Four Receive Malcom Black Sentences in First in Garden Contest

PLANE TALK

Small communities cannot ignore the Air Age because they are not reached by the airlines. The ghost towns of the future will have died because they had no landing strip.

Indicative of the interest in providing landing strips for their towns are the many requests for airport information received from town officials, chambers of commerce, fliers, and oil companies with gas stations to revamp.

An advantage to the average little town in carrying out landing strip plans now, is prestige for progressiveness in stimulating the growth of new industry; there will be new jobs around the airport, more transient trade will come to the town; other industries will like the location if raw materials and parts are accessible by air and town merchants can fly in special merchandise for their customers. Bulwarking these points is the theory that once there are landing facilities in an area, people's interest in buying or renting planes and flying will snowball rapidly.



All that is needed is a straight sod strip at least 1800' by 100', running into the prevailing winds, a wind sock, a direction pointer, air-marking numerals and corner markers. This is the minimum. It should be near the town and highway, allowing for expansion into a regular airport complete with hangars, servicing facilities, parking space, shops, etc. Even though planning along this line is greatly encouraged, care should be taken to insure that large expenditures are not made for improvements which may become obsolete within a few years.

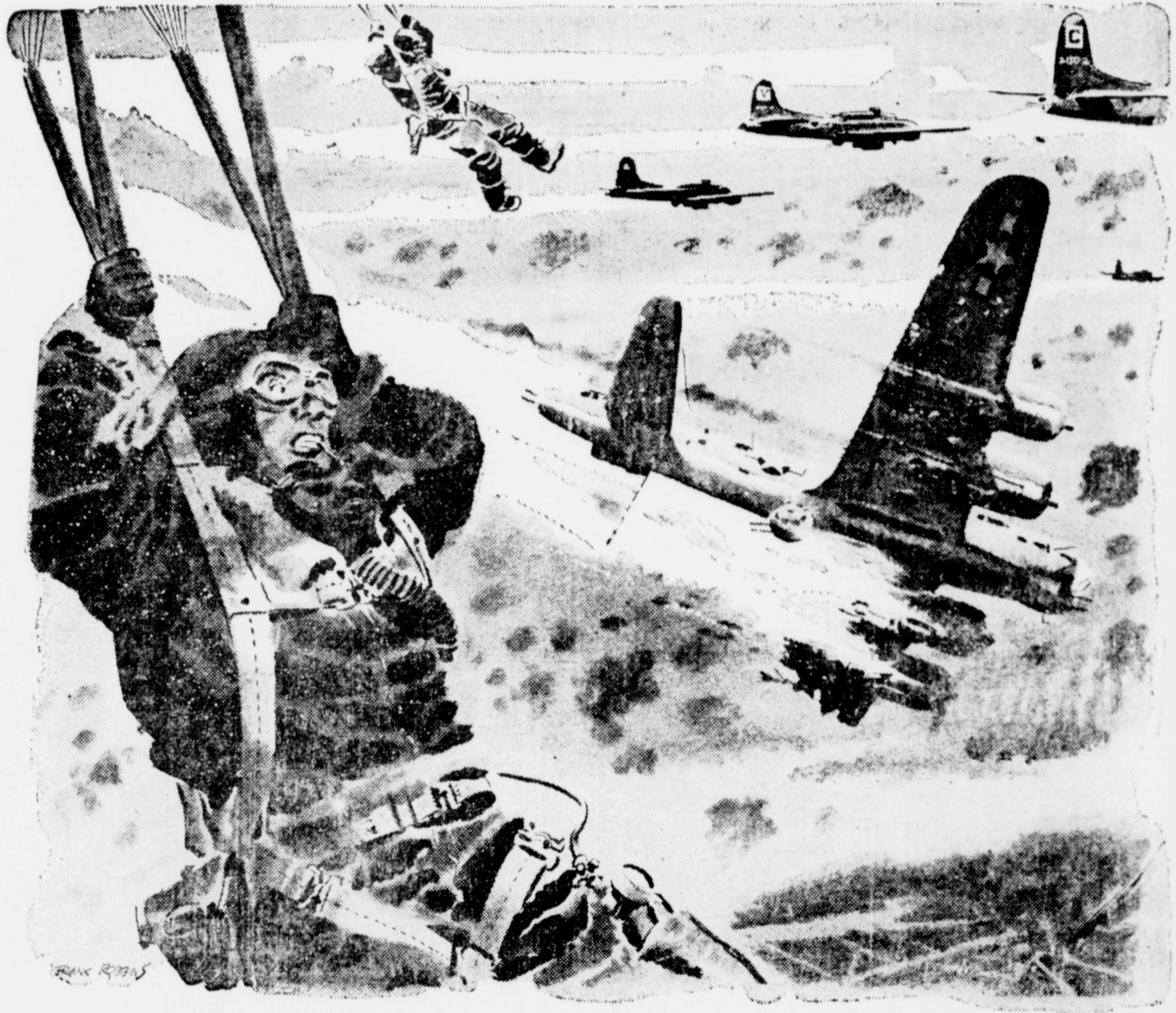

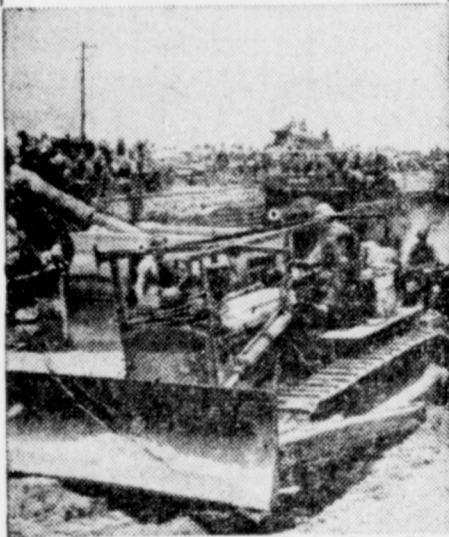

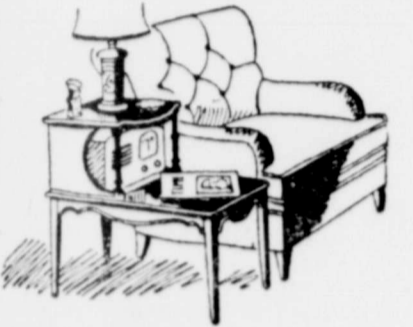

Herman Garlington has grazed a field of Sudan which was planted during the summer, thus giving partial deferment to his range.

J. S. Cole marketed two truck loads of lambs last week. They weighed 70 pounds and sold for 12 1/2 cents. A large percentage of Cole's lambs have been marketed from the range this year.

Clyde Reynolds sold 386 old ewes last week. He deferred a 6 section pasture for three months this summer. A 285 acre trap has been rested since last summer and has a good growth of side oats grama and buffalo grass.

Robert Foster used a small grader and a 1917 model tractor to build his road blocks and a diversion terrace to divert runoff water from his headquarters. The small grader did a very satisfactory job. These measures cost only time and fuel for the tractor.

Clyde Reynolds cross fenced a six section pasture this year to obtain more uniform grazing and to reduce the size of the flock of sheep grazing in one group.

Will Meyer, local market man, bought four calves and three hogs at the auction ring in San Angelo last Friday.

