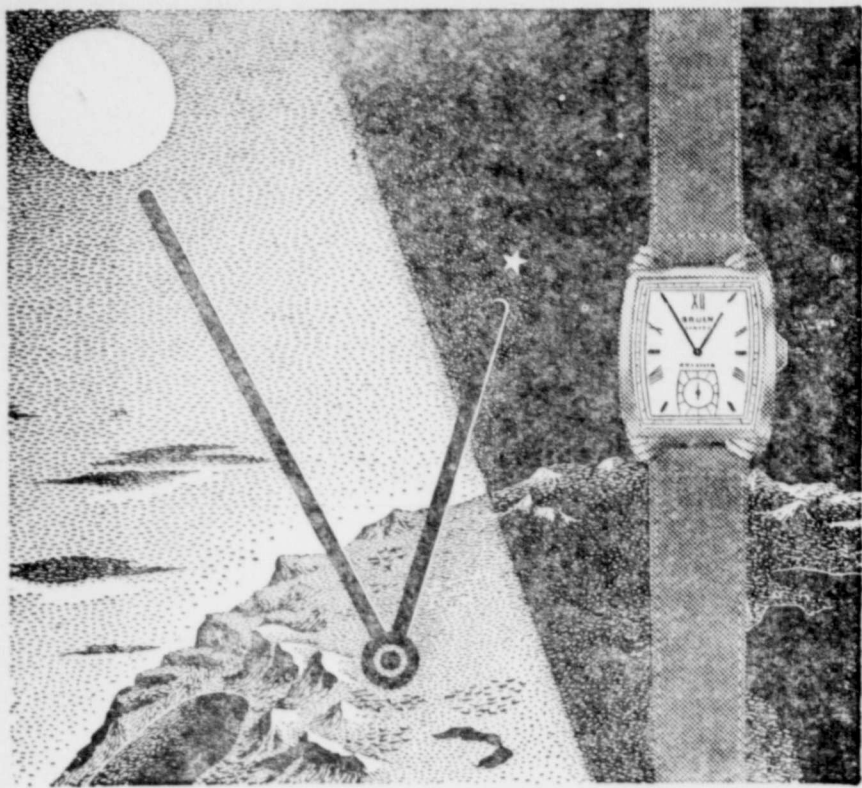

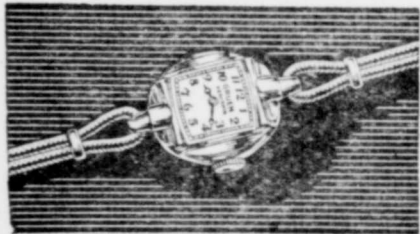

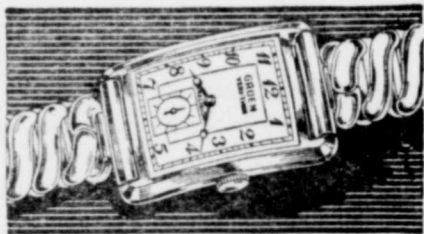

## Bing Crosby Announces Opening Of Kenny Drive

Bing Crosby, screen and radio star, today announced that the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Foundation national 1945 appeal to raise \$5,000,000 to wage a war on infantile paralysis will be held in each state from November 22 and continue through December 8.

The Paramount Pictures star is chairman of the national fund drive and has named leading businessmen and women as aides to conduct campaigns in every community.

"We owe a duty to the children of America to make this drive a success," Crosby said. "All of us know what infantile paralysis has done. There is hardly a place where the disease has not struck, leaving in its wake crippled, deformed children.

"To me nothing is more pitiful than the sight of a boy or a girl sitting in a wheel chair or standing on crutches on the sidelines while other boys romp and play.

#### Crutches Discarded

"Sister Elizabeth Kenny has proved to the world that in thousands of infantile paralysis cases these crutches and wheel chairs could have been discarded and the children could have led healthy normal lives if they had been given quick and proper treatment.

"Miss Kenny has proved also that it is unnecessary for children stricken with infantile paralysis to suffer pain, humiliating deformities and other complications.

"As the father of four children I have a deep appreciation of the work that Miss Kenny and the Elizabeth Kenny Institute are doing and I know that the people of America will join me in attaining our campaign goal and assuring the children of America that their future health will be protected."

In his announcement, Crosby emphasized that one-half of the funds in each state will remain in that state to further the campaign against infantile paralysis in local communities. Funds, Crosby said, also will help to:

Restore countless victims of infantile paralysis to normal lives.

Lessen ravages of this crippling disease for its victims.

Enable polio sufferers to recover use of their limbs.

Finance full training of Kenny technicians for permanent stay at clinics throughout the country.

#### Intensive Research

Provide periodical study courses for physicians and technicians.

