Post war plans for the establishment of soil and water conservation practices on ranches and farms in the district will be discussed at the regular Supervisors' meeting Friday, April 13, 1:30 p. m. at Sterling County courthouse.

The Sterling City Lions Club Post War Planning Committee, which has prepared a post war plan for Sterling County, including a number of soil conservation practices, were invited to attend this meeting in a recent letter of commendation and offer of assistance written by the supervisors to the post war planning committee. The Lions Club at its regular meeting Wednesday, April 11 voted to accept this invitation and to send the members of the committee as official representatives of the club.

Stocking range grasses with the number of livestock for which they are capable of producing feed has relieved T. H. Humble of the labor and expense of feeding ewes in a 736 acre pasture in which 35 animal units per section have been running since January 1944. The ewes in this pasture refused to eat cake this winter. They are fat and vigorous at this time. Buffalo grass, side oats grama and other more desirable grasses have definitely increased in density and vigor.

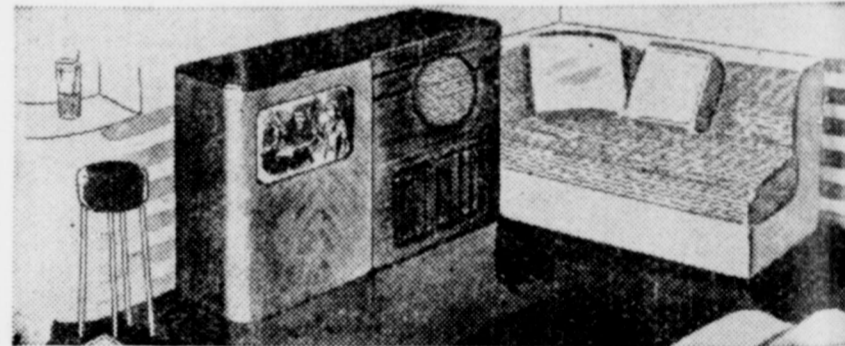

Postwar Radios Will Be Improved

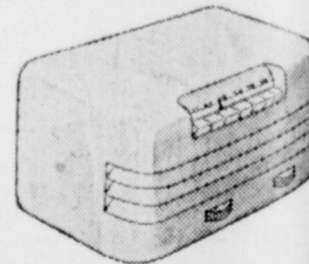


Twin instruments will provide a television receiver (left) and combination radio-phonograph equipped with frequency modulation.

NEW postwar radios which will be available in local radio and electric shops, approximately six months after hostilities cease, will look much like 1941 models, but will provide better reception, according to an article in nationally-circulated *Capper's Farmer*.

"These new radios will have more powerful tubes and other parts improved through wartime research," says the article in the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families. "They are expected to cost from a tenth to one-half more than prewar sets. "Battery sets will be more com-

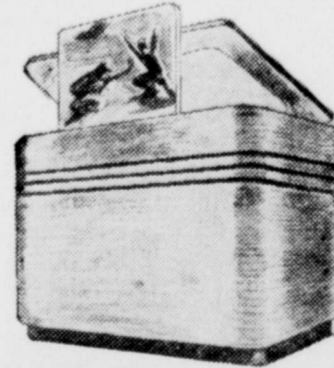
pact. Batteries will be longer lasting and some may be recharged plugging into electric outlets.



Small radios in plastic cases fit into bedrooms, kitchens, dining-rooms.

"Television no longer is around the corner. Nine telecast stations already are in operation, more applications for additional are on file with the Federal Communications Commission. New sets will be on the market six months a year after the war, but it may be some time before television broadcasts are available in rural areas.

A large percentage of the new sets will receive both the present amplitude modulation and the new frequency modulation which usually eliminates hissing, buzzing, and overlapping and other static

Winston Churchill, U. S. N., was visiting at school this week.

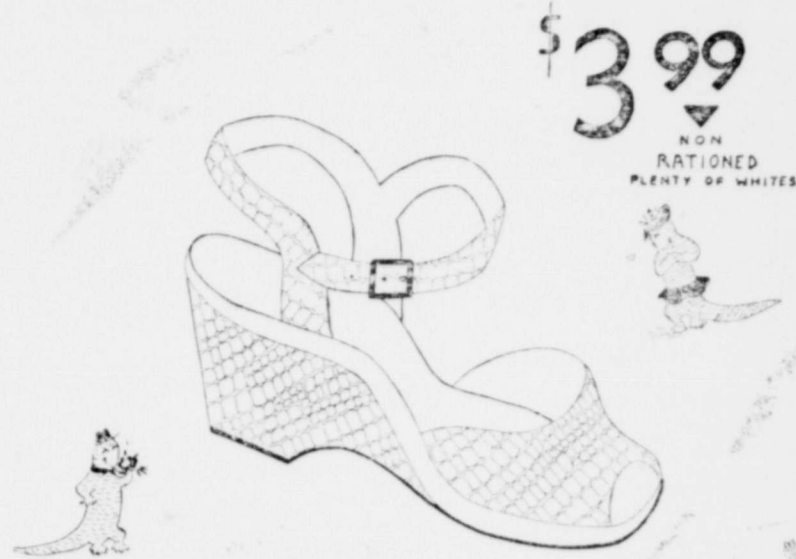

Cotton Sacks Make Smart Clothes for Family

COTTON sacks are doing double duty in these days of fabric shortages, the Home Editor of nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer points out. With a little ingenuity and various sizes of bags, one can make ingenious things for the home and smart pieces of clothing for the family.



Ready for Slumberland.

Applied cherries and red emerald rickracks give accent to these chic mother-daughter outfits," Capper's Farmer expert writes. Rough-weave, bleached cotton sacks were used. When preparing the sacks for sewing, rip the stitching and remove any printing by soaking them overnight in thick soap suds. In the morning wash them in warm, soapy water, rubbing stained parts between the hands. If it does not remove all marks, boil

for 10 minutes in soapy water. Rinse well, dry and press. If you wish, dye plain material to a preferred color.
