

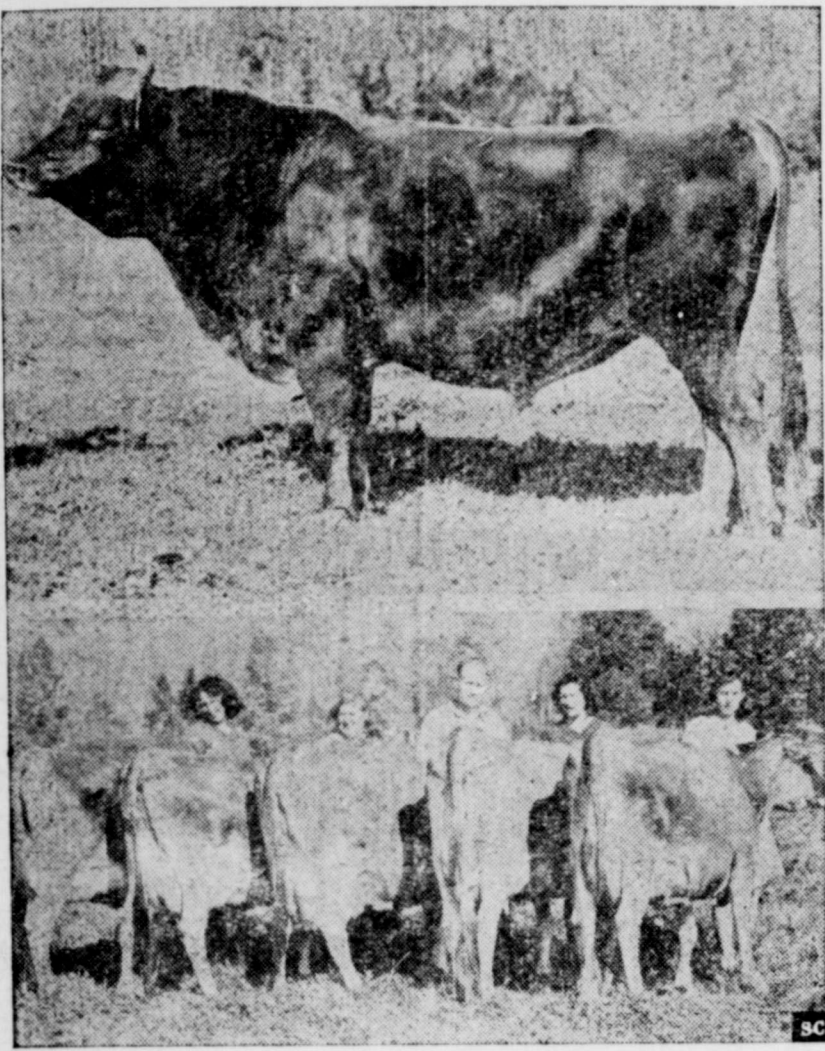

Winner of Superior Sire Award



GRANT'S PASS, ORE.—The highest living tested sire of the Jersey breed is shown at the top above after being awarded the Superior Sire award by the American Jersey Cattle club. The animal is Lilac St. Mawes Remus Rex, 396711, and has an average production on his first ten daughters of 10,977 pounds of milk, testing 5.91% to produce 649 pounds of butterfat, based on a 305 twice-a-day milking basis. He is owned by Frank Schutzwahl here.

The Navy needs and must have more radio men, personnel of the Navy recruiting office announced Monday.

Opportunity is afforded in the war's newest and most thrilling field—radar. Radio technicians have many important duties in the Navy, such as installing, repairing and maintaining radio communication equipment, radio direction finders, submarine detection apparatus and other extraordinary electronic devices. A radio technician will be qualified for many other scientific occupations.

Upon successfully passing the Eddy test you may be enlisted as a seaman first class, with pay to start with \$66 a month. Men who have successfully passed their pre-induction physical examination between the ages of 18 and 38 and men of 17 years of age may take the Eddy test at the San Angelo Navy recruiting station.

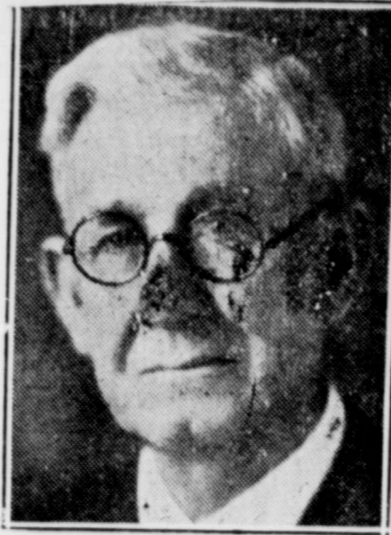

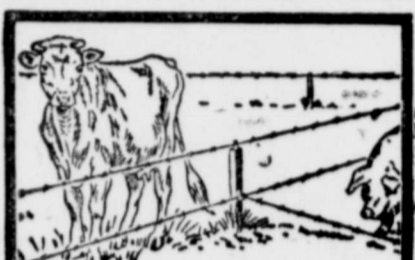

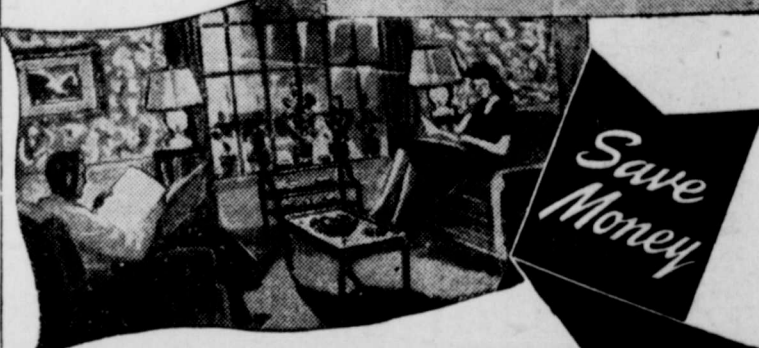
