## Tax Collections Almost 100%

496 POLL TAXES ISSUED

Sterling County undoubtedly will lead the state in collection of 1945 taxes. A check with Henton Emery, deputy collector, shows out of \$82,968.46 assessed, only \$197.47 was uncollected on Feb. 1. This is less than 1/4 of one percent of the total uncollected. And some of it may be collected by now.

Emery said 488 poll taxes were paid and 8 secured exemptions (21 yr olds.) to make up a good voting strength here this election year.

## Army Offers Educational Opportunities

Young men enlisting in the Regular Army are establishing an "education bank account" that will amount to \$6,986.67, if married and \$5,786, if single, when they complete a three-year enlistment, Lt. Col. Robert L. Hardy, West Texas District Recruiting Officer revealed today.

Offered under the liberalized G1 Bill of Rights, this amounts to an accumulating savings of \$194.07 per month for married men and \$160.72 for single men during their enlistments.

"That's a fast-growing bank account for educational purposes," Colonel Hardy said. "It's astounding when you consider that every young married man is building up his fund at the rate of \$2,328.89 every year, and \$1,928.66 annually if he's single."

"There probably isn't one young man in this community—or anywhere else—who earns enough to save this much toward a college education," Col. Hardy said. "Thousands of young men throughout the United States, and many in the West Texas Area are taking advantage of this unprecedented opportunity."

During the war many a family, for the first time in their lives, ate fresh vegetables right out of their own garden. Better yet, they found they liked 'em! If Victory Gardening in America accomplished nothing more, that was a priceless gain.

Thousands of men, women, and children in cities, towns, and on farms have been enjoying better meals the last four years because of their fine response to Uncle Sam's urge to "grow your own." The little backyard patch, the vacant lot, or a few square feet of ground in a community plot became a gold mine. Over and over it has been proved that the food value is greater, the flavor more delicious, when vegetables are eaten garden-fresh.

Have you heard of gardening as an important form of exercise for health? Certain field hospitals began to establish Victory Gardens during the war to help convalescing service men rebuild their minds and bodies. ing the rows, and gathering the luscious tomatoes, tender young peas and beans, sweet flavored carrots and corn. The secret of continuing this family interest as a delightful peace-time hobby is to plant only as much as can be cared for easily with the work shared by all.

A special kind of neighborliness grew up in America during Victory Gardening years. A business man admits that the good-natured rivalry and vegetable swapping between him and his next-door neighbor have made them friends for life. City families who shared a large garden plot and a common picnic table and fireplace nearby have found a permanently richer community life. Employers and employees working side by side in industrial gardens have reached a better understanding of each other's viewpoint.

Will Durant, a popular philosopher and psychologist, believes that America will never be a true democracy until every family owns a piece of ground and cultivates at least a part of it. The eighteen million Victory Gardens of the war years have been a big step toward that goal.

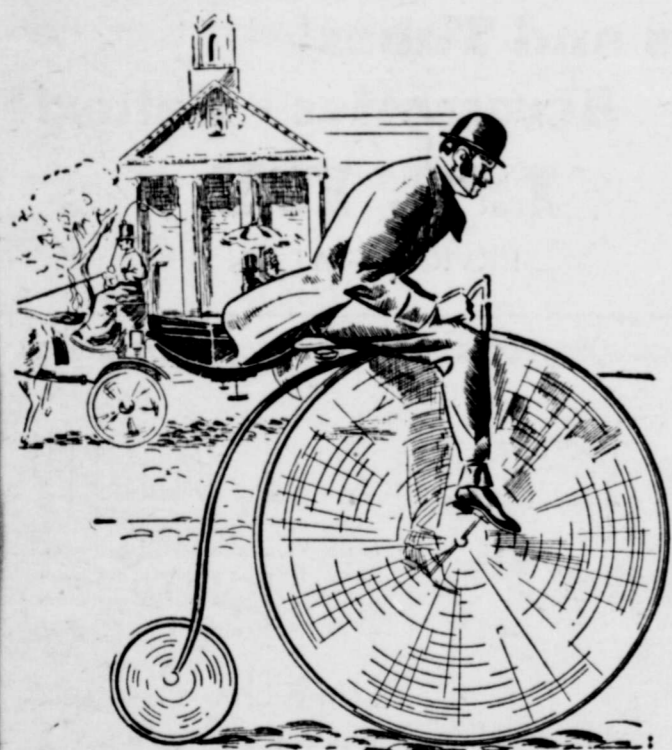

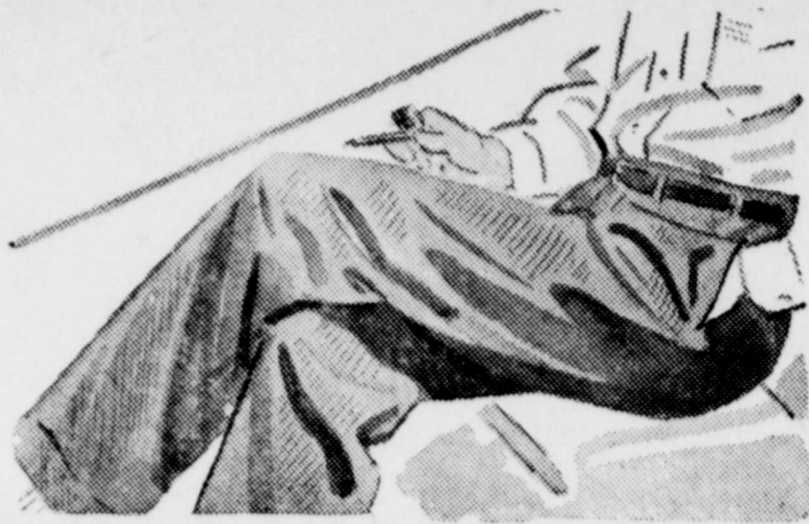
