## **Lester Foster Receives** The C. A. Broome Estate

#### Pays \$35 an Acre

The Broome Estate delivered last week the Broome Ranch on the Coke-Sterling county line consisting of 4,842.4 acres to Lester Foster of Sterling for \$35 an acre. This is the highest price ranch land has brought in West Texas and in its his ory. The total consideration is \$169,484.00, making it one of the largest ranch sales in this immediate section in the last few years.

The ranch is in the North Concho Valley and has several miles of Getting a Discharge river front along which grow many pecan trees. It fronts on Highway 87, between San Angelo and Sterling and has adequate shipping facilities on the Santa. Fe at the post office of Broome.

The ranch was purchased from Jim Slaton in 1907 by C.A. Broome, L. L. Farr and Brown F. Lee and consisted of 16,138 acres. In the original purchase, Mr. Broome and Mr. Farr owned two-fifths of the property each and Mr. Lee onefifth. They operated the ranch as a partnership for ten years and in 1917 divided it according to their intrests.

Mr. Broome took 6,183 acres at acres at \$11.77 an acre.

A few years later Mr. Broome bought the Lee land and Mr Lee Donald; What Clara Driscoll conbought a half interest in the Farr property, built a residence and he S. Price.



#### How 'Cold Shoulder' Pays **Precision Dividends**

Home freezers, for tasty and health ful preservation of food, are prom nent on the post-reconversion pur chase list of many a home make The prospect of freezing meats, fruits vegetables and pastries at the height of their quality to retain texture and delicacy indefinitely is particularly pleasing to those women whose responsibilities include the gastronom welfare of a family.

Equally attractive to progressive manufacturers-even to home freezer makers-are the contributions which the same low-temperature techniques and electric refrigeration equipment are making to speed new highquality products to an eager public. Through the application of subzero temperature processes, steel tools, the fingers of industry, are given life-extending hardness, keep-



ing them on the job for longer periods. Production delays for tool changes, adjustments and sharpening are strikingly lessened. Tool "absenteeism" hits a new low. The use of heat to render iron and

steel soft or hard, tough or brittle, is an art whose beginnings extend well back into history. And what small boy, of a generation ago, did not often stand in wonder at the open door of a blacksmith's shop to watch the powerful smith rhythmically apply hammer to hot steel.

Modern industrial engineers have refined heat treatment to an exact, automatically executed science, producing metal parts having many desired characteristics. The addition of cold treatment processes at 150°F below freezing now extends the hardness and uniformity range over which technologists can control the properties of metals.

Thus, low-temperature electric refrigeration units in this year's upto-date factories will help make available the sooner equipment for next year's up-to-date homes.
