North Concho River Soil Conservation District News

A number of ranchers have expressed the desire to make trial plantings of grasses from seed which the District Supervisors have requested from the Soil Conservation Nursery and which the supervisors plan to make available to ranchers cooperating with the district program. Among those who are interested in making the trial plantings of one or more acres are W. Y. Benge, Jr., Foster Conger, Robert Foster, Bade Bros., R.T. Foster, Jack Mims, Clyde Reynolds, W. W. Durham, Jeff Davis, W.B. Welch, D.D. Garrett, W. N. and L. R. Reed, George Broome, Foster S. Price, S. L. Augustine, Joe Emery, J. S. Cole, George Demere and L.R. Stringer.

These plantings will be made between February 15 and March 15. Livestock will be excluded from the planted area the first year.

N.H. Reed is very favorably impressed with the work that the beaver are doing along the North Concho river on his and adjoining ranches. He is confident that they will do much to clean out the stream and to clean out the springs along the stream bank.

C. S. Clark, chairman of the State Board of Water Engineers, states that most of the usable ground water in the watershed of the North Concho river occurs in two formations, (1) basal Cretaceous sandstones and (2) alluvial stream bed and terrace deposits. Mr. Clark states further that the reservoir in the basal Cretaceous sandstones receives its water from local rainfall by downward percolation through crevices and solution channels in the overlying limestone. The underground reservoirs in the alluvial stream bed and terrace deposits is derived from four sources: (a) Infiltration of rainfall and seepage from floods into the alluvial deposits of the river bottoms or flood plain. (b) Infiltration of rainfall and seepage from local storm runoff into alluvial deposits of terraces adjacent to the flood plain. (c) Lateral percolation into the alluvial valley reservoir from the Cretaceous sandstone in adjacent areas. (d)

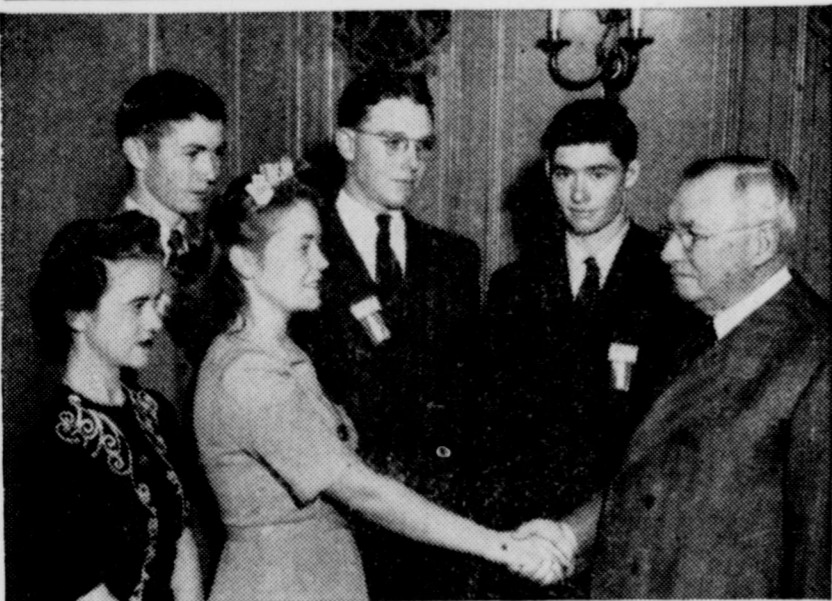

Winners In 4-H Dairy Production Contest



Five of ten winners of a national dairy production contest for 4-H Club members are shown above at the 4-H Congress in Chicago, being congratulated by J. L. Kraft, chairman of the board of Kraft Cheese Company, which sponsored the contest. They are (left to right), Dorothy Carr, Creston, Mont., Eugene Stevenson, Harvest, Ala., Hedwig Heinemann, Clearspring, Md., Wendol Christian, Farwell, Tex., and Ralph Cope, Jr., Langlois, Ore. Miss Carr has 16 purebred Jerseys, figures her profits at \$1,232 in 10 years of club work. Stevenson was state dairy winner in 1943 and 1944. His herd is 14 Jerseys. Dairy products and animals sold have brought him \$1,858. Miss Heinemann has had six years of dairy projects in clubwork and has acted as a herd tester in her county. Dairy exhibits have brought her \$284.44 in prize money. Christian also has a herd of Jerseys. He won a silver trophy at the Panhandle Plains dairy show this year. Cope manages 28 Jerseys and in 10 years of operations his herd has earned \$20,187, including \$285.00 in prizes.

