Approves '45 Budget

Court Plans For \$29,254.30 in Expenditures

The Sterling County Commissioners Court held the annual budget hearing Monday of this week. The open meeting was held and the budget for 1944 was approved.

With an estimated income from all taxes (in 1945) of \$27,682.50 and a balance from 1944 of \$12,025.36, the court expects to have \$39,657.86 in 1945. The approved budget calls for expenditures of \$29,254.30 in 1945 which would leave a balance of \$10,403.56 at the end of 1945.

Included in the approved expenditures for next year is the paying off of \$1800.00 in road machinery warrants. This will leave the bonded indebtedness of Sterling County as follows:

Courthouse Bonds . . \$37,500.00
Bridge Bonds 2,000.00
Road Bonds 124,000.00

The State of Texas has assumed 95 and 24-100% of the road bond issue, which really makes the county's bonded indebtedness total only \$45,880.00, which is indeed a low indebtedness for a county.

The Sterling County Commissioners Court is composed of G.C. Murrell, County Judge, and Commissioners Roy Foster, Herbert Cope, L.R. Knight, and Bill Reed.

Jack and Joe Mims are making full use of the rain that falls on their range land. By stocking their range at the rate that the range vegetative survey reveals that the range grasses are producing feed, the range has improved to the extent that the more desirable grasses as buffalo, side oats grama, and hairy grama are spreading to constitute a high percent of the total grasses. This good cover of grasses in effect increases Mims' rainfall by: 1. holding up runoff water, and 2. cutting down on evaporation. With the increase in the more palatable grasses more total feed will be produced by range vegetation.

Supervisors Zach Jones, Lee Reed and J. R. Mims met for their regular monthly meeting on Monday, September 11.

Conservation plans on W. M. Key, Jr. ranch, Foster S. Price Silver and Panther Gap ranches, and W. Y. Bengé, Jr., and Preston C. Barker stock farms were approved.

Jeff Davis, Will Durham and W. Y. Bengé, Jr. made application for assistance in working out conservation plans on their respective farms and ranches. These applications were approved by the supervisors.

A terrace system was worked out on Herman Garlington's new cultivated field on the Stamp Section.

The divide farmers are utilizing moisture from recent good rains to plant small grain. This grain will produce much winter feed for livestock.

MEATS, FATS—Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through G5, good indefinitely.

PROCESSED FOODS—Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through L5 good indefinitely.

SUGAR—Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33 each good for 5 pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for 5 pounds of canning sugar through February, next year.

GASOLINE—A 12 coupons good through September 21.

SHOES—Airplane stamps 1 and 2 good indefinitely.

INCOME TAX—Quarterly payments due September 15.

BLUE TOKENS, FAREWELL

If you've got some blue tokens in your purse, better use them now, because after September 30 they will be good only for the kids to play with. Until next Sunday, the Office of Price Administration says, you can use them just as you always used them. Beginning Sunday, September 17, retailers will cease giving blue tokens to consumers as ration change, and shoppers will be able to spend them only in groups of 10. If necessary, shoppers may pool tokens to make up groups of 10. Removal of practically all canned and bottled vegetables and fruit spreads and specialties from rationing September 17 makes use of blue tokens unnecessary. Beginning September 17 point values on canned fruits, canned juices, canned tomatoes, catsup and chili sauce will be designated in multiples of 10.

SHOE RATIONING STILL WITH US

Civilians cannot hope for an early end of shoe rationing, WPB says, unless imports of hides increase or unless there is a large cutback in military orders. Hide shortages continue in spite of a large domestic kill of cows and calves. Heavy civilian and military consumption and decreased imports account for the shortages.

Unemployment Benefits for Veterans

The Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission has signed an agreement with the Administrator of Veterans Affairs whereby the State Agency will handle for the Veterans Administration the payment of readjustment allowances under Title V of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944.

The Commission says that its employees will be in position to start accepting applications for readjustment allowances from discharged veterans of World War II immediately. Claims may be filed with Commission representatives at any of the twenty-three offices of the Commission or the 137 itinerant service points scattered throughout the State.

The Serviceman's Readjustment Act of 1944 provides that honorably discharged veterans of World War II may be entitled to readjustment allowance provided they have had active service since September 16, 1940. Such active service must have been ninety days or longer, or the veteran must have been discharged due to service connected disability.