Conduct intensive and nationwide clinical research on poliomyelitis and related diseases.

Perpetuate and extend the scope and benefits of the Kenny Institute not only in the United States but throughout the world.

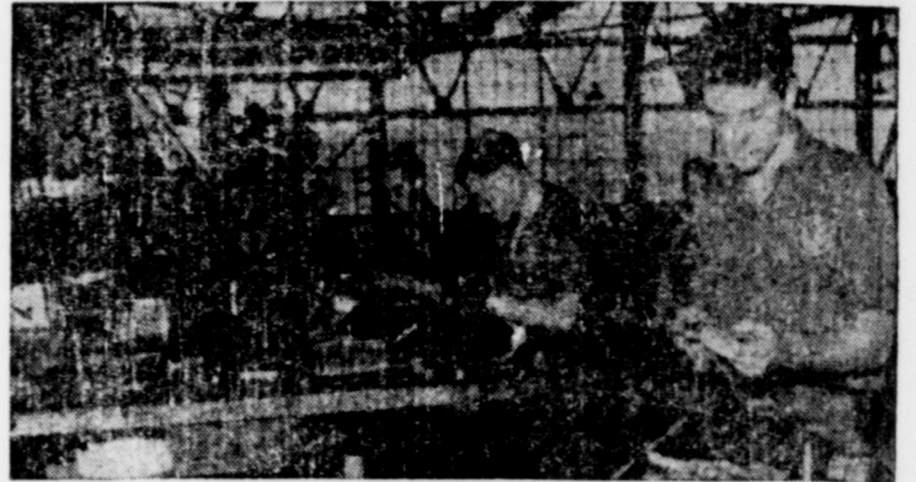

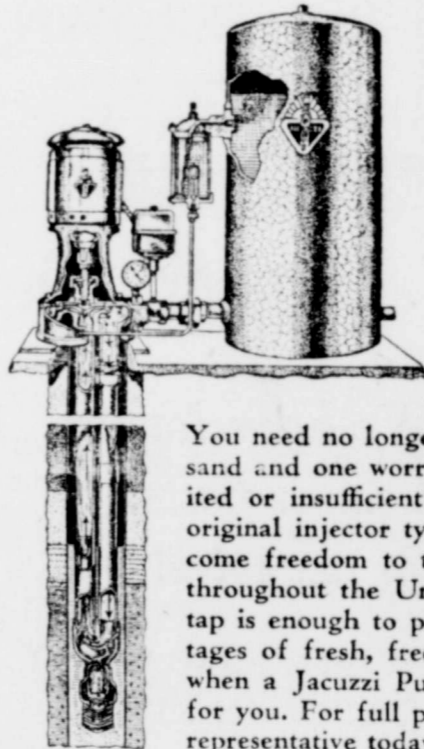

The war against infantile paralysis is a war in which all peoples of all nations have a common foe, Bing Crosby, screen and radio star and national chairman of the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Foundation national 1945 appeal, said today in an appeal for contributions.

"Wars among nations always end but the fight against disease is an unending battle in which all mankind has a common interest," said Crosby, who is directing the campaign to raise \$5,000,000 to expand the work of Sister Elizabeth Kenny, Australian nurse famous for her discovery of a revolutionary treatment for infantile paralysis.

"The war against infantile paralysis, the crippling disease, is a war in which all peoples of all nations are fighting together against a common foe," Crosby said.



**Establish Local Clinic**  
Crosby emphasized that one-half of the funds raised in each of the 48 states where the drive is being conducted will remain in the state to carry on local campaigns against the disease, to finance training of Kenny technicians for clinics throughout the country and to finance treatment of the stricken.

Funds also will be used, Crosby said, to:

- Enlarge the Elizabeth Kenny Institute in Minneapolis, Minnesota.
- Carry on extensive research as to the causes of the disease.
- Provide periodical study courses for physicians and technicians.
- Perpetuate and extend the scope and benefits of the Kenny institute not only in the United States but throughout the world.
- Lessen ravages of the crippling disease.

**Work of Altruism**

"Elizabeth Kenny's work has been a work of altruism," Crosby said. "She accepts no fees or salary from her work. Her only reward is the realization that she has brought happiness back into the lives of countless persons."

"I realize that the people of America have been called upon to contribute to many worthwhile ventures during the trying years of the war. We have won that war through the generosity and the unselfishness of the people of America but another war that rages continually remains to be won. The people of America can help win that war too—the war against infantile paralysis—by contributing as generously as their purse permits to the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Foundation campaign fund drive."

**Strikes Everywhere**

"Infantile paralysis has no particular battlefield; it has no particular foe. It attacks the White, the Negro or the Yellow man; Protestant, Catholic or Jew; the strong as well as the weak. It strikes without warning. It may strike in one section of our nation today and another tomorrow. It may strike simultaneously in many parts of the nation, in many parts of the world."

