The truck, loaded with cottonseed, had lost a wheel and was stalled. The driver, E. D. Curtright of San Angelo, had set out lighted flares around the truck.

Joe Emery and Dr. W. J. Swann made the run in Lowe's ambulance and later Dr. Swann accompanied McNurland to the San Angelo hospital. His nose was broken and two ribs were cracked.

McNurlen operates the Rainbow Inn in Odessa, and Mrs. Elliott was a waitress in the Elliott Hotel coffee shop.

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


SEA BEE SAM MORGAN

He spent 27 months in the South Pacific doing construction work. Sam said that those months were the longest summer he had ever seen and that he was really glad to see our cold weather while he was here. He hopes to be in the states for four months before shipping out again.

1. Tec. John D. Murrell, ASN 38431190, Medical Detachment, Special Troops, 27th Infantry Division, was attached to this organization from July 29, 1944 to October 12, 1944 inclusive, during the Saipan, Mariana Island operations. During that time his efforts were untiring in administering first aid to the officers and men of this unit which numbered more than two hundred (200). Tec. 5 Murrell Sea Bee Spent was to a large degree responsible for maintaining a standard of health within this unit, which made for higher combat efficiency and excellent state of morale.

> 2. When the dengue epidemic started to spread throughout the unit, Tec. 5 Murrell immediately erected a hospital tent in the Company area. There he assembled his patients and kept a close contact on their ailments. He personally took care of their feeding to make sure they received the proper diet. Besides caring for the dengue patients, he had his regular schedule for sick call three times a day. But regardless of this he was always ready and willing to administer first aid at any time of day or night. His days were never ended.

3. The officers and men of the 27th Signal Company express their sincere thanks and gratitude to Tec. 5 Murrell for his excellent services rendered during the recent