In order to be eligible, a veteran must be totally unemployed, or partially unemployed, or self-employed and earning less than \$100 per month and must be registered for work at an employment service office. He must be able to work and available for work and a resident of the United States at the time of filing claims.

Depending upon a veteran's length of service, readjustment allowances may vary in duration from eight weeks minimum to a fifty-two week maximum. Readjustment allowances are payable during a period of two years after discharge or termination of the present war, whichever is the later date. Totally unemployed veterans who file claims, and are otherwise eligible, will receive \$20 per week, while those who are partially employed may receive the difference between their weekly earnings and \$23.00. Claims for readjustment allowances will be taken on a weekly basis and checks in payment thereof mailed weekly to eligible veterans.

Your BABY

The problem of baby's first semi-solid foods has puzzled many mothers. Cereal is usually the first of these.

Whole grain cereals, such as ready-to-serve strained oatmeal or cereal food are available with minerals and vitamins added. While whole grain cereals contain coarse fiber (which is not suitable for the sensitive digestive tract of a baby) the nutritive substances in these whole grains are of value. So the problem of preparing cereals for baby is one of using whole grain cereals prepared in suitable form for the feeding of infants.

These cereals can be obtained in forms especially prepared for infants. They both taste good and babies like them and thrive on them because they are fine in texture. For instance, an available ready-to-serve cereal food is a wheat cereal. It is a thoroughly cooked mixture of finely ground whole wheat, farina and corn meal to which have been added wheat germ, malt, dried yeast and calcium, phosphorus and iron salts.

Prepared strained oatmeal is an oat cereal and is wheat-free. The mixture of finely ground oatmeal, dried yeast, and calcium, phosphorus and iron salts is thoroughly cooked, strained, dried and is ready to serve by adding milk. I suggest that you alternate the use of both of these cereals with baby. This is called the two-cereal idea! By giving variety at each feeding, most babies will eat better because they like a change of menu too! Many Doctors think the two-cereal idea so good that they're recommending it to Mothers, and so do I.

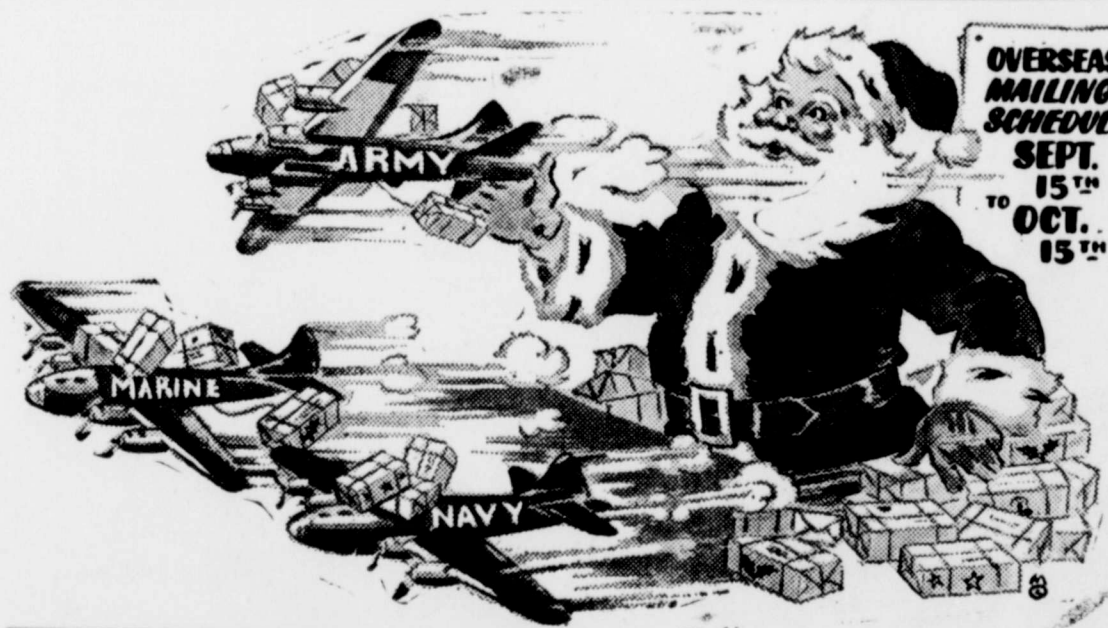