DETROIT, MICH.—Test flights have been completed over the city here for the first helicopter to be built by Nash-Kelvinator Corp. for the Army Air Forces, marking the successful application of automotive assembly line technique of mass production to the manufacture of this versatile new-type aircraft.

First reports of helicopters in war action occurred with the invasion of Burma when they were used to evacuate wounded from inaccessible points. More recently they were reported to have rescued American flyers shot down behind Jap lines. The Nash-Kelvinator-built Helicopter, shown above, takes off from the company's "pocket" airport, straight up, in its first test flight. This machine, a joint Army-Navy development, is a single rotor type, having three blades, top speed in excess of 100 m.p.h., carries fuel for five hours flight, and will climb to 4,000 feet in seven minutes, according to George W. Mason, company president.

Your
BABY

By Lillian B. Storms

A few years ago the development of milk formulas which were very satisfactory for large numbers of babies resulted in less and less breast feeding. Nevertheless, medical opinion is more and more in favor of mothers making every effort to nurse their babies.

The baby given his mother's milk has some advantages which the bottle-fed baby does not have. When a mother realizes these advantages, she will try to nurse her baby. Usually, she can nurse her baby if she wants to do so, and if she will plan her own diet and regimen accordingly.

Worry and nervousness are apt to interfere with the natural flow of milk. The new mother should take things easily and especially should she relax when nursing her baby. This ease and enjoyment of her baby has its effect on the infant. He soon learns that mealtimes are happy times, he has his mother's reassuring presence and the food itself gives him pleasure.

Good food habits are established early, long before very much variety of food is given. Food becomes associated with enjoyment, pleasure and satisfaction. Most healthy babies will eat as much food as they need. Some eat much more than others of the same age, because babies differ in size and activity. If mothers allow their babies to eat the food they want, without urging, mealtimes will continue to be happy times.

Other foods are gradually introduced. First, orange juice and cod liver oil are given to the baby within the first two weeks; next, the baby cereals; then the strained vegetables and fruits, egg yolk and zweiback which gives those first front teeth something to bite on. These foods are added to the baby's menu one at a time, allowing plenty of time for each new food to become thoroughly familiar before another one is given. It all helps in keeping mealtimes happy times, and supplying those food substances which are needed for growth and health.
