





methods and means of solving these problems.

As an example of one of the above named problems, many ranchers in this district are deeply concerned with the fact that the underground water level along the North Concho River and its tributaries is gradually becoming lower.

W. L. Foster, who has been ranching in Sterling County for 63 years, stated that when he first came to this county, cattle watered year around from several miles distance at a deep hole of water in Sterling Creek, ten miles up the creek from the point where it runs into the North Concho River. There has been little or no water at this location for the past 20 years. A well dug 20 feet deep near this location in the early days furnished an abundant supply of water at that time, however, the water level in the well lowered to the extent that it has been dry for the past years. Mr. Foster states further that many springs along the creek, which once furnished large quantities of stock water, have been dry most of the time for the past 20 to 30 years. Sterling Creek is one of the main tributaries of the North Concho

Mr. J. L. Glass, who first came to Sterling County in 1883, recalls that the North Concho River ran from a perennial spring just above the George McEntire crossing, fourteen miles northwest of Sterling City. This spring has been dry for several years. Mrs. J. L. Glass, whose home forty years ago was on the banks of the North Concho River, nine miles northwest of Sterling City, states that she remembers the river at the time as a clear running stream with holes of deep clear water with very little brush undergrowth in the stream.

There are some "tricks" about introducing new foods which it is just as well to know about even though you may not need to use

Most babies love cod liver oil, providing mother doesn't show in any way that she doesn't like it. It is not a good practice to mix it with other foods. Give it before the bath so that if some is spilled it doesn't get on his clothes.

Orange juice is diluted with boiled and cooled water. If it seems to upset him it may be put into his milk. If he is breast-fed, postpone giving it for two or three weeks

giving it for two or three weeks and then start again. It may be added to the milk and put on his cereal and thus diluted.

Cereals, the special pre-cooked baby cereals, are usually the first more solid foods given a baby. At first use enough milk to make it quite liquid, more nearly like a thickened milk than a cereal. If your baby is breast-fed, starting cereal gives you an opportunity to introduce another form of milk—usually diluted evaporated milk.

When the first strained vegetable or fruit is given, it is fed with a spoon. This method helps to accustom your baby to the spoon as a utensil. If he doesn't seem to like the new food, remember it

like the new food, remember it is a new texture and consistency and not so much a matter of a new taste. Dilute it with milk for the first few feedings. Either vegetable or fruit may be thickened with some of his cereal. It makes the new food more like the cerea! he already knows.

### Tips to Bride Include 'No' on Oven Peeking


NEW YORK, F Blondie the Bride can take ner culinary efforts easier these days.

For instance, in using the electric range, manufacturers sug-

"Do not baste meats when they are being roasted in a thermostatically controlled and fully insulated electric oven. To do so wastes time, energy and electricity."

They add that with the thermostatically controlled heat, oven "peeking" is unnecessary. It wastes current and causes uneven browning.

Other points include: "Don't use a higher heat than is necessary for any cooking pro-



cess; remember, water remains the same temperature whether it is boiling gently or violently.

"Turn the current off before the cooking operation is completed to use all the stored heat. "You'll save by not pre-heating he oven too long."

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

#### CEILING PRICES ON LIVE HOGS



Under the present regulations, the ceiling price for all live barrows and gilts is \$14.75 per hundredweight and for all sows, stags and boars the ceiling is \$14.00 per hundredweight.

These ceiling prices are for Chicago only, and vary from market to market. The difference between the ceilings for sows, stags and boars, and for barrows and gilts is 75c at all markets, however.

Present support prices are as follows: "Good" to "Choice" barrows and gilts that weigh between 200 and 270 pounds have a floor price of \$12.50, Chicago basis. At terminal and interior markets other than Chicago, the support price is \$2.25 below the ceiling price (as of Nov. 15, 1944) at that market for hogs within the 200 to 270 pound weight range.

These support prices will remain in effect until June 1945.



Another new year starts, full of promise, and questions for American agriculture. Will the war end in 1945? How much food will Europe need from us? Will rationing and price controls be relaxed? What about the feed situation? These are but a few of the "ifs" we are up against when we make plans for the coming year. To help livestock producers, we here condense opinions recently expressed by War Food Administration economists.

CATTLE: They foresee for '45 an increase in the number of cattle and calves slaughtered, partially as a result of the tendency to reduce the size of herds. They also expect an increase in the number of cattle fed for slaughter. From 1946 to 1949, they expect a gradual decline in slaughtering, with yearly slaughter around 28 to 29 million head.

HOGS: Their estimate of total 1945 hog slaughter is about 79 million, against approximately 100 million in '44. They expect hog production in 1946 to be close to 1945 levels, depending on the feed situation.

SHEEP, LAMBS: Slaughter in '45 will likely be the smallest since 1929, due to recent selling of breeding stock. By 1946, they see a demand far exceeding the supply, leading to possible expansion of flocks over the following five years. This trend may be upset by wool-factor uncertainties.
