

Unique Air Service

WASHINGTON—"The sky is the limit," is a phrase being proved extra true in aviation. The amazing progress of air transportation is vividly shown in the plans for broadening the scope of commercial operations as soon as the transition to peace-time conditions permits.

Delivery of new automobiles by huge glider trains of the sky is only one of the more striking enterprises for which applications are just waiting to be given the green light by the Civil Aeronautics Board. The list according to the Air Transport Association of America, includes:

- Flying ambulances and funeral planes.
 - Armored airships for safe dispatch of currency and valuables.
 - Big tank planes for shipment of gasoline and oil.
 - Bus and taxi service, using both helicopters and conventional models.
 - Deliveries of medicine, of food, and of department store merchandise.
 - Sightseeing specialists.
 - Fly-yourself systems.
 - Delivery of new or "used" airplanes to buyers or dealers.
- Many war veterans who have gained invaluable experience flying in the war are in the forefront of these projects. There are some whole groups which served together in battle and plan to stick together as partners in the airline business.





Plan a Bathroom to Please Entire Family



CALL a family consultation when you're planning that new bathroom is the advice given farm folks in an article in nationally circulated Capper's Farmer. Then you'll not be forever after wishing the fixtures had been installed some other way. Juggle space and fixtures on paper, then when the final decision is reached, the work of installing the bathroom may go ahead without confusion.

If the family is large, you'll need more than one bathroom. Or if there can be only one, it should be planned to accommodate more than a single person at a time. Simple partitions, like those used in the bathroom pictured above, will do the trick. The lavatory and toilet are separated from the tub. 



Chicken-Potato Chip Scallop Is Ideal For Buffet Suppers



Next time you entertain plan to have a buffet supper and serve chicken and potato chip scallop as the main dish. This delicious casserole is easy to prepare, easy to serve, and is most festive looking with its garnish of whole potato chips.

Here is a suggested menu:

Buffet Supper Menu
Chicken-Potato Chip Scallop
Molded Cranberry Salad
Assorted Relish Tray
Hot Rolls
Fudge Cake Squares
Coffee

Keep this recipe handy, too, as a grand way of using up left-over chicken or turkey. The flavor blends with almost any kind of vegetable and a salad of either fruit or tossed greens is equally good.

Chicken-Potato Chip Scallop

2 cups coarsely crushed potato chips	1 cup chicken stock
4 tablespoons butter or margarine	1 cup milk
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper	½ cup grated American cheese
1 tablespoon minced onion	½ Salt and pepper to taste
½ cup sliced mushrooms	2 cups cubed chicken
4 tablespoons flour	Potato chips for garnishing

Melt the butter or margarine in a heavy saucepan. Add the green pepper, onion and mushrooms and cook until onion is yellow. Add the flour and blend. Add chicken stock and milk (all milk may be used if desired) and cook and stir until smooth and thickened. Add cheese and stir until melted. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Arrange one cup of the crushed potato chips in bottom of a casserole dish. Arrange one cup of cubed chicken over chips, top with half of the sauce mixture. Repeat layers. Garnish top of casserole with large whole potato chips. Bake for 25 minutes in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, or until thoroughly heated and lightly browned. This makes six servings.

In planning for veal in the meal a good many home food buyers are in the habit of not thinking much further than veal roasts or chops. But veal has other cuts to offer—cuts which may be less well known but, nevertheless, are just as desirable, if properly prepared. An idea as to what can be done toward injecting variety into the menu with veal is set forth by the recipes given above. There are, of course, many other cuts of veal and many possibilities for their preparation that may be used to advantage.

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



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Your BABY
By Edna Mae McIntosh

A definite schedule is a great help to you and your baby appreciates regularity. But, schedules must be changed at times. If the routine upsets the family life seriously, it may be adjusted enough to make every one happy. It requires common sense and not slavish adherence to exact hours and minutes.

When your baby seems willing to sleep instead of having the night feeding, let him sleep, if he will. Babies vary in the age when the night feeding becomes unnecessary.

The feeding schedule may be varied to suit your convenience and your baby's. Baby may have breakfast any time from 7 or so until 9 or thereabouts. Orange juice and water may be enough until after the family breakfast is over. If it isn't then change to some other plan.

Usually new foods are introduced at the noon meal which may come anywhere from noon until two o'clock, depending upon the sleeping schedule your baby seems to prefer. After cereal has been fed at noon for awhile and other foods begin to take its place, then move the cereal to breakfast. About the same time, cereal may be given again for the evening meal.

The important thing is to keep your baby healthy and happy whether or not the schedule is the same as other baby schedules.