"Tomorrow it may hit your community, your family or yourself."

"The Sister Elizabeth Kenny Foundation 1945 appeal is being conducted so we can wage an all out war against infantile paralysis and just as wars among nations cost money so do wars upon disease. If we are to win the battle against infantile paralysis there must be money for research, there must be funds for the treatment of those who fall victim to its ravages."

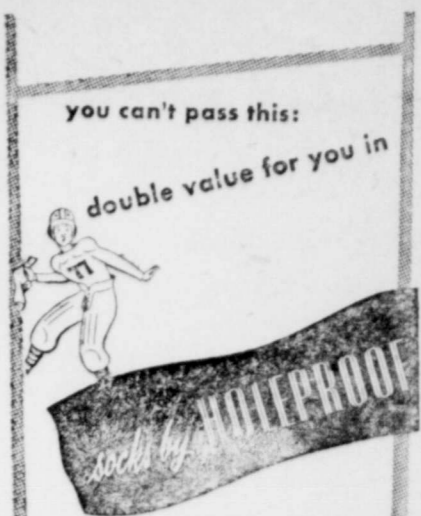

## Lester Foster Receives The C. A. Broome Estate

### Pays \$35 an Acre

The Broome Estate delivered last week the Broome Ranch on the Coke-Sterling county line consisting of 4,842.4 acres to Lester Foster of Sterling for \$35 an acre. This is the highest price ranch land has brought in West Texas and in its history. The total consideration is \$169,484.00, making it one of the largest ranch sales in this immediate section in the last few years.

The ranch is in the North Concho Valley and has several miles of river front along which grow many pecan trees. It fronts on Highway 87, between San Angelo and Sterling and has adequate shipping facilities on the Santa Fe at the post office of Broome.

The ranch was purchased from Jim Slaton in 1907 by C. A. Broome, L. L. Farr and Brown F. Lee and consisted of 16,138 acres. In the original purchase, Mr. Broome and Mr. Farr owned two-fifths of the property each and Mr. Lee one-fifth. They operated the ranch as a partnership for ten years and in 1917 divided it according to their interests.

Mr. Broome took 6,183 acres at an average cost of \$9.47 an acre, Mr. Farr 7,281 at an average cost of \$6.72 and a farm of 111 acres at \$50 an acre, and Mr. Lee 2,563 acres at \$11.77 an acre.

A few years later Mr. Broome bought the Lee land and Mr. Lee bought a half interest in the Farr property, built a residence and he and Mrs. Lee lived there for several years until they moved to San Angelo. Later he purchased the remaining Farr interest in the property. It is now owned by his daughter, Mrs. Leslie Stringer of Wichita Falls.

In 1932 Mr. Broome sold 3,939.4 acres out of his ranch to Mr. and Mrs. H. D. McKinley and W. K. McKinley at \$15 an acre and a reservation of one-half the minerals for twenty years.

The Broome Estate consists of Mrs. C. A. Broome, George and Arthur Broome, Mrs. Marion Kelson and Mrs. Harold Broome. George Broome has been living on the ranch. The Broome herd of purebred Herefords was largely dispersed several years ago. Most of the cattle and sheep have been sold since the sale contract was signed.

## Science Chat

### How 'Cold Shoulder' Pays Precision Dividends

Home freezers, for tasty and healthful preservation of food, are prominent on the post-reconversion purchase list of many a home maker. The prospect of freezing meats, fruits, vegetables and pastries at the height of their quality to retain texture and delicacy indefinitely is particularly pleasing to those women whose responsibilities include the gastronomic welfare of a family.

Equally attractive to progressive manufacturers—even to home freezer makers—are the contributions which the same low-temperature techniques and electric refrigeration equipment are making to speed new high-quality products to an eager public. Through the application of sub-zero temperature processes, steel tools, the fingers of industry, are given life-extending hardness, keep-



ing them on the job for longer periods. Production delays for tool changes, adjustments and sharpening are strikingly lessened. Tool "absenteeism" hits a new low.

The use of heat to render iron and steel soft or hard, tough or brittle, is an art whose beginnings extend well back into history. And what small boy, of a generation ago, did not often stand in wonder at the open door of a blacksmith's shop to watch the powerful smith rhythmically apply hammer to hot steel.

Modern industrial engineers have refined heat treatment to an exact, automatically executed science, producing metal parts having many desired characteristics. The addition of cold treatment processes at 150°F below freezing now extends the hardness and uniformity range over which technologists can control the properties of metals.

Thus, low-temperature electric refrigeration units in this year's up-to-date factories will help make available the sooner equipment for next year's up-to-date homes.