Postwar Kitchen Remodeling Will Save Homemaker Steps

IN REMODELING a farm kitchen for efficiency and step-saving, there are three work centers to be placed—storage, preparation and cleaning, cooking and serving, according to Marjorie Griffin, Home Editor of Capper's Farmer.

"Sometimes a fourth—planning—is included," she writes in the Rural Home department of the nationally-circulated farm magazine. "The ideal working order is left to right.

"The refrigerator, with adjacent cabinet, is the pivot of the storage center. This is advisedly placed near the back door in order that perishable foods can be put away as brought in, without crossing the room several times. The sink should be about middle way between the refrigerator and range. It is used while preparing food as well as when washing dishes. The range has advantages located near the eating nook or dining room."

No kitchen plan can meet the needs of all farm families, Miss Griffin points out. The type of farming, size of family, extra help, climate, personal habits, likes and dislikes make it necessary to vary the arrangements. In remodeling, size of rooms, structure of house, thickness of walls, number of openings and lighting will also cause variations. Basic kitchen arrangements for farm homes are in three patterns: U-shaped, L-shaped and corridor type. The U-shaped type often is seen in a medium or small room; the L-shaped plan is practical in a large kitchen; corridor arrangement fits into narrow, large space, she says.

Trays Are Trip Savers

Trays save trips from kitchen to dining room and from sink to cupboards. At the table stack dishes into glass, silverware and china groups so they can be unloaded in washing order at the sink, suggests the Home Editor of nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer.

Stuffed Baked Potato Teases Family Palate



Stuffed baked potatoes a la mayonnaise have a festive air that adds eye appeal to the dinner table and whets the family's appetite.

This recipe, prepared by Marjorie Griffin, Home Editor of the nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer, pays zestful dividends.

Baked Potatoes a la Mayonnaise
 6 large baking potatoes 1 egg separated
 1/2 c. mayonnaise 1 tsp. salt
 1/4 tsp. pepper
 Bake potatoes in hot oven (450° F) 1 hour or until done. Cut a slice from top of each and scoop out potato. Mash, add mayonnaise, egg yolk and seasonings. Refill shells. Beat egg white until stiff and heap lightly on top of each potato. Place in 350° F. oven until brown. Serves 6.

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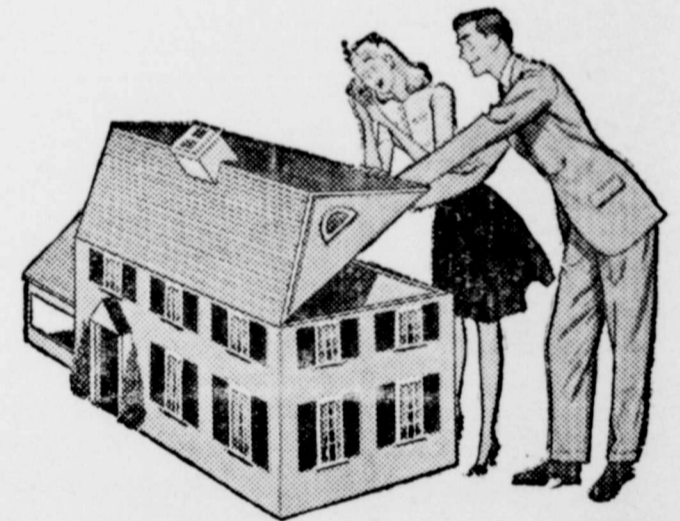

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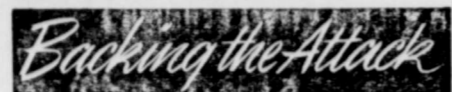

