## Kitchen Lore

Refrigerator Care

1. Place the refrigerator away from the stove, and out from the wall to permit free circulation of air around the mechanism.

2. Don't overcrowd the box or put in hot foods. Don't use it as "storage" for items that should go in the pantry.

3. Defrost regularly. If yours does not defrost automatically, turn the control to the position labeled "defrost" or pull the plug.

4. Keep the rubber sealing strip around the refrigerator door clean, see that it fits tightly. Avoid touch ing it with your hands, as perspiration or grease deteriorates the material.

5. The mechanism needs occasional cleanings. If the motor requires oil (many models do not), follow the directions in the instruction book that accompanied the refrigerator.

6. The wiring circuit from which the refrigerator gets its electricity should be protected by a fuse or a circuit breaker.

7. Keep it clean-inside and out. Occasionally wash inside with warm water and soda, when defrosting. A damp cloth - used often-will keep the outside spot-
