



Beef Cattle Subsidy

The goverment's new program to increase meat production allows 50 cents per hundredweight on good or choice cattle weighing 800 pounds or more and selling for at least 13.50.

For sales made from May 19, 1945 to June 30, 1945 applications must be filed on or before August 31, 1945. Applications shall be filed in the AAA office and the payment is available to all feeders who sell cattle for slaughter.