Kellis Observe 65th Wedding Anniversary

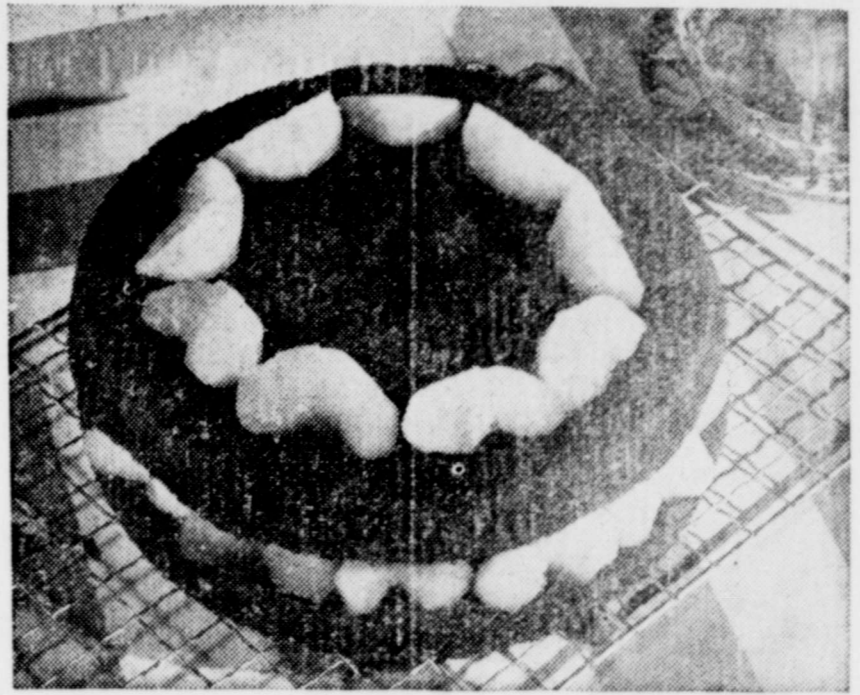

Apple-Ginger Shortcake Is Winter Treat



LIKE falling snow and sleigh riding, apples and warm gingerbread are two things that go with cold winter evenings. Marjorie Griffin, Home Editor of Capper's Farmer, points out.

"Combining the two foods gives a color - contrasting, sugar saving Apple-Ginger Shortcake," she tells home-makers in the Country Cooking department of the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families.

Apple-Ginger Shortcake

- 1/2 c. shortening
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3/4 c. light molasses
- 2 c. cake flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. soda
- 2 tsp. ginger
- 2 tsp. cinnamon
- 3/4 c. boiling water
- Apples

Cream the shortening and sugar thoroughly. Add eggs and beat well. Add molasses, then the sifted dry ingredients. Pour in water and beat until smooth. Bake in 2 greased 9-inch round pans at 350° F. for 30 minutes. Peel, core and cut apples in eighths. Drop them in sirup made with equal parts of sugar and water. Cook gently until each piece is

transparent. Remove and drain on a plate. Put apple slices between layers and on top.

Another appetite-tempting winter eve dessert that's easy on the sugar rations is Cracker Pudding.

Cracker Pudding

- 1 qt. milk
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 6 tbsp. graham cracker crumbs
- Dash of salt

Scald the milk and add finely rolled cracker crumbs. Let cool and add eggs and salt. Pour into custard cups or baking dish. Set in pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven (325°) for 30 minutes. Serve with Lemon Cream Sauce.

Lemon Cream Sauce

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1 tbsp. cornstarch
- Dash of salt
- 1/2 c. lemon juice
- 1 c. water
- 2/3 c. cream
- 2 tsp. lemon rind
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg

Beat egg yolks. Add to these the sifted sugar, cornstarch and salt. Stir in lemon juice and water and cook over hot water until thickened. Chill, add cream and stiffly beaten egg whites. Sprinkle with grated rind and nutmeg. Serves 6.

"It's an appetizing combination of two foods you've frozen in your locker or canned this last season," she writes. "Catsup with corn gives the casserole color and a palate-teasing quality."

- Corn and Pork Chop Casserole
- 5 pork chops
- 1 c. diced celery
- 1 c. soft bread crumbs
- Salt and pepper
- 1/2 c. tomato catsup
- 2 c. whole kernel corn
- 1 tsp. salt

Have chops cut 1/2 inch thick; season and brown well. Combine remaining ingredients and place in greased casserole. Top with browned chops, pressing in slightly. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 45 minutes or until chops are done. Serves 5.

Besides adding something temptingly different to the family bill-of-fare, this dish gives a tantalizing aroma and a bright new look to the table, the Capper's Farmer expert points out.

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India Curry Sauce Peps Up Cauliflower



Crown a plump head of cauliflower with teasing India curry sauce containing onion and apple and you'll add unsuspected newness and pleasure to a cold-weather meal.

That's a tip to home-makers given by Marjorie Griffin, Home Editor of nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer. Parsley or watercress garnish will give color, she says, while curry powder and tabasco sauce will pep up the blandest cauliflower.

India Curry Sauce

2 tbs. butter 1 tbs. curry powder
1 tbs. minced onion 2 tbs. flour
1 tbs. diced apple 1 c. cauliflower water
1/2 tsp. salt Parsley

Melt butter and add onion and apple; cook slowly until tender. Add salt, curry powder and flour, stirring until well blended. Slowly add cauliflower cooking water, stirring constantly. Cook over low heat about 7 minutes. Pour sauce over a head of cooked cauliflower, garnish with parsley, and serve at once. Serves 6.

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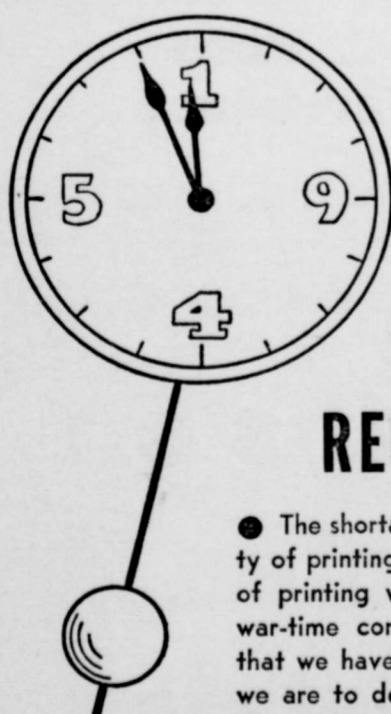
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Copeland-Gay Wedding Rites

Preparation of meat for the table is one of the oldest of the household arts. Methods of meat cookery have been handed down from one generation to another.

Within the past quarter century, however, intensive studies carried on at colleges and the U. S. Department of Agriculture have revealed new information showing how to prepare meat so as to bring out its full goodness and flavor. This in-

formation has taken the guesswork out of meat cookery and put it on a scientific basis.

Fundamentally, there are only two principles involved in cooking meat: (1) Dry heat and (2) moist heat. Tender cuts are cooked by dry heat methods—roasting, broiling and pan-broiling. The less-tender cuts are cooked by moist heat methods—braising and simmering (cooking in water). A few cuts also may be cooked by frying.

Meat cookery studies have revealed that no matter what method is used, best results are obtained with a low temperature. Among the advantages of low temperature cookery are a decrease in cooking losses, more servings, and a more tender, juicier and more palatable meat dish.

The cuts of beef, veal, pork and lamb and the variety meats suitable for each method of cooking are listed in the table above.

The modern practice of gradually introducing a variety of foods during the first year of your baby's life gives him a variety of the necessary vitamins. His food, if carefully selected, gives him the vitamins he needs just by way of checking up on these vitamins and the foods which contain them, we will summarize them.

Milk contains almost everything your baby needs, except for vitamins D and C (ascorbic acid). Vitamin D does not occur in foods in adequate amounts so we give cod liver oil or some other concentrated form. Vitamin C, or the anti-scurvy vitamin, is most abundant in citrus juices and tomato juice. These two vitamins are given in these forms in the first two to four weeks of life whether the baby is fed from the breast or bottle. Prunes do not contain Vitamin C although they have other vitamins.

Vitamin A is necessary for growth and is abundant in cod liver oil. There is some in milk, it is in cream, most vegetables, fruits, and egg yolk. All of these foods are given early in the first year. By the time the baby is six months old, he is getting some of these sources of vitamin A.

The B group of vitamins is necessary for growth and aids the appetite. Even a good appetite is not harmed by additional B vitamins, and they help the development of a sound nervous system. The B vitamins are found in milk but more are desirable. That is the reason the special baby cereals have added or, as we say, are fortified in the B-vitamins. They are also present in vegetables and fruits.

When we supply these vitamins in the foods listed, we do not need to be concerned about the other vitamins.

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
